

Crowe Hits Homer For Card Win

St. Louis—(UPI)—Veteran first baseman George Crowe, getting his first starting assignment of the season, blasted a 400-foot home run into the right center-field pavilion as leadoff man in the eighth inning to give St. Louis a 6-5 win over the Los Angeles Dodgers Saturday.

Crowe's game-winning smash broke up a close pitching duel between relief hurlers Alex Kellner of the Cardinals and the Dodgers' Art Fowler, a right-hander.

The pair had been matching each other in putting goose eggs up on the scoreboard since the fifth inning after the teams had engaged in a slugfest the first four frames.

Southpaw Kellner, an ex-American Leaguer, got credit for the victory. It was his first mound action this year. Los Angeles made a threat in the ninth inning when former Cardinal Rip Repulski, batting for another one-time Redbird, Wally Moon, singled to right. However, an attempted sacrifice failed and Kellner put out the fire to end a three-hour and two minute ball game.

The Dodgers looked like they would run away with the contest in the first inning as they scored three runs. However, the last place Cardinals came back in the bottom half of the inning to knot the score 3-all.

The score was then tied 4-4 and 5-5 before Crowe broke it up.

Salem — (UPI) — Willamette University edged out Portland State College, 63-2-3 to 62-1-3, in a track meet here Friday. University of Portland finished in third place with 30 points. Three new stadium records were set. Skip Spence, Willamette, ran the 100-yard dash in 9.85. The old mark was 9.9 by Bill Van Horn in 1952. Spence also set a new mark in the 220, of 21.5. The campground and trailer area were reported "jammed" overnight. Throngs of anglers were expected at the lake again today.

Mathews' Bat Booming Loud

Lucky thing Eddie Mathews didn't go out and burn his bat after the World Series because right now it's kindling Milwaukee's hopes for a third straight National league pennant.

No one would have blamed Mathews much if he tossed that piece of lumber in the fire after last fall. It didn't do him much good in the series with the Yankees against whom he struck out 11 times.

"I had a lousy year 'all around," he reflected, bearing in mind the .251 average he slumped to last season. "This year will be a lot different, though."

Mathews offered a fair sample of what he meant Friday night when he blasted two home runs, one with the bases loaded, to lead Milwaukee to a 10-7 victory over Cincinnati.

The two homers boosted Mathews' season total to six, helped the Braves retain first place and gave them their 37th triumph in the last 45 meetings with their Cincinnati "cousins."
