Portland Splits Two

Portland — (UPI) — Four Portland errors, two by shortstop and former Padre Clarence Moore, proved costly Friday night as San Diego beat the Beavers, 5-2, in the nightcap of a day-night opener. Portland took the afternoon game, 8-6.

A crowd of 6,233 saw San Diego bang out 10 hits while Steve Riddick and Russ Heman held Portland to seven.

For the double opener Portland had a total attendance of 12,011.

Portland was without slugger third baseman George Freese who sustained a chipped finger on his left hand when hit by a pitch in the first game. Freese, who led the PCL in home runs with seven, will be out of the lineup about 10 days.

Appropriations Passed by House

Salem — (UPI) — The Oregon House Friday approved appropriations of \$1,300,000 for the state emergency board and \$326,000 for operation of the governor's office during the next biennium. They now go to the Senate.

The emergency board appropriation was the same as recommended by the Joint Ways and Means committee.

The executive budget was a cut of \$25,300 from the amount requested. Rep. Victor Attiyeh (R-Portland) charged the cuts were "arbitrary" and moved that the bill be returned to Ways and Means. This motion was defeated.

Car-Truck Crash Kills 1, Injures 4

Hood River — (UPI) — A young man from Portland was killed and four other persons were injured late Friday night in a car-truck collision about two miles east of here on highway 30.

The sheriff's office said David McWaters, 21, of Portland, was killed.

Three passengers in his car were injured — Mike Burpee, William Barendrick Jr., Portland, and Logan Ridehalgh, also Portland. They were hospitalized here. Ridehalgh and Burpee were listed in serious condition.

Also injured was the truck driver, John Chapman, Hood River.

The Washington Senators exploded for five homers to

bury the last-place Detroit Tigers, 15-3. It was Detroit's 15th loss in 17 games.

Harmon Killebrew hit two homers for Washington and Jim Lemon contributed a grand-slam wallop during a six-run rally off Ray Narleski in the fourth. Roy Sievers and Ron Samford also homered for the Senators. Russ Kemmerer held the Tigers to seven hits in recording his fourth victory.

Knuckelbarger Hoyt Wilhelm pitched the Baltimore Orioles to a 3-1 win over the Kansas City Athletics. Catcher Gus Triandos, who has a tough time behind the plate any time Wilhelm pitches, belted a two-run homer off Ray Herbert in the fourth for the Orioles' margin of victory. Freighter Captain Charges Neglect
Vancouver, B. C. — (UPI) — The captain of a Norwegian freighter charged yesterday that a Vancouver city fireboat five miles away refused to give assistance when his ship was swept by an explosion and fire Friday night within sight of land.

Five crewmen were injured, two critically, as the fire, fed by lumber and 700 tons of fuel oil, raged aboard the 5,300-ton freighter Ferngulf for nearly four hours.

Vancouver officials said that city equipment could not be used to aid the stricken freighter because it was outside the city limits.

The fire was brought under control with the help of volunteers from the Canadian destroyer escorts Saguenay and Assiniboine and the U.S. submarine Capitane, docked at Vancouver. They rushed to the scene in small craft within minutes after the S.O.S. was received from the freighter.
