Stocks Irregular; Steels, Motors Fade

New York (UPI) - Stocks moved irregularly today. Some of the top-ranking industrials were higher, notably DuPont which at its high was nearly 3 points above the previous close.

Steels faded as did motors after an early rise. Chemicals were highly irregular. Oils did nothing. Rails had several gainers and one utility put up the utility average after eight days of decline.

Railroad issues produced several strong spots, notably Atlantic Coast Line and Rock Island. Santa Fe rallied after a substantial decline.

Pfizer led a rise in the drugs with a gain of more than 5 points. Mercantiles advanced with Montgomery Ward at a new high and J. C. Penney up more than a point. Coppers were higher despite a dip in prices instituted by custom smelters.

Aluminum limited fell to more than a point to a new low when the company cut the dividend.

Goodyear rose 2 points in the tires. Goodrich was up more than 3 points in an irregular oil session.

Police Seek Man Who Snatched Purse

Medford police today sought an unidentified man who reportedly snatched an 80-year-old woman's purse containing \$100 in cash from the car seat beside her yesterday evening in front of Hawthorne Osteopathic clinic, 41 Hawthorne ave.

The victim, Edith Wood Davis, 128 South Holly st., told police the man approached her as she sat in her vehicle after leaving the clinic about 9 p.m. and asked her for a hand-out. She said he first asked for a quarter, then for a dollar, then two dollars.

As she reached for her purse to give him something so he would leave her alone, Mrs. Davis, a nurse at the clinic, said the man reached over her, grabbed the purse and dashed up the street.

Senate Restores Marine Strength

Washington (UPI) - The Senate shouted approval today of a provision aimed at forcing the administration to restore the Marine Corps to a strength of 200,000 men.

The limitation was tied as a "rider" amendment to a pending catch-all money bill. It paralleled a somewhat similar rider, approved Wednesday, which would force President Eisenhower to restore Army strength to 900,000.
