

### Woman Kidnaped By Mate Escapes

Newhall, Calif.—UP—A seamstress today told Los Angeles sheriff's deputies that her estranged husband kidnaped her under threat of death and held her prisoner for nine days in a tent.

"He kept watching me all the time," Mrs. Katherine Roden, 33, said. He forced me to cook for him and beat me. I was afraid he would kill me if I took off."

Mrs. Roden, who made her way Wednesday through two miles of dense undergrowth to escape, said she was kidnaped April 13 while wearing only a bathing suit by her estranged husband, Raymond, 43.

"He came to my home, held a gun at my ribs and threatened to kill me if I didn't come with him," she said.

Mrs. Roden, of nearby Van Nuys, was found by deputies wandering down a foothill road. She had a black eye, a cut mouth and a cut on her head. She was wearing man's clothes given her by Roden.

Deputies said Mrs. Roden told them she escaped while Roden slept. Deputies went to the camp site at Castaic Canyon and arrested Roden on suspicion of kidnaping and assault with a deadly weapon. He was armed with two .22-caliber pistols.

Sydney, Australia—UPI—The Communist-dominated Waterside Workers' Federation asked evangelist Billy Graham today to postpone the crusade meeting scheduled for the Sydney showground May 3, the day on which unionists hold the May Day parade here.

Union officials said many members might like to attend the crusade meeting and some crusade members might like to march.

A federation official said the union had written to Graham about the postponement but had not yet received a reply. The matter was first raised at a recent meeting of Trades and Labor Council when it became apparent that Graham was not aware that the two meetings would clash, the official said.
