

Cincinnati Defeats Braves, Knocks out Spahn in 6 Frames; Pirates Decision Phillies

The Cincinnati Reds knocked out long-time tormentor Warren Spahn in less than six innings Saturday and went on to defeat the Milwaukee Braves, 7-6, with the help of heavy slugger by Johnny Temple and Frank Thomas.

Temple hammered out a three-run homer that tied the score at 3-3 in the third inning and Thomas had two doubles and two singles as the Reds beat Spahn for the first time since Sept. 28, 1937. Spahn had beaten the Reds six straight times and had a 31-15 lifetime mark against them until this loss.

Tom Acker, who yielded one run and three hits in four innings, received credit for his first win of the season. The loss was the first for Spahn after two victories.

Eddie Mathews brought the Braves to within one run of a tie in the ninth when he slammed his seventh homer of the year but Del Crandall, who had been tied with the winning runs, tied the game.

Mazeroski Snaps Tie

Harvey Haddix notched his first win of the season with a seven-hitter that gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 4-2 decision over the Philadelphia Phillies. Bill Mazeroski homered to snap a 2-2 tie in the sixth inning and then singled and scored the clinching tally in the eighth. Seth Morehead was the loser.

Relief ace Don Elston shut out the Giants for the last inning and a third as the Chicago Cubs scored a 5-3 win. Rookie Bob Anderson

Cliff Chapman came home for the Cougars in the second inning but it was ruled he failed to touch home plate, nullifying the score.

Tom Davidson heaved four-hit ball for Prospect, walking two and striking out 11.

Jacksonville lost the services of Doyle Branson in the fifth inning when he suffered a leg cut attempting to slide home. The cut required 12 stitches but was not deep and Branson, who is also a track man for the Redskins, is expected to be able to run in a couple weeks.

Butte assumed second place alone and Prospect bolstered its unbeaten cause Friday in the Jackson County B Baseball League.

Talent tabulated heavy in the first two innings to trim Butte Falls 11 to 6 and Prospect surged in the late stages to edge Jacksonville 7 to 6.

Friday outcomes busted a three-way tie for second place.

The Bulldogs of Talent got four runs in the first inning and five in the second against the Loggers. Hits by John Butler and Kip Walls, three errors, Don Skundrick's sacrifice and a base on balls were factors in the opening frame offensive. Jacobs gave up three of the four hits that Butte Falls socked. He walked nine and whiffed five over six innings. Allan King yielded the other safety and struck out the batter. Larry Cavin was tagged for all five Talent hits in four innings. He walked three and fanned two. Edwin Ellis walked one and had five strikeouts in two innings.

Lee Gitchell's single drove home the winning run for Prospect in the sixth inning. The Cougars piled over three markers in the inning with Floyd Scaife and John Rogers providing the heaviest artillery. After Bob Fitch walked, Scaife homered to tie the game. Rogers then tripled and Gitchell followed with his single.

Prospect trailed 6 to 0 after 3½ innings but got one run in the bottom of the fourth on a walk, a hit batter and Don Gillespie's double. In the fifth frame Bob Fitch singled and Scaife, two bases and an error, walk and two hit batters figured in a three-run spree.

Dellinger In Fastest Two-Mile

Pomona, Calif. —(UPI)—Bill Dellinger, ex-University of Oregon runner now of the U. S. air force, ran the fastest two miles on record for an American Friday night—8 minutes, 48.2 seconds—to upset favored Jerome Walters and England's Gordon Pirrie in the first annual Mt. San Antonio Relays.

The former Oregon star set an American citizen's record, but fell short of the U.S. mark of 8:46.3, set last year by an Australian, Alex Henderson of Arizona State at Tempe.

WALTERS CLOSE
The relays saw Dallas Long, fabulous teen-age weight star, edge Bill Nieder in the shot put with a heave of 61 feet, 10½ inches, but fail to set a new world mark.

In the invitational two-mile race, Walters of the Southern California striders was only a short distance behind Dellinger at the finish and was clocked in 8:49.4. Pirrie, who finished third, was clocked in 8:59.3.

Cubs Nip Giants 5-3

Chicago —(UPI)—Reliever Don Elston came on in the eighth inning Saturday to help rookie starter Bob Anderson to his second victory without a loss as the Chicago Cubs defeated the San Francisco Giants, 5-3.

Elston took over after Anderson, who yielded only four hits through seven innings, was nicked for an unearned run on Al Dark's bobble at third base and subsequent singles by Jim Davenport and Willie Mays.

Elston struck out Orlando Cepeda to retire the side and preserve a 4-3 Chicago lead. The Cubs added another run in their half of the eighth when Dale Long belted his third home run of the year.

The Cubs scored their first four runs off starter Sam Jones, handing the veteran right-hander his third loss in four decisions. A walk to Sam Taylor in the third, Tony Taylor's double and Dark's triple scored two Chicago runs, and another came in the fourth on Bank's double, a single by Long and Lee Walls' sacrifice fly.

Anderson got his first of two singles in the fifth inning, and Jones walked Tony Taylor. Gordon Jones came on at this point to get Dark on a sacrifice bunt. But he walked George Altman to load the bases and Banks lofted a sacrifice fly to left field to score Anderson.

Anderson, making his first start since winning the Cub's opener against the Los Angeles Dodgers, walked Cepeda in the fifth and was nicked for a run-scoring triple by Felipe Alou. He retired the next two batters on infield grounders but he walked Eddie Bressoud and then uncorked a wild pitch to permit Alou to score.

The double play combination of Banks, Tony Taylor and Long worked three times, twice on grounders by Mays after Jackie Brandt had singled. On Brandt's third single, the Cub infielders narrowly missed tagging Mays with a third double play when the Giant's center fielder forced Brandt at Second.

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Four-Mile Mark Set By Oregon

Des Moines, Iowa —(UPI)—University of Oregon's fleet-footed Ducks set a new Drake Relays record in the four-mile relay here Friday.

The quartet was made up of Mark Robbins, Phil Knight, George Larson and anchor man Jim Grelle.

Oregon turned the four-mile distance in 17:15.2 minutes, just a shade under the 17:15.9 Drake record set by Kansas in 1952. Oregon's Grelle ran the anchor mile in 4:14.4 as the West Coast squad beat Nebraska by about 20 yards.

Jamaican George Kerr ran a blistering half-mile anchor to pace Illinois to a surprise national college record of 3:17.8 minutes in the sprint medley relay. Kerr ran his half-mile leg in 1:46.8, slightly lower than the 1:47.2 recognized as the standing-start collegiate half mile mark.

Padres Hold 2nd Place With Win

San Diego, Calif. —(UPI)—Ken Retzer drove in four runs Saturday as the San Diego Padres tightened their hold on second place in the Pacific Coast league with an 8 to 6 triumph over Vancouver.

Retzer homered in the third inning, scoring Fred Hatfield ahead of him. He singled in two more in the fifth.

Southpaw Jake Striker got credit for the win, but had to have help from reliever Stan Pital. Striker gave way in the seventh when the mounds put five hits together for two runs.

Shortstop Ron Hansen singled in two of the runs in that big inning.

San Diego was powered by two other homers. Rudy Regalado hit a solo homer in the second and Stu Locklin homered in the fourth with the bases empty for his first hit of the season.

It was the second straight Padre win over the Mounties and Striker's first win of the season.

Starter Connie Johnson absolved the loss for the Mounties. He was shelled from the box in the fifth.

The teams tangled in a twin-bill tomorrow with Fred Besana (0-0) and Charlie Estrado (00) scheduled to work for Vancouver against Dick Stigman (1-1) and Bill Werle (0-0).
