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Retreats Held By Laymen May Double in Year

Washington - (UPI) - Shortly before 5 o'clock last Friday afternoon, four officials of the U. S. State Department left their offices in Washington, got into a car and drove to a secluded old house on the banks of the Potomac about 10 miles south of the city.

They were joined there by similar groups from the Defense Department, Congress and other government agencies - 20 men in all. They spent the entire week end in the old house.

A spy peering through the unguarded windows could have seen them engaged in long, earnest conversations. But if a foreign agent did get wind of this rendezvous, he can relax.

The government officials were not talking about high strategy. They were talking about the Christian faith and its relevance to their lives. Their meeting was a "retreat" conducted by the noted Quaker philosopher, Dr. Elton Trueblood.

Growing Fast
Week end retreats for laymen are a relatively new and increasingly important aspect of U. S. religious life. More than 1,000 organized retreats were conducted in this country last year. And the movement is growing so rapidly the number easily may double this year.

This trend is heartening to Dr. Trueblood, former religious director of the U. S. Information Agency who now serves as professor of philosophy at Earlham college, Richmond, Ind.

"The retreat movement is one of the most genuine features of the current religious revival," he said in an interview. "It is capturing the interest of laymen from coast to coast. It seems to meet a deeply felt need of contemporary Christians."

Need To Reflect
Trueblood pointed out that retreats are not a modern invention. Jesus conducted frequent retreats for his disciples. He taught that even good works, such as healing the sick, must be laid aside occasionally to withdraw from the world for a period of prayer, study and meditation.

Modern Christians, especially men and women who are carrying heavy responsibilities, particularly need this kind of spiritual refreshment according to Trueblood.

"People today are so caught up in the immediacies of life that they have little chance to reflect on the ultimates," he said. "They need to get away from everyday pressures - from home and business - and the telephone - long enough to take their bearings."

"The purpose of a retreat is to deepen your life both intellectually and spiritually so that you can go back and perform your daily work more adequately. It gives you a chance to see who you are and where you are going, and why."

Ministers Have Problems Too, Recent Survey Shows

If you could take a close-up look at your minister's private life, what would you find?

You'd find that he has many worrisome family problems - and that most of them are caused, unintentionally, by parishioners who expect too much of him.

A revealing glimpse into the "off-stage" life of the typical Protestant clergyman is provided by a survey just completed by the Office of Family Education Research of the United Presbyterian church. It covered nearly 2,800 Presbyterian ministers, chosen at random from all parts of the country.

Their biggest personal headache is too little time at home. Family life suffers.

Church and community activities make such exorbitant demands on the average minister's time that he has little left over to spend with his family. His wife and children complain, with justice, that they rarely get a chance to do things together like a normal family. And even when they do plan a day or an evening together, it is likely to be interrupted either by an emergency call or by one of the innumerable functions at which the pastor is expected to "put in an appearance."

The minister's second biggest problem, according to the survey, is that there is almost no one, outside of his own family, with whom he can let down his hair and be himself. He feels imprisoned within a stereotyped "role" that people expect him to play. He is not allowed, like other men, to have days on which he feels cross, irritable and grumpy. He must even beware of feeling lighthearted, lest someone mistake it for impiety.

It should be noted that this problem of being "always on parade" is far more pronounced among the pastors of small town and rural churches than among ministers of big city and suburban churches.

Among Lowest Paid
A closely related complaint of many pastors is that their wives and children are expected to be "different." Many a layman holds up for the minister's family a standard of perfection which he would never think of applying to his own family.

The ministers listed in fourth place the personal problem that a layman might have expected them to mention first. That is difficulty in making ends meet financially.

Clergymen are the lowest-paid professional men in America. A recent study which covered ministers in several major Protestant denominations showed their average salary is about \$4,500 a year. It also indicated that two-thirds of the nation's Protestant ministers are in debt. Many of them reported their wives have had to go to work to bring even an austere family budget into balance.
