

### Drake Relay Encounter Underway

Des Moines, Iowa—(UP)—Alex Henderson, an angular Australian with a kangaroo kick which propelled him to a national collegiate record last year, returned to the same Drake Relays today to challenge his old two-mile mark.

Henderson's race was one of the first events as Drake university opens its two day Golden Anniversary relays. Forecasters announced favorable weather—partly cloudy skies and temperatures in the 60s.

Henderson, when running for Arizona State of Tempe, turned on a grueling finish a year ago to set a national collegiate record of 8:51.3 and beat Bud Edelen of Minnesota, who placed second with a respectable 9:09.9.

Edelen, along with John Macy and Jerry Smartt, both of Houston, was back this year to challenge Henderson, who, after last year's relays, went on to set an American record at 8:46.3.

Other final events on today's opening schedule included: the sprint medley relays in both the university and college divisions, matching a half-dozen of the nation's finest foursmen; the 440-yard high hurdles, with Cliff Cushman of Kansas back to defend his title, and a top-flight duel between Oregon and Kansas for the four-mile relay ribbon.

Jim Grelle of Oregon, who set the Drake mile record at 4:07.9 last year, was to anchor Oregon's bid for the four-mile relay crown.

### Quick-Draw Club Being Organized
