

Evidence Found Tumor Can Cause Another Type

Excelsior Springs, Mo.—(Science Service)—Evidence suggesting that one specific type of tumor can cause the growth of several different types of tumors was presented here.

Thus, specific tumors may be carrying a hidden potential that is triggered only under special circumstances to produce different growths, Dr. Ludwig Gross of the Veterans Administration Hospital, Bronx, N.Y., told science writers gathered here by the American Cancer Society.

The hidden potential may be a virus or several viruses, he said.

Dr. Gross has been experimenting with leukemia, cancer of the blood, in mice. He found that when he exposed the mice to radiation, they developed leukemia.

Now he has been able to filter off from the cancerous cells a free substance that he suspects is a virus.

This free substance, when injected into animals that have not been exposed to radiation, causes leukemia.

However, Dr. Gross found that if he removed the thymus, a gland located above the heart, the mice did not develop leukemia when they received the injection. Even when the mice received the injection, before the thymus was removed, the leukemia disappeared when the gland was taken out.

Role Not Understood

Doctors today do not understand the exact role played by the thymus, but Dr. Gross suspects that in this particular case the gland acts as a shelter for the virus where it can multiply.

Some of the mice injected with the virus-like particles developed not leukemia, but tumors of the parotid glands or subcutaneous sarcomas. The leukemia filtrate may contain a mixture of cancer-causing particles, Dr. Gross suggested.

On the other hand, it is entirely possible that tumors themselves carry the potential to induce other types of cancerous growths.

New York—(UPI)—Will there be a steel strike in 1959? That's the question being asked today in top government and business circles as the deadline nears for the start of negotiations May 5 on a contract covering 500,000 basic steelworkers.

be available to haul away trash, after all debris has been cleared and placed in piles. Each worker has been asked to furnish their own work tools.

The opinion one hears most frequently at this time is that there will be a steel strike at mid-year, when the present three-year contract expires.

Official wage talks will get underway in New York next Tuesday between four-man bargaining teams representing the United Steelworkers of America and the basic steel industry.

However, all eyes this week will be on a two-day meeting starting Thursday of the union's 170-man Wage Policy committee. This group has been called into session to formalize the union's bargaining demands.

Seek Wage Increase

They are expected to approve demands for substantial wage increases and improved fringe benefits such as pensions, differentials and vacations.

Some observers say the committee also will call for some kind of a make-work scheme to help cut unemployment in the steel towns.

David J. McDonald, presi-

dent of the USW, already has suggested that steelworkers be given a three-month paid vacation every five years as a means of creating 30,000 new jobs in the industry.

Right now the union and management are at loggerheads over practically everything certain to come up in the negotiations.

The industry has proposed a one-year wage freeze and has indicated that a moratorium on wages will result in a hold-the-line price policy. The industry also has called for abolition from the contract of the escalator clause which ties wages to the cost of living.

McDonald rejected the industry's proposals and countered with a program of his own. It called for a price freeze and increases in wages and benefits based on higher industry earnings and output per man hour.

Turned Down Program

The industry turned down the union's program and again reiterated its belief that no wage increase is justified this

year.

The industry, from its pre-negotiation statements, wants a one-year contract. The union wants another three-year contract.

The whole situation has been complicated by Washington intervention. President Eisenhower and many members of Congress have called for a non-inflationary settlement. That means no price increase.

But the heads of the leading steel companies in recent weeks have said that wages and prices cannot be separated from each other. Any wage increase will lead to a price increase.

Some congressional leaders have said the industry could absorb a productivity increase—and based on output per man hour—without raising prices. The industry has rejected output per man hour as a definition of productivity. Neither side has ever been able to agree on a formula to determine this enigmatic thing called productivity.



Program to Aid Small Businesses Proposed by SBA

A program to help small business firms obtain a greater share of sales of government owned timber by setting aside certain proposed sales exclusively for small business competitive bidding will be inaugurated May 1, John G. Barnett, branch manager of the small business administration, Portland, announced today.

