

Tomy Lee Wins Roughest Running of Kentucky Derby Since 1933

San Francisco Takes First Place Lead In National League

The San Francisco Giants took over the National league lead by percentage points when they defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 8-5, Saturday with a 17-hit attack that included a pair of homers by Willie Kirkland and one by Hobie Landrith.

Kirkland hit his first homer off loser Joe Jay and connected again off reliever Bob Brownbridge in the sixth. Landrith wound up the Giants' scoring with a two-run blast in the ninth.

Back-to-Back Homers
The Braves hit three home runs of their own, but two of them came too late to do any good. Eddie Mathews hit a two-run homer off starter Jack Sanford in the fifth and pinch-hitters Mickey Vernon and Johnny O'Brien hit back-to-back homers off Stu Miller in the ninth.

Willie Mays and Andre Rodgers collected four hits apiece to help Sanford to his fourth straight victory.

Roberto Clemente's single with the bases loaded in the ninth gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 2-1 triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Clemente, who also had two doubles, delivered the winning blow off Howard Nunn, but Lindy McDaniel suffered the loss. Southpaw Harvey Haddix held the Cards to five hits and gained his second victory.

The Chicago Cubs chased left-hander Seth Morehead with a four run rally in the first inning and then hung on to lick the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-3.

Conley Fans 11
Lanky Gene Conley took over after Morehead was battered and struck out 11 batters, but the Cubs got all they needed in the first inning when Ernie Banks doubled with the bases full and scored on Johnny Gory's triple.

Don Jordan, Moyer Vie On July 10

Portland - (UPI) - Promoter Tommy Moyer announced his nephew, Denny Moyer, would fight Champion Don Jordan for the welterweight title here July 10.

The promoter said final decision on a local site would not be made until next week. It might be indoors at the Oregon Centennial building or outdoors at the Portland Meadows race track.

Denny, only 20, is unbeaten in 20 fights and has decided to fight Gaspar Ortega and Vince Martinez in his last two bouts, Jan. 2 and Feb. 17.

The fight probably will be televised with Portland and a 200-mile radius blacked out. Moyer indicated.



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First Foul Claim in Modern Run

Louisville, Ky.—(UPI)—In the roughest running of the Kentucky Derby since Broker's Tip and Head Play in 1933, Tomy Lee won the \$163,750 Kentucky Derby Saturday even though Willie Shoemaker, his rider, had given up hope more than a quarter of a mile from the finish.

The game little English-bred colt had to fight back twice from apparent defeat and then survive the first foul claim in modern Derby history before he officially was declared the winner of America's greatest horse race.

Jockey Willie Boland, who rode Sward Dancer to second place in one of the most dramatic finishes in the history of the Rose Run, said Tomy Lee repeatedly bumped his mount in the desperate dash that carried Tomy Lee to his hard earned victory.

'Moved Real Nice'

"I was bumped about five times by the winner," he indignantly claimed after the race. "I was fourth on the back side and he (Sward Dancer) started to move real nice. I was about a length on him (Tomy Lee) when he started to bump. As I went by 'Shoe' he shouted 'I want you win it.' Then he passed me right on the money (at the finish)," he added grimly. Shoemaker already had taken Tomy Lee into the winner's circle when the foul claim was announced. The traditional blanket of red roses were removed as the stewards studied films of the race.

"I don't know what's gonna happen. It was around the eighth pole. We were bumping a little but he was coming on me," said Shoemaker. "I thought that other horse had me beaten up around the turn. Yes, I did tell Bill I hoped he would win it as he went by," he added.

No Visible Contact

The stewards said the films showed that Tomy Lee twice drifted out on the turn but there was no visible contact. At a point just outside the eighth pole the outside horse, Sward Dancer, was shown drifting in and contact was made several times. Both horses drifted out near the finish as if they were a team, the stewards reported.

Shoemaker won the Kentucky Derby with Swaps in 1955 but blew the 1957 running when he misjudged the finish line while riding Gallant Man. This time he scored with a "foreigner" who joined Omar Khayyam as the second outsider to win.

Christopher T. Chenery's First Landing, the 1958 juvenile champion, was third, two and a quarter lengths farther back with Eddie Arcaro on his back.

