All members in the area who have not been contacted by the telephone committee are asked to call Mrs. M. Donald McGarry, KEystone 5-1202 for reservations.

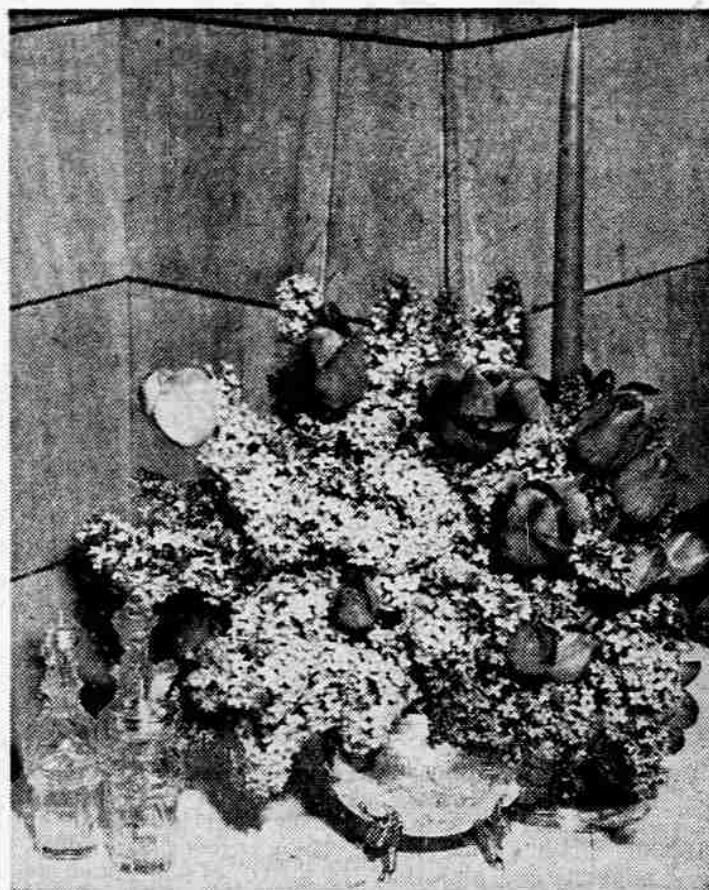
Center to Show Colored Slides

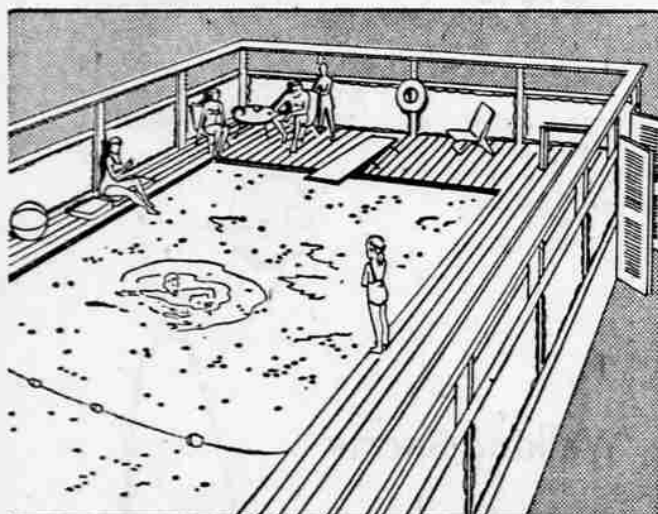