The new program is the result of a three way agreement between the SBA, forest service, and bureau of land management. Barnett said that under the new program the SBA will initiate joint set-asides for purchase of government-owned timber by small business concerns after a review by the agency of the cutting and sales programs of the forest service and BLM. Final sales, he explained, will rest with the latter two agencies.

All bids by small firms must carry a self certification that the firm is small by SBA standards and must meet the basic requirements of the forest service or the BLM in the offering of sales of government timber.

Firms bidding on government timber are classified as small if they are primarily engaged in the logging or forest products industry, are independently owned and operated and together with affiliates employ not more than 100 persons.

Discoverer II Ends Two Weeks in Orbit

Washington—(UPI)—American Discoverer II satellite has plunged back into the earth's atmosphere and presumably burned up from friction after two weeks in orbit, the Defense Department said early today.

A spokesman for the department's Advanced Research Projects Agency said he was notified by the Cambridge, Mass., Observatory that the 1,600-pound satellite had fallen into the earth's dense air.

The spokesman said he did not know at what time or location the re-entry took place.

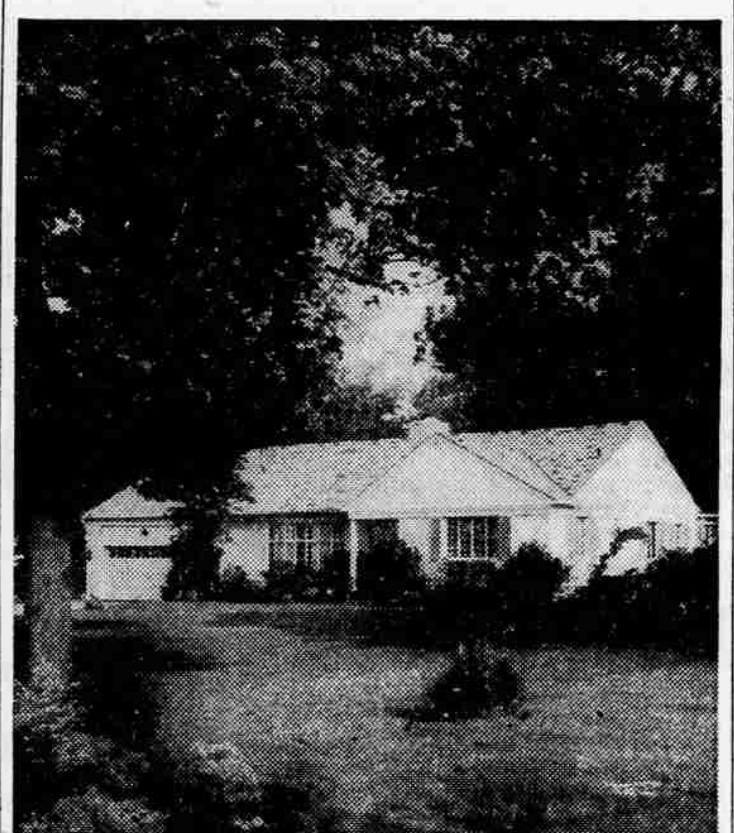
Poplarville, Miss.—Mrs. Eliza Parker, mother of Negro M. C. Parker, apparent lynch mob victim: "My son was a good boy."

Cascade Plane Crash Hurts Three

Eugene—(UPI)—Two men and a woman were in Sacred Heart hospital today with injuries suffered when their light plane crashed Sunday in the Willamette pass about 30 miles southeast of Oakridge.

One of the men, Robert Anderson, 40, Springfield, was in "critical" condition.

The other two, Nadine Allen, 38, Springfield and student-pilot Clinton Abnet, 23, also of Springfield, were described as in "good" condition.

The woman suffered frost

bite on her feet when she attempted to try to find help. Earlier Abnet had walked out onto a highway and was picked up by a passing motorist. Abnet could not give a definite location of the plane.

Mrs. Allen was found about 3 p.m. wandering around. She had lost her shoes and suffered a possible ankle injury.

Anderson was rescued at about 5 p.m. He was trapped in the plane and rescuers had trouble freeing him.

State Aeronautics Director Earl Snyder said the plane

ran into a snowstorm, was forced to fly low and rammed into the hillside, landing upside down.
