Employees Oppose Steel Union Demand

New York (UPI) - Most steel workers oppose their union's demands for wage increases now, a widely known public opinion analyst said today.

They feel that recent events prove that pay increases in the steel industry are quickly nullified by higher prices and increased taxes, Samuel Lubell said in a dispatch distributed by United Feature Syndicate.

Lubell said that, on the basis of a recent survey he undertook, he was convinced most steelworkers would rather receive improvements in various contractual "fringe items," such as expanded hospitalization, paid-up insurance, a lower retirement age and improved pensions.

DL&W, Erie Railroads Agree on Merger Plan
New York (UPI) - The Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad and the Erie Railroad have agreed on a merger plan that would create a rail system ranking among the top 10 in the industry, the two roads announced jointly today.

Public Defender Bill Passes House
Salem (UPI) - The Oregon House today passed a bill providing for paid public defenders in Oregon counties with more than 100,000 population. Vote was 41-17.

Traders Wait Move By Federal Reserve

New York (UPI) - Traders turned cautious on stocks today as they awaited federal reserve moves on credit which might come Thursday.

Industrials declined on average because of declines in steels, motors, some tires, chemicals, and oils. Rails and utilities held in a narrow area. A highly favorable earnings report for U. S. Steel was seized upon as an opportunity to take profits and the stock at its low showed a loss of more than 2 points. Other steels eased with it.

Such key issues as American Telephone, DuPont, Eastman Kodak, and Coca Cola fell 1 to 2 points. Texas Instruments at its low was off 7. Simonds Saw & Steel was down 4 and U. S. Gypsum and Kaiser Aluminum were down 3 or more. Goodyear declined 1 1/2 while General Tire rose a point. Zenith ranged over a 14 point course and late in the day showed a gain of 7 points.

Springfield Voters Favor Urban Project
Springfield, Ore. (UPI) - Voters here favored 1,103 to 961 Thursday an urban renewal project involving a grant from the federal government of \$779,949, about two-thirds of the cost of the project. The vote carried in four of seven city precincts.

The three-year project involves 150 acres, about one-tenth of the city, in the northwest section.

Sawmill Workers To Seek More Pay
Portland (UPI) - A total package of 30 1/2 cents an hour spread over two years will be sought in current negotiations with employers, an official of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union said today.

The union represents about 70,000 members in western states. Earl Hartley, executive secretary, said the program was approved by the union's executive board. It calls for:

- 1. A raise of 8 1/2 cents an hour or \$15 a month in the employer-paid health and welfare program.
- 2. A job classification adjustment equaling 5 cents an hour.
- 3. Six paid holidays equaling 5 cents an hour.
- 4. Vacations of two weeks after three years and three weeks after 10 years, equaling 2 cents an hour.
- 5. An employer-paid pension program costing 10 cents per hour.
