Porter Proposes Program to Bridge War-Peace Gap

Wilmington, Del. - A six-point program to bridge the gap between "the danger of war and the dream of peace" has been proposed by Congressman Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.). In a speech before members of the Wilmington, Del., chapter of the World Federalists, Porter said the concept of world law could save the world from becoming "an incinerated relic."

Education and discipline were listed by the Oregon congressman as short answers to the world problem. "We must educate and discipline ourselves so that our executive and legislative branches proceed to carry out a vigorous public consensus demanding that we proceed to strengthen the United Nations and thus permit general massive disarmament," said Porter.

Strengthen UN
His more detailed proposed six-point program would:

1. Strengthen the United Nations through a Charter Review Conference. A June meeting of the Committee on Arrangements for such a review is scheduled. (Porter and several colleagues introduced a resolution in Congress Monday which called for a charter review study and a definition of U. S. policy confirming U. S. support of world law.)
2. Increase the power of the World Court. 3. Establish a United Nations police force for observation and patrol. 4. End atomic testing. 5. Initiate disarmament procedures immediately on a multi-lateral arms limitation agreement. 6. Institute public information discussions and unofficial international meetings whenever possible to inform public opinion.

Porter said devastating thermo-nuclear war could be triggered intentionally, accidentally or by unauthorized action. "Until tensions in the world can be reduced," he added, "any accidental or unauthorized explosion is likely to set in motion toward all-out war forces which cannot be stopped."

Porter spoke harshly of two reactions toward possible thermo-nuclear war which he termed "indifferent fatalism" and "a sappy kind of optimism." "The first person says nothing can be done while the second says things are tough but we'll muddle through," Porter observed. "These attitudes may be entirely adequate from a personal mental hygiene point of view," he said, "but they are not going to help us survive."

Dalai Lama Gets Rousing Welcome

Mussoorie, India - (UPI) - The Dalai Lama arrived Tuesday at this hilltop city and was given another thunderous welcome by Buddhist followers and a group of American school children from a nearby mission school.

He moved into a two-story house surrounded by barbed wire barricades, and Indian army command tents were installed to protect him against any Communist attempt. Bayonet carrying riflemen lurked in the mountain underbrush nearby. A second ring of barbed wire was set up on the rim of the estate.

The Dalles - (UPI) - Henry Thompson, son of Chief Tommy Thompson, has been named new chief of the Wy-Am Indians. The father died last week at the age of 104.

Bill Establishing Areas Approved

Salem - (UPI) - Senate bill 260, establishing areas in which community colleges may be established, was passed by the State Senate Tuesday. It now goes to the House.

Only two senators, Ed Ahrens, Turner, and John D. Hare, Hillsboro, both Republicans, voted no.

Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D-Milwaukie), chairman of the Senate Education Committee, said the current law had withstood exception proved unworkable. He said that the effort to establish community colleges had bogged down except at Bend, and that this failure was largely due to inadequacies in the present law.

Protests Allowed
Under the terms of the bill area education districts could be established. Residents of these districts would establish their boundaries and any protests would be heard by the State Board of Education after hearings.

The institutions established in these districts would offer post high school education which would include liberal arts courses as well as vocational training if the people in the districts desire such courses.

Operational costs would be borne one-third by the state, one-third by the educational district and one-third by student fees.

Voting for establishing the post high school educational centers would be on an area basis and not as at present on an individual school basis.

Violence Erupts At Textile Mill

Henderson, N. C. - (UPI) - Gunfire and dynamite explosions brought on by apparent unionist dissatisfaction with company hiring policy broke out anew in this textile mill town Tuesday, despite union ratification of a strike-ending contract.

Fresh violence was triggered at the Harriet-Henderson cotton mills late Monday night by members of the Textile Workers Union of America (AFL-CIO) angered when the number of former strikers added to a second shift at the mill amounted to less than 30 persons.

More than 350 scared non-union workers bedded down in the mill Monday night, afraid to leave because hundreds of angry union workers roamed just outside the mills. But today reinforced police escorted the beleaguered workers from the plant through angry, shouting unionists without major violence.
