

Tillamook Cheese Factory Has Strike

Tillamook, Ore. — (UPI) — A wage dispute involving some 18 employees of the fluid milk department resulted in a strike against the Tillamook cheese factory Thursday.

About 200 men were reported off work. Farmers who brought milk to the plant stayed and processed it. Other departments of the factory were closed.

An all-day meeting between union and management representatives ended without agreement, according to Deale Dixon, manager of the Tillamook County Creamery association.

There are about 18 million fishermen and 15 million hunters who buy licenses annually in the United States.

The Medical Roundup

Young Children in Hospitals
I recently read a book on children in hospitals published by Dr. James Robertson of England (Basic Books) in which the doctor does a splendid job of pointing out the many psychic problems of the child who has to go to a hospital — often with only a faint idea of why he is going, and why he is being separated from his parents. As Dr. Robertson says, children ought to be kept out of hospitals as much as possible; but if they have to go, then certain things ought to be done to make matters easier for them. First, if the child is old enough to understand, the parents should be frank and honest, and should tell him what is going to happen and why. If he is going to have to suffer pain, they should say so; but there should be a strong note of hope that he will get better.

As all directors of hospitals should know, one of the most distressing things about admitting a child is that the mother is sent home and the child is sent up to a floor where he knows no one. It is immensely easier on the child, the mother and the nurses if the mother is allowed to go up with the child and to help the nurse put him to bed. It would be better yet if the mother were to be allowed to stay with the child, and this is what Dr. Robertson advises. As he says, many head nurses will have a fit about this, and will prophesy that the mother will interfere with the work on the floor, but Robertson says that the idea of leaving the mother with the child has been tried out in England, and it has worked. The mother has not gotten in the way of the nurses, and she has not interfered with the work on the floor. Because of the mothers' having been with her child, he or she has been much easier to handle. The next best thing to this is allowing a mother to come and see the child whenever she wants to. Mother Should Go.

One of the cruellest things we do in America is to send a child up to the operating room all by himself. The mother should go with the child at least up to the operating room floor, where, perhaps in a special room, the

child could be anesthetized while the mother is present. Then the sleeping child could be wheeled into the operating room. As I have said before, it is time that hospital authorities began to think of these things. They ought to realize that when parents and children are left with very distressing memories of what happened in the hospital, this does not make for good public relations. As I said recently, and shall keep saying, a few fine, kindly women working as hostesses in a hospital could quickly more than earn their salaries.
