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Tea Held at Aunt Edna's Guest House

Jacksonville—To celebrate the opening of Aunt Edna's guest house in Jacksonville, members of Upper Applegate Extension unit were invited to the house for a tea Monday afternoon. About 30 attended.

The house is one on Fifth street which Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Valentine bought and restored, and which is now furnished as it might have been 100 years ago. The Valentines, who formerly lived in the Upper Applegate area, opened the guest house as an Oregon Centennial venture. Mrs. Valentine has been a member of Upper Applegate Extension unit for a number of years and stated that she was aided in her project by unit members who helped with the work, gave advice and either loaned or gave her antique objects for use in her guest house. The further says that the lessons which she undertook with the extension program has been largely responsible for her success in restoring the home and planning the furnishings.

Heirloom Tea Service
 Pouring for the tea were Mrs. Warren Hazen, Jacksonville, and Mrs. Hugo Guenther. Mrs. Hazen used a china tea service which is an heirloom in the family of her husband. Made by the W. T. Copeland company in England, the china has a crown design which it is said "tells a love story." The pieces are marked "Stake Upon Trent."

Of additional interest is the fact that each cup has a deep saucer, and a "cup plate." Mrs. Hazen relates that when the set was first made, it was customary "to saucer" tea—in other words, pour the beverage into the saucer for cooling and then drink directly from the saucer rather than the cup. The cup was placed on the little cup plate.

For the tea Mrs. Guenther wore an heirloom black satin gown, more than 100 years old which was designed and made in one of the New England states, and a large hat with roses.

Three Guest Rooms
 Aunt Edna's Guest House is small, with but three guest rooms. Each one of these the Valentines named—one is Gold Gulch, one is Chrome Creek and the third is Sterling Strike—all names found in the historic Jacksonville area and keyed to the early-day gold strikes.

The beds have hand-tied comforters and the spreads are the old-fashioned tufted type—one in the well known Pride of Virginia pattern. The bedsteads are antique, either wood or brass. One especially handsome piece of hand-carved oak was largely restored by Mrs. Robert Sorber of Upper Applegate. In the room with the oak bedstead, the towel rack is one made from the bottom of an old platform rocker. The rooms have old-fashioned dresses on which stand oil lamps. Mrs. Valentine wishes she had been able to find some old pin cushions

to go on top the bureaus. Window-Draperies
 The window draperies in the rooms are particularly interesting. They were designed and made by Mr. Valentine's son, Lyn Valentine, professional interior decorator of Mesa, Ariz., in his shop after measurements and descriptions were sent to him. Of white material similar to muslin, the draperies are cafe type and decorated with fringe. The top panels operate on conventional traverse rods. Decorative light globes are imported from Italy.

The guest house was originally the home of William M. Turner and was built in 1877. Records at the Jacksonville museum say that Mr. Turner, born in Belfast, Ireland, in 1828, came to California where he at one time served as assistant federal assessor for southern California, having been appointed by President Lincoln. He arrived in Jacksonville in 1866 to take charge of the telegraph office and later was editor of the Oregon Sentinel.

Mrs. Valentine, reading his obituary, relates that Mr. Turner was praised for his wit and sympathetic style of writing. The obituary had been written by Silas Day.

Original Hinges
 The house was made with the square nails used in those days and some of the window latches have inscriptions which read "Patent Pending, 1876." The original hinges are on the doors, and they have huge porcelain knobs. The front door has an old-fashioned latch.

The fireplace in the living room was for a time walled up, but a recent owner restored it. Very little remodeling was necessary, the Valentines found.

Mrs. Valentine enhances the atmosphere of her guest house by wearing cotton print dresses made in a century-old style. She does her daily shopping wearing one of these gowns and carrying a basket. The Valentines report that thus far their guests have been persons interested in the house and its history, and not one has smoked, or scattered ashes, during his stay.

Mrs. Harry Birch, president, appointed her committees for the year at the meeting.

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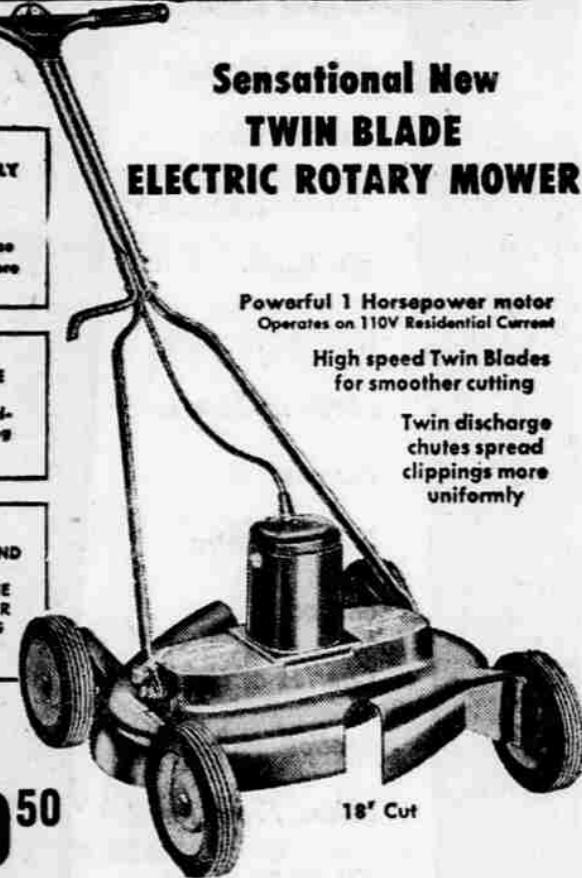
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