First Landing was a length ahead of Mrs. Jacques Braunstein's Royal Orbit at the finish. Tomy Lee is the cheapest horse ever bought by Fred Turner Jr., of Midland, Tex., who purchased him for \$6,762 at the 1956 Newmarket sales in December, 1956.

It was one of the fastest derbies in the history of the first of the Triple Crown classics. For Tomy Lee blazed across the finish line in 2:02-1/5, the seventh fastest running of the race and only four-fifths of a second off the track record set by Whirlaway in 1941.

Tomy Lee paid \$9.40, \$4.80 and \$5.80. Sward Dancer returned \$9 and \$8.20 while First Landing paid \$4.

Burns Leads Crater In Track Decision

Central Point — John Burns was the star of the show in the rain and cold here yesterday afternoon as Crater high jumper and field contestant defeated Ashland 82 to 34 in a dual ruckus.

Burns won the javelin with what is believed to be one of the top throws in the country this year. He also nabbed the high jump and the 880-yard run. His spear heave of 202 feet 3 inches into the wind smashed the school record of 198 feet set by Larry Smith, a couple of years ago. He high jumped 6 feet 2 inches, a half-inch off the school record and ran the half-mile in 2:08.2, a creditable time in the miserable weather.

Varsity, Bennett Win Two
Crater runners, jumpers and throwers took nine first places and Ashland four. Kerman Bennett was a double triumph for the Comets taking the broad jump and 220-yard dash. Bob Voris was victor in the high hurdles and 440 for Ashland. Other Grizzly winners were Art Kiser in the shot put and Brahm Woodell in the low hurdles.

First placers for the Comets included Jim Eldred in the pole vault, Clark Cutting in the 100, Don Ryan in the mile and Glen Cote in the discus.

The Comets swept the high jump and javelin.

Burns is the No. 2 ranking javelin chucker in southern Oregon and has pressed national record holder, Glen Cunningham, Grants Pass, in a number of meets. The two will be rivals next Saturday in a meet at Central Point.

MHS Drops Two Games To Weed

Weed, Calif., grabbed both ends of a baseball doublebill from Medford high at Weed on Saturday.

Scores were 5 to 0 and 4 to 3. The Californians punched over all their runs in the third inning of the first game and tallied in the extra sixth inning to win the second game.

Weed got a double by Dennis Rosetto, singles by Doug DeBartolo, Larry Barberi, and Jim Lemos and the help of three bases on balls and three errors in the big inning of the opener. Medford had two runners on base in each of the first three innings but could not muster clutch slugging to get runs across.

The Dean brothers, Cal and Lowell swatted all but one of Medford's six hits in the starter. Cal socked three for four and Lowell two for three. Dave Lemos whiffed seven batters and walked two in his six-hit pitching for the Cougars.

Dennis Barr gave up four hits, walked six and struck out five in 2 2/3 innings of hurling for Medford. Tom Laurence came on in relief in the third frame. He retired Weed on one pitch when the batter popped out.

Bases Filled
In the sixth canto of the second mix, Weed loaded the bases on two walks and an infield single with one out. A rap to pitcher Laurence bounced from his glove. He threw to first, his only chance then for a putout. The Weed runner who had been perched on third got home for the winning run.

Medford went into the bottom of the fifth inning with a 3 to 1 gap but Weed got the bases filled and a looping single by Bob Zelundano poked home two runs to tie up the game. Laurence, in his second relief role, had replaced Jerry Anderson on the hill for the Black Tornado in the fifth with the bases full and one out. He fanned one batter before Zelundano's hit.

Anderson gave up three hits, walked five and struck out three in his mound tenure. Laurence was reached for two hits. He gave two bases on balls and had two strikeouts. Pitcher Fruzza held Medford to four hits. The Tornado scored two runs in the fourth inning. Bob Quinney drove one home and another crossed the plate on an error. Bob Pond banged in another runner in the fifth inning.

The Black Tornado netters spilled the strong Klamath Union High school club on the local courts 4 to 3. Victory completed the conference slate for Medford with a 5-1 record. Klamath Falls, which tipped the Tornado 5 to 2 at the start of the campaign, was 4-1 in the stand-Grants Pass to play.

This is the first season since 1955 that Medford has been at the top of the net heap.

Medford will play a non-league match with Yreka, Calif., here on Monday and on Friday will be host to the district tournament.
