

'Jewett Days' in Central Point Proclaimed by Mayor F. Mason

Central Point - Friday and Saturday, May 8 and 9, have been proclaimed "Jewett Days" in Central Point by Mayor Freeman Mason.

Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Jewett will be honored in activities on those two days. Jewett is completing his 37th year as superintendent of School District 6C. Mrs. Jewett has been a second grade teacher here for 14 years. They will retire from their school posts on June 30.

The mayor's proclamation reads: "Whereas, Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Jewett have been residents of the City of Central Point for a number of years and have served the city and the community through their work in the schools, we feel they should be recognized on the occasion of their retirement."

Activities Schedule

The schedule of activities for the "Jewett Homecoming Days" has been planned by an executive committee of school

officials and other district residents.

Highlight will be a Friday night program in the Crater High school gymnasium with Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, delivering the main address. Registration and signing of a guest book is set for 7 p.m. with the Crater band to open the program at 8 p.m. There will be an introduction of classes and faculty members from 1922 through 1959. A gift will be presented to the Jewetts.

During the morning and early afternoon on Friday, Mr. Jewett will be honored by assemblies at the various schools of the district. Central Point Junior high trackmen will meet South Grants Pass in a meet at 2:30 p.m. at the Crater field.

Saturday will be alumni day. Registration and get-togethers are planned for 10 a.m. with a potluck picnic and entertainment at noon. Crater high will meet Ashland and Grants Pass in a 2:30 p.m. track meet. Individual class reunions are set for evening.

Graduate At Salem

The Jewetts are graduates of Salem High school. Mr. Jewett was graduated from Willamette university. He taught at Cottage Grove, Sweet Home, Medford, Butte Falls and Talent before beginning his duties at Central Point in the summer of 1922. He was superintendent at Sweet Home, Butte Falls and Talent. Mrs. Jewett attended Willamette and Oregon College of Education and taught schools in and near Salem prior to her marriage. She has been a Central Point teacher since 1945.

In addition to handling administrative duties, Superintendent Jewett taught high school classes during most of his years at Central Point. He coached basketball, track and baseball in the 1920s and basketball again in 1932-33 and 1943-44 school years.

Since the late 1940s his time has been devoted to administrative work. Consolidations have enlarged the district. Central Point and Agate merging in 1946 and Gold Hill, Sams Valley, Table Rock, Willow Springs and Tolo joining with District 6 in 1949.

The Jewetts have two daughters and three sons. Daughters are Mrs. Gene Snook, Central Point, and Mrs. William Klope, Coburg, and the sons are Richard and Alan, Medford, and Harold (Hal), Springfield.

National FFA Head Discusses Program At Crater Banquet

Central Point-Adin Hester, Canby, Ore., national president of the Future Farmers of America, discussed the organization at the annual Crater High school FFA chapter banquet Thursday night.

Hester won the national public speaking contest in Kansas City, Mo., in 1956.

About 300 persons also heard Jim Ross, Marshfield, state treasurer, discuss farming and aspects for the future for farm organizations, leadership and cooperative associations.

Six National Foundation awards were presented to chapter members. They were to Charles Lopez in farm safety, Mike Redmond in farm mechanics, Dave Redmond in farm electricity, Jim Frink in soil and water conservation, Don Denning in public speaking and Dave Root in dairying.

Don Ryan received his star farmer award. The award is presented the boy who shows outstanding ability in the six fields in which national foundation awards are presented. Ryan has an investment of about \$4,000 in vocational agricultural, and showed the grand champion and finished first in the beef showmanship and advanced beef showmanship at the Jackson county 4-H-FFA fair last year.

Donors of awards for the foundation are the Grange Coop, Central Point Pharmacy, Alexander Hardware in Central Point, Central Point Lumber company, Gilman's Dairy, and Deaver Tractor company.

