

Patterson Misses TV Appearance

Indianapolis—UPI—Every boxing writer participating in a United Press International poll to pick the winner of the Floyd Patterson-Brian London heavyweight championship fight favored the defending title holder, but London had surprising strength in the number of writers who picked him to last more than seven rounds.

A total of 27 writers thought the fight would last more than 7 rounds.
Indianapolis—UPI—Wandering Floyd Patterson promised today to be on hand Friday night for the defense of his heavyweight crown against England's Brian London, although the champion's surprise absence Wednesday night caused cancellation of a special television show.

Twenty-two sports writers, assembled from Europe and the United States in a studio at Indianapolis station WFBM, were flabbergasted when 24-year-old Floyd failed to appear. The show was cancelled just before air time.
Jet-jawed London, ex-champion of the British Empire, kept the date for the telecast and was as dismayed as the writers and studio officials.

"Lor' bilmey," he said, "I 'opes he shows up Friday, eh what."
Manager Explains
Expressions of anguished disbelief swept the faces of the writers, primed to display their vast knowledge of the sweet science while interrogating champion and challenger.

Cus D'Amato, Patterson's manager, explained he had advised Patterson to skip the show and get to bed early because the champion, accompanied by a trainer, had been wandering about the classrooms of three schools here and one downtown gymnasium for five hours "and he was all tired out."
D'Amato added that he had not definitely promised Patterson's appearance for the TV show.

Moyer weighed 151 1/2 pounds—one pound lighter than Bahama.

Referee Eddie Volk scored it 99-95 for the slugger from Bimini, British West Indies. Judges Ralph Gruman and Andy Crabtree both had it 100-94 for Bahama.
It was the 53rd win for Bahama in 64 fights. For 21-year-old Moyer it was his second loss in 17 fights.
Streaked With Blood
By the end of the fight Moyer's face was streaked with blood, and he was bleeding profusely from the mouth. Bahama had only a slight cut over his left eye.

Entry Time Today For Roses Run

Louisville, Ky.—UPI—Entry time for the 85th Kentucky Derby came up at Churchill Downs today with the trainers of 17 horses ready to sign up their three-year-olds for a date with destiny Saturday in America's glamor race.
The horses range from Meadow Stable's First Landing, the 1958 juvenile champion who has won 13 races in 17 starts and \$462,642, to The Chosen One, who never has won a race at all. They include Silver Spoon, who gets a chance to become the second filly to win the Rose Run.

But they will not include any horse from famed Calumet Farm which has won the Derby seven times and would have had a chance at an unprecedented triumph had its On-And-On lived up to the hopes trainer Jimmy Jones once had for him.
Jones reluctantly withdrew his lone candidate Wednesday. Calumet Farm took the last two runnings with Iron Liege and Tim Tam.
Also expected to be named at a cost of \$250 each were Tony Lee, Sword, the entry of Open View and Atoll, Finnegan, Easy Spur, Troilus, Our Dad, Royal Orbit, Dunce, John Bruce, Rico Tesio, Festival King and Die Hard.

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HODGES RESIGNS AS IDAHO COACH

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EX-BOXER SENTENCED
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Cincinnati Placed On NCAA Suspension

New Orleans—UPI—University of Cincinnati and Gustavus Adolphus college were placed on probation Wednesday for alleged violations of NCAA rules.
The NCAA's policy-making council, ending a three-day spring meeting here, also voted to appoint a committee to study the growing U.S. collegiate practice of recruiting foreign athletes.
Cincinnati, which had one of the top basketball teams in the nation last season with high-scoring Oscar Robertson, was placed on indefinite suspension for giving aid to athletes in excess of NCAA limits.

Gustavus Adolphus, in St. Peter, Minn., was placed on one-year probation for participation in a non-approved post-season game. The college played Arizona State in the season last year to determine who would play in the Holiday Bowl in St. Petersburg, Fla. Post Season Ban
The school is banned from all post-season competition for a year.
Cincinnati's violation involved giving grant-in-aid scholarships to football and basketball players who also were participants in the school's cooperative education program. The program provides that students attend classes for part of the year and work the other part.
All-American Robertson is on the cooperative plan.
Walter Byers, NCAA executive director, said Wednesday that Cincinnati has until the Oct. 26-28 council meeting to conform to NCAA regulations. If at that time the school has made the necessary adjustments, the sports program will not be affected, he said.

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Bill Mazeroski's home run capped a three-run rally in the seventh inning that gave the Pirates their victory over the Giants.
The Reds shelled six Cub pitchers for 18 hits, including home runs by Frank Robinson, Gus Bell and Roy McMillan. Cincinnati turned the game into a rout with an eight-run rally in the second inning, during which 13 batters went to the plate.
Three Yankee home runs proved the undoing of the flustered White Sox. Mickey Mantle got the Yanks off winging with a two-run homer in the first inning. Hank Bauer homered in the fifth, and Bill Skowron connected in the seventh.
Rookie Larry Osborne and Frank Lary steered the Tigers to their rain-abbreviated triumph over the Orioles who suffered their first loss in five games. Osborne cracked out three hits in as many times up, including a two-run homer, while Lary gained his first win even though he gave up seven hits in the five innings.
The Senators ran afoul of too much Hector Lopez in their loss to the Athletics. After Washington tied the score at 6-6 with a three-run rally in the top of the ninth, Lopez drove his fourth run of the game with a single that scored Bill Tuttle and proved the clincher.
