Ways and Means Expected To End Work on Tuesday

Salem—UPI—The Joint Ways and Means committee expects to finish up its work for the 1959 Legislative Tuesday.

It will decide then on a requested increase in salaries of state workers, consider a budget for the State Tax commission and a few "odds and ends" according to Sen. Alfred Corbett (D-Portland), chairman.

Revenue Bonds Approved — At its meeting today the committee recommended for passage bills appropriating \$4,470,000 from the general fund for Board of Higher Education buildings. In addition it approved a bill to authorize issuance of \$5,600,000 in revenue bonds to cover the cost of research buildings at four higher education institutions.

An appropriation of \$2,781,564 for the State Board of Control's institutional building program also was approved. This includes \$100,000 for planning of future state buildings by the Department of Finance.

HJR 45 authorizing the Board of Higher Education to issue \$40 million in bonds for construction of self-liquidating buildings was approved. The bill provides that only \$15 million of the bonds can be sold in any one biennium.

Judges Approved — The bill was opposed by three members of the committee. Rep. Stafford Hansell (R-Athens), said it would be to the interest of the people if the committee kept the bill right where it was.

The committee approved addition of two circuit judges in Multnomah county and one in Marion county.

Rep. Leon Davis (R-Hillsboro) said Washington county needed an additional judge. Sen. Corbett said he believed Washington county could get by for the next two years at least with use of pro tem judges and assignment of judges from other counties.

Ike Asks Backing For Aid Program

Washington—UPI—President Eisenhower called on American businessmen today for support in promoting greater public understanding of the vital necessity of his foreign aid program.

The President made his appeal in a speech to the annual convention of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. His foreign aid program faces cuts in Congress.

Eisenhower, speaking from notes, said it was an "incontrovertible truth" that isolation for America is a futile and fatal policy.

He said this country's strength against the threat of international Communism was in direct ratio to the strength of the Free World. For this reason, he said, the U. S. must not falter in its assistance of friendly free countries.

Higher Fishing Fee Recommended

Salem—UPI—Senate bill 416 adding \$1 to the cost of fishing licenses was recommended for passage today by the Joint Ways and Means committee.

The money would be used for management study and research, particularly a study of where salmon are caught in Oregon streams.

A compulsory tag system would be inaugurated to aid in the work. The bill now goes to the House.

The committee said sportsmen of the state had petitioned for the increased fee providing the money be used for research work.

Small Worlds Around Us

Animals Play Follow the Leader — The childhood game of "follow the leader" has its counterpart in most of the animal societies of the land, sea and air. In fact in the animal world "following the leader" reaches a high state of application and perfection. In many instances it is a way of life and a means of survival.

The one glaring exception is the insects. With the exception of ants, bees, wasps and termites, each insect "goes it alone" and lives or dies according to its own dictates or individual actions.

But in the higher orders of animals group-action under a recognized leader seems to be a normal procedure. Even in a flock of barnyard chickens, turkeys or any other domestic fowl, under constant human domination, there is a recognized leader, a "head-hen" or "peck-turkey."

In chicken society we call this the "peck system" and it operates constantly even in a flock consisting of but a few individuals. So far no human observer has come up with anything like a satisfactory explanation of how the system works or for what purpose.

In wildfowl, especially the geese, an experienced leader or "head goose" leads the flock on its long migrations. His leadership and judgment directs the flock, guides their destiny, may even determine their death or survival.

The wolf-pack follows the dictates of a leader. It, too, becomes a means of survival for in force of numbers big game is killed and the pack eats. Elephants and many of the hoofed animals move in bands or groups under a "wiser" leader.

One of the most spectacular types of animal-group action occurs in the sea where herds of pilot whales operate under a recognized leader whose every action and decision is followed blindly. These mammals, related to the killer whale and sometimes called "black fish," may be 25 feet in length. They range the oceans of the entire world traveling in "packs."

Pilot whales sometimes follow their leader up on a slanting beach to die in the shallows in what is called "mass suicide."

In some animal societies the strongest may become the leader simply by the process of defeating the other contenders. But the majority of animal groups have other, less obvious methods and the way of it is not easily understood. Students of animal actions have pondered long and seriously on the methods used by various creatures in selecting a leader. One thing we are sure of, however, the selection is not haphazard or accidental. "Following the leader" is a serious business.
