

Citizens Asked to Examine Directives

Salem—A deceptive procedure being used in Oregon to trace credit defaulters has been denounced by Cecelia P. Galey, chairman of the State Unemployment Compensation commission.

Using a punch-card form resembling an official unemployment compensation inquiry, a few collection firms are deceiving people into reporting their present occupations and employers' addresses, she said. The catch to it is that the form has nothing to do with unemployment compensation or any other official business. It is just one of many "gimmicks" sold by

an eastern firm promising miraculous results for collection agencies, Mrs. Galey noted.

Mrs. Galey explained that a collector sends the form to a debtor's last known address. The post office is obligated to forward the mail. When an individual receives such official looking material, he can usually be depended on to complete and return it without delay, especially since there is implication that failure to do so violates the law. Producers of the form have even gone to the trouble of retaining an agent in Salem so it can be mailed from and re-

The tractor foreman not only is responsible for the maintenance of the tractor, but also assists the treasurer in keeping an accurate account of the tractor payments. The position of tractor foreman is the largest manual responsibility in the FFA chapter.

Ron Ross, also a sophomore, has been appointed chain animal chairman for 1960. Ross has been the chairman of the FFA-sponsored barn dance and has served on several committees during the past year at Crater. There are seven chain animals in the chapter. All of these animals are in the charge of the chairman.

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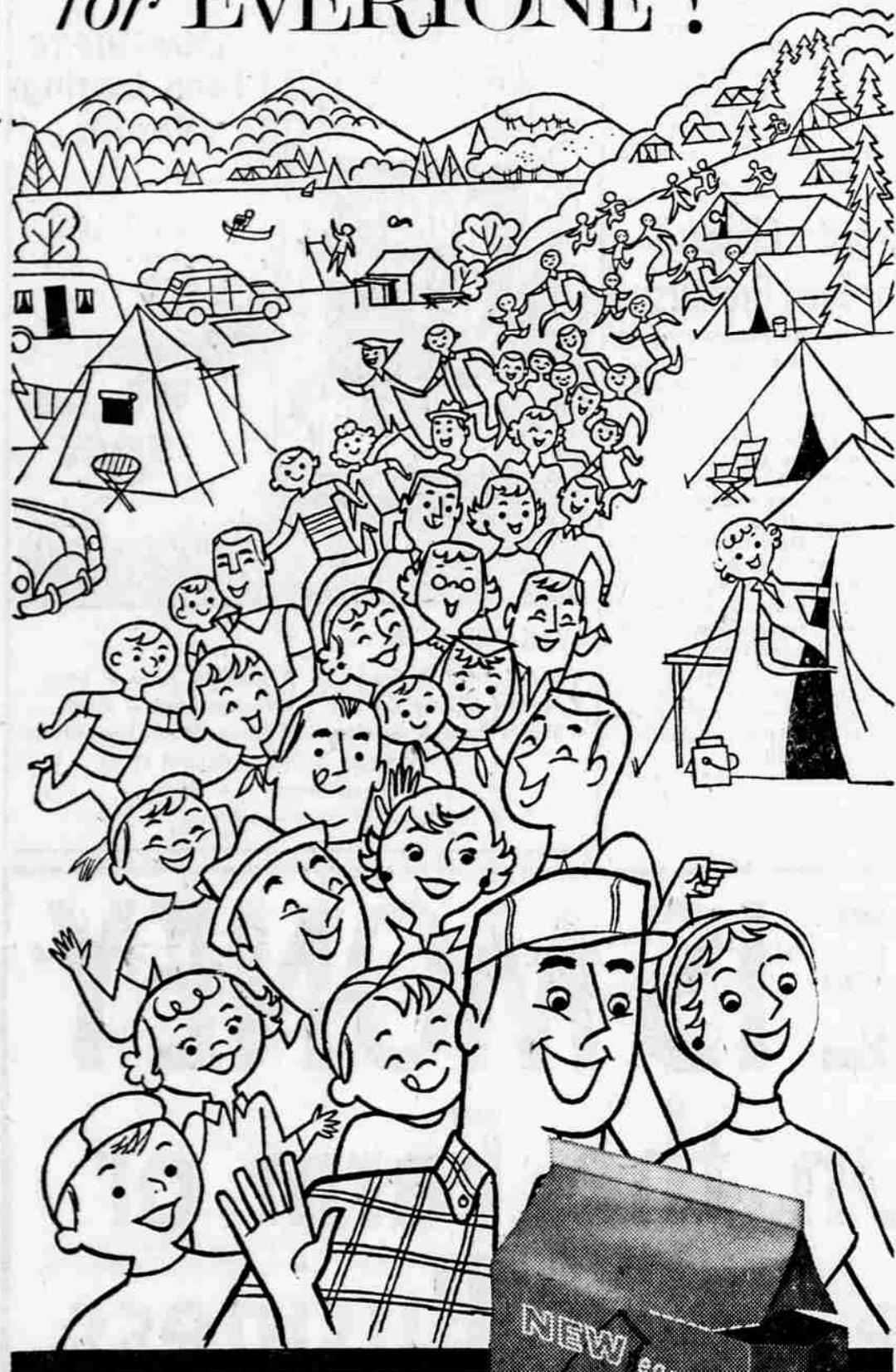