Honorary members of the Crater chapter named at the banquet are Leslie Gilman, Thurman Barnes, Gilbert Mack and Bert Caster, all of

Central Point. Honorary members are those persons who assist FFA members in their projects.

The Crater chapter soil judging team composed of Dave Foote, Leon Sherman and Don Ross won third place in the district contest in Roseburg recently, it was announced at the banquet. Bill MacFarland is advisor for the team.

John Caster, in presenting the progress report, said construction is now under way in the shop at Crater High school for quarters to house FFA files and as a conference room.

Safety Council Gets Check from Firm

The Medford Safety Council has received a check from the Osborne-Kemper-Thomas company, a calendar firm in Cincinnati, Ohio, at the request of the Medford police department.

Man Pleads Guilty In Municipal Court

Joe Francis Dubuque, 49, of general delivery, Gold Hill, pleaded guilty in Medford municipal court Friday to driving while under the influence of intoxicating beverages and received a \$50 fine and a 5-day jail sentence.

Police reported arresting Dubuque Thursday following an accident in which his vehicle struck from behind one operated by Melvin Lee Saltmarsh, 512 Benson st., on North Riverside ave. at Jackson st. Both vehicles received considerable damage, police said, and Beverly Lou Saltmarsh, 23, a passenger in her husband's vehicle, was shaken up.

Dubuque was also fined for two traffic citations in connection with the accident, according to court records. He

was fined \$10 for following too close and \$5 for having no operator's license in his possession.

Meanwhile, police said, Dubuque is wanted by the Jackson county sheriff's office on a felony warrant charging him with failure to provide for his wife. The warrant sets bail at \$1,500.

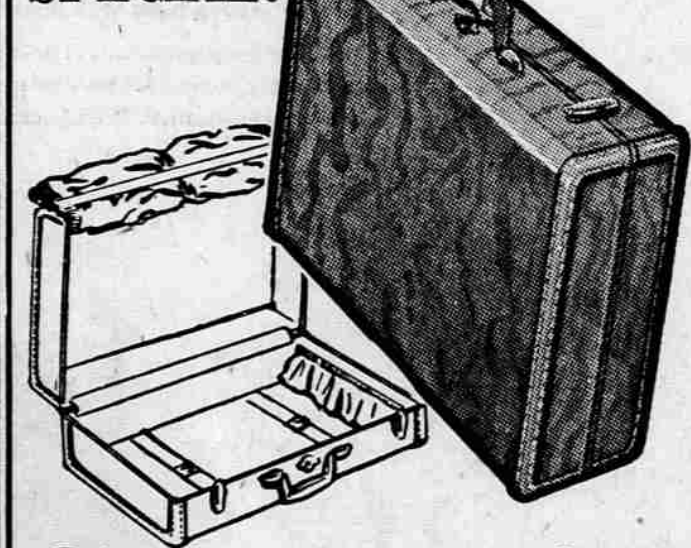
TIDE MAGAZINE sheds a tear over the demise of the once proud Packard automobile—and the slogan that helped to make it famous: "Ask the man who owns one." James Ward Packard originated that slogan himself in 1902—three years after he had built, by hand, the first automobile that bore his name, in Warren, O.

A prospect wrote Packard for a circular describing his new, one-cylinder chariot. Packard didn't have any, so he wrote back, "Ask the man who owns one"—and there you are. The Packard changed through the years—but the slogan didn't. It was used in the first auto ad ever printed in color—and featured again in a gold and white catalogue which cost the company \$35 a copy in 1907. R. I. P.

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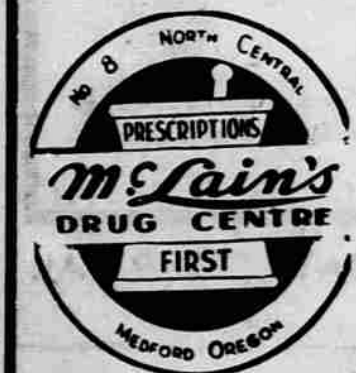
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
