A. B. Cunningham, former Medford resident and employee of California Oregon Power company, died in Baltimore, Md., Friday.

He was born in Elsbey, Mo., in 1881, and moved to Everett, Wash., from St. Louis in 1904. He moved to Medford in 1911.

While here, he was employed by Copco until 1920, when he went into business in the People Electric Store with O. O. Alenderfer, his brother-in-law, former mayor of Medford.

He was active in the Commercial club, the Elks, Masons, Medford lodge 103, AF&AM, Crater Lake chapter No. 32, RAM, Table Rock council R&SM, Malta Commandery No. 4, Knights Templar; Hillah Temple of Shrine, Ashland court, Jesters, of Shrine.

He was possessor of Hillah Temple in 1939, when he moved to the east. He entered business with his son in Baltimore.

Mr. Cunningham was married to Francis Hilen in 1907. Survivors include his widow; one son and three grandchildren.

Dentists Reminded Of Responsibilities

Portland - (UPI) - The Oregon State Dental association Friday asked its members to provide needed dental service for recipients of welfare without regard to the ability of the state welfare commission to pay for such services.

The announcement came in the wake of drastic orders of curtailment of medical assistance in 21 counties of Oregon due to a lack of welfare funds. A similar appeal was made earlier by members of the Oregon State Medical society.

Dr. William B. Prophet of John Day, president of the dental association, said, "It is scarcely necessary to call to the attention of the dental profession the obligation it has to provide essential dental care regardless of the patient's financial resources."

He added: "It is hoped that all dentists in the state will do their part by carrying on and extending emergency dental work where it is necessary to relieve pain and treat acute infections irrespective of the commission's ability to pay for such services at this time."

The courthouse expense of \$38,688.20 is \$1,626 more than the current year's total of \$37,062.20. Major expense under this item is fuel oil for heating at \$5,000, the same as for the current year. Largest increase is represented by \$800 for extra help, \$450 over the current year's allowance. Care of poor not at the county farm depends on the

Injury Benefits Measure Gains House Approval

Salem - (UPI) - A bill raising benefits to injured workmen under the state industrial accident commission law passed the House and was sent to the Senate Friday.

Vote on the measure was 47-12 after some debate as to its impact on industry and farmers paying into the fund for injured workmen.

Rep. W. O. Kelsay (D-Roseburg) said the increase was a modest one.

Would Raise Rates
Rep. Joe Rogers (R-Independence) opposed the bill on grounds it would raise farm rates substantially.

He said the present maximum Oregon rate is \$5.28 but would be increased to \$8.66 under the bill.

However, both Rogers and Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene), who favored the bill, noted that the rate would go up for farmers to \$8.16 whether the bill was passed or not.

Gone in the Hole
Skelton said this was because the industrial accident commission had gone in the hole and this Legislature was having to "pick up the tab."

The whole rate structure will be the subject of an interim committee study.

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fate of the budget for the state welfare commission. The federal government pays 39 per cent of the county total, the state 43 per cent and the county 18 per cent. According to law the county may be required to allow up to 4 1/2 mills on each dollar of the county's assessed valuation for welfare.

Farm Home
The Jackson county farm home budget is \$119,461.56 for the new fiscal year compared to \$81,185, or an increase of \$38,276.56 over the current year's total. The corrected amount for supplies is \$16,110. The previous stated amount was \$17,500. The largest item in this budget section is \$34,776 for 14 nurse aids. This item also shows the largest increase—\$14,256 over the current year. Money allocated for supplies shows an increase of \$5,510 over the current year's allocation of \$10,500.

The allocation of \$1,675 for fruit inspection includes allocations of \$755 for pest and blight control and \$795 for the county's share in the frost warning service.

The \$23,645 allocated for the county's share of the county extension office expenses is based on an anticipated increase in matching funds from the state. This would provide \$3,665 more for clerical hire or a total of \$13,565.

The veterans service officer's budget total of \$9,523 represents an increase of \$1,299.85 over the current year's total of \$8,223.15. A major item in this budget section is \$4,452 for the veterans service officer's salary or an increase of \$220 over the current salary of \$4,032. A second major item is \$3,276 for the secretary's salary or \$236.60 over the previous salary of \$3,040.

The question of who the state veterinarian should work under, a question that caused quite a hassle some months ago, is settled in this bill, Leth said, by placing him directly under the director of agriculture.

At present, the veterinarian works under the division of animal husbandry, an arrangement objected to by the state veterinarians association.

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Hiring Refusals Solely Age-Based Opposed in Bill

Salem - (UPI) - Refusal of employers of six or more persons to employ a person between the ages of 45 and 65 solely upon basis of his age would be a violation of a state policy embodied in Senate Bill 17 which passed Friday.

The bill passed with only two dissenting votes and now goes to the House.

Sen. Alfred Corbett (D-Portland), who carried the bill, said a real problem had arisen because of a habit of employers of hiring young men and setting up rules against employment of anyone over 45.

The bureau of labor will administer the bill. On receipt of a complaint the state labor commissioner will investigate and if the complaint is substantiated, hold a hearing.

If the complaint is upheld the commissioner will go to the courts and seek a cease and desist order against the employer.

Senate Bill 237 reorganizing the state department of agriculture was passed by the Senate and sent to the House.

Sen. Walter Leth (R-West Salem), himself a farmer, said that farm organizations favored the bill.
