You and Your Pet

Animals are faring better because of the care, love and training given them by 4-H Boys and Girls throughout our country. Since its beginning in the early 1900's 4-H word has helped nearly 20 million boys and girls, 10 to 21 years old, to improve themselves and to learn better methods of farming, home-making and serving their communities.

For example, the new 4-H dog husbandry project which has recently been started in several states.

Boys and girls learn about dogs by assuming complete care for one under home conditions. They learn about the different breeds of dogs, how to know good dogs, which ones are best for them and which are suited for certain work.

Learn to Handle Dog
Before they may own a dog, club members first learn how to handle him during the first few days at home. They learn to give good care, including grooming and training, proper feeding, health precautions and proper sanitation.

Before a pup is taken home, you should find out the kind of food it has been fed, and also how it has been mixed, if meat or kibble. When fed very thin, like gruel, it will loosen the puppy's bowels, making house-breaking much harder on you. If you add some, or much, canned dog food, unless the pup has been fed exactly that type and kind, it will have the same affect. Pups should not be sold until they have a good set of baby teeth — and by that time, they should be having an almost dry, "crunchy" food mixture to help develop a good solid body and muscle.

Left over vegetable juice, vegetables or meat scraps chopped fine are all good to add to the meal for variety of taste. Some persons have the mistaken opinion that they need a different food three or four times a week for variety. The dog doesn't think so. They are creatures of habit and you only upset their balance and soon have a poor or finicky eater.

Strange Ground
The young pup should never be placed on strange ground unless he has his permanent shots. Puppies are easily susceptible to distemper and hepatitis virus, which might have just been left in a nice, clean looking, yard, if it is unfenced and accessible to stray dogs.

Another reason a puppy or dog should never run free and unattended is that they will pick up chicken or fish bones or other unsuitable food, causing sickness from diarrhea, or a trip to the veterinary to remove bones from the throat.

The youngsters in this project receive the pup when it is 10 weeks old and keep it until it is about 14 months old. During this time, the animal gets experience in living with people and preliminary training.
