Officers Attend Information Session

Fifty law enforcement officers from southern Oregon counties discussed crime and racketeering with federal agents at the Medford city hall Tuesday.

J. E. Milnes, special federal bureau of investigation agent from Portland, led the discussions during the three-hour conference. He was assisted by two other FBI agents.

The meeting, Milnes explained, was the third of four being held in Oregon under a program designed to encourage a free exchange of information among federal, state and local law enforcement agencies. Subjects discussed included FBI operations in cooperation with other agencies and FBI facilities for scientific examination of evidence and identification work.

Officers attending represented the Oregon state police, Jackson county sheriff's office, and municipal agencies in Jackson, Josephine, Douglas and Klamath counties. Several Medford officers attended.
