Electronics Issues Lead Market Higher

New York - (UPI) - Electronics issues scored some spectacular gains today after two sessions of decline. Zenith was ahead as much as 14 points, hitting a new high in the process. Litton and IBM were up around 10 each at their tops. Texas Instruments rose more than 6 at its best.

The autos were firm with Studebaker and American Motors actively traded on their excellent earnings reports. Chemicals favored the upside although Thiokol, a recent favorite, was lower on profit taking.

The rails responded to higher freight loadings and good first quarter earnings with gains ranging to a point or more in some of the leaders. The steels improved along a broad front, with U. S. Steel, Youngstown, and Inland up a point or more.

Building Program Of Control Board Given Approval

Salem - (UPI) - A \$2,881,564 building program for the State Board of Control was approved today by a Joint Ways and Means subcommittee.

The proposed program would allocate \$991,014 for the new correctional institutions: \$57,000 for Fairview home; \$901,000 for MacLaren School for Boys; \$7,000 for the State Deaf school; \$7,000 for preliminary plans for a women's prison, and \$45,000 for unspecified planning.

In addition, \$100,000 was allocated to the Department of Finance for use by state agencies for planning of any needed buildings.

Definite instructions were made that part of the \$100,000 be used for planning a psychiatric ward for children either at Fairview home or the University of Oregon medical school. Sen. Jean Lewis of Portland said there was need for such a facility and at present some such children were confined in the State hospital which lacks necessary facilities.

An effort by Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene) to eliminate \$300,000 from the correctional institution budget failed.

The subcommittee voted to cut the request of the Board of Control for purchase of property in the Capitol Mall during the next two years from \$700,000 to \$200,000.

It tabled a bill providing for a governor's mansion in Salem.
