Europe Offers Many Festivals

Europe offers an almost unending series of music and drama festivals, flower festivals, religious pageants, trade fairs and sporting events this summer.

Music festivals will take place in Sussex, England; Brussels; Bergen, Norway; Vienna; Stockholm; Ludwigsburg, Germany; Aix-en-Provence, France; Edinburgh; Bayreuth and Salzburg.

The great Shakespeare festival at Stratford-on-Avon, April 7 to Nov. 28, features performances by Sir Laurence Olivier.

Flower shows in Paris; London; Lisse, Holland; Portugal; Denmark; Dortmund, Germany; Italy and Spain, will be held at various times during the summer months.

Religious pageantry will be in evidence in many cities of Europe. In Spain, the pageantry takes place at Corpus Christi, May 20, which precedes Spain's national Holy Week.

The International Stamp Exhibition in Hamburg, Germany, runs from May 22 to May 31. In Oslo, from June 11 to July 5, one of the largest shows ever held will find agricultural exhibits covering 100 acres.

In sports, international ski races take place in the Tyrol. Automobile and motorcycle road racing will be held at Francorchamps, Belgium, June 14 to July 5. The famous Tour de France bike race goes from June 25 to July 18. Wimbledon tennis starts June 22. All major cities will have football, gymnastic and track competitions throughout the season.

Psychiatrist on Police Force Recommended

Philadelphia, (Science Service)—A psychiatrist on the police force!

This is the surprising suggestion made to the American Psychiatric Association by Dr. David H. Wilson of the School of Criminology, University of California, Berkeley. Dr. Wilson devotes one-fourth of his time to the police department of Berkeley.

The police, Dr. Wilson explained, are often the first to see and have to deal with individuals who are emotionally disturbed or mentally ill. Brought in Early

"Probably the majority of disturbed juveniles and a good portion of disturbed adults are brought to the attention of the police," Dr. Wilson said, "long before the psychiatric problem is severe enough to indicate a purely medical disposition."

As part of his duties in the police department, Dr. Wilson helps in handling of arrested persons who are mentally ill, helps to see to it that those who need treatment receive it, and aids in the handling of disturbed prisoners in jail.

He also gives his attention to the men in blue themselves. Any candidate for the police force can be eliminated if, in the opinion of the psychiatrist, he shows indications of psychiatric disorder sufficient to interfere with the performance of his duties.

Helps Train Patrolmen
In addition, the psychiatrist helps train the individual patrolmen so that they will know how to handle disturbed citizens on their beats.

There are 90 American cities, Dr. Wilson said, which might utilize at least part time psychiatric services, and 20 of these might consider one or more full time psychiatrists.

Law Day Contest Winners Revealed

College Building Bill Re-Referred

Salem—UP—House bill 1,004, financing buildings for the State Board of Higher Education has been re-referred to the Joint Ways and Means committee for further study.

The bill involves some \$10.2 million in appropriations. Buildings would be built under the program with \$5.4 million in bonding and \$4.8 million in appropriations from the general fund.

Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene) called for re-referral of the bill under protest, stating he had been instructed to do

so by the Ways and Means Committee.

Changes in the bill would mean that work at Portland State College might be postponed.

In the Ways and Means Committee, Sen. Edwin Durno (R-Medford) said he wanted to continue science buildings only at the medical and dental schools.

But at the same time House joint resolution 12 was passed which provides for \$24 million additional bonding capacity for higher education.

Endurance Fliers Leave Klamath

Klamath Falls—UP—Endurance pilots Gene Tanner and Lew Becker of Seattle got off the ground here Wednesday in their light plane for another try at the 64-day endurance record.

They immediately headed the small plane for Nevada. Last week the plane was forced to land here because of engine difficulties. Before they landed they had been in the air for more than 11 days.

Airplanes To Fit Airports Possible

Portland—UP—Airplane manufacturers may be forced to build planes which fit airports.

That's what Brig. Gen. Marcus F. Cooper, assistant administrator of the Federal Aviation Agency, told members of the Airport Operators Council Wednesday.

He said that there is a growing feeling in the FAA that it will not certify any aircraft with weight which will require runways longer

than 10,500 feet. The general said that in many cases now the speed of the jet is lost because of the distance of airports to cities.

He blamed that situation on manufacturers who are trying to build faster, longer-range planes to meet the payload demands of airline competition.

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
