

Patterson Knocks Out London In 11th To Retain Ring Toga

New York — (AP) — Heavyweight Champion Floyd Patterson, fresh from his 11th-round knockout over England's Brian London, sounded the warning today, "I'll be 100 per cent sharp for the big fight in June."

The 24-year-old champion from Rockville Center, N. Y., said "I was only 55 per cent of myself against London last night and 25 per cent of myself last August against Roy Harris — but I'll be 100 per cent against Ingemar Johansson in June."

Floyd appeared ring-rusty Friday night at the Fair Grounds Coliseum although he gave the former British Empire champion such a lop-

sided beating that only one ring official gave Brian a round.

London, bleeding from his right cheek and the mouth, was counted out by Referee Frank Sikora at 51 seconds of the 11th round, when the game Englishman was on the floor for the second time. In the 10th round a right to the chin had driven him to one knee, but the bell ending the round rang at the count of five.

Will Receive Guarantee
London will receive \$60,000, plus trans-Atlantic expenses for his licking. London's guarantee comes out of Patterson's total purse.

Promoter Al Farb announced a paid attendance of

10,088 and a gross gate of \$122,855. The net gate was \$103,111. Patterson's 60 per cent of the net gate was \$61,866. He also receives the total TV radio fee of \$175,000, giving him a total purse of \$236,866. After paying London's \$60,000 and expenses, he should wind up with approximately \$170,000.

Floyd's fight with European champion Johansson at New York's Yankee Stadium, June 25, is expected to draw a million-dollar gate.

Although Floyd was far from sensational Friday night as he registered his 22nd straight victory and his fourth defense of the crown, he had the distinction of being the first man to knock rugged London off his feet.

The challenger weighed 208 pounds to the champion's 182.

Staggering in Every Round
Patterson had the artillery, but his eight-months of inactivity since he knocked out Roy Harris last Aug. 18, made him miss the target often — particularly when he went all out with Sunday punches in trying to put his man away. They grazed and they missed — and on two misses, the champion almost fell down.

Nevertheless, he gave dark-haired London a terrific beating, particularly to the body. And he had the iron man from Blackpool, England, staggering at least once in nearly every round.

The third session was London's best. He knocked the champion back onto his heels with a "sneaker right" to the chin and fought well.

It was Floyd's 22nd straight victory and his 34th in 35 fights. It was also his 16th knockout in his last 17 bouts and the 26th kayo in his heavyweight career.

London suffered his fifth defeat in 27 starts.

Tornado Spikers Drub Lava Bears; GP Here Tuesday

Bend — Medford high's Black Tornado trackmen, in a martyr-like performance in snow and blow here yesterday, wrestled 12 first places and tied for another to overpower Bend's Lava Bears 94 1/3 to 28 2/3 in a dual affair.

While the Tornado won with ease against the Bears, it anticipates much stiffer competition on Tuesday night. Medford will entertain Grants Pass in the first evening meet in a number of years at the Tornado stadium. Grants Pass, which won the Rogue relays, is recognized as the 1959 track power in southern Oregon and has a real depth of talent.

The Tornado swept three events Saturday, the shot put, the 220-yard dash and the discus in a meet which saw the central Oregon hosts gain only one clear cut first place. Shine in Broad Jump.

Finest showing of the day was the broad jump which Len Griggs won for Medford with 22 feet 5 1/2 inches.

George Hawes of Bend was second with 21-8 and George Koch of Medford was not far behind with 21-5. Both Hawes and Koch leaped 22-2 but "scratched."

Griggs was the afternoon's lone double winner. He also claimed the 220-yard dash. Walt Ayres, Medford, took the high hurdles and tied for top honors in the high jump with Bill Charley of Medford and Chambers of Bend.

Ells was the Bend man with an unshared first. He won the low hurdles.

Mike Murray, who copped the shot put for Medford with 53-9, was not up to his best but Tom Bortis with 46-1 for second and Lynn Knight with 44-5 for second produced their best marks.

Medford winners included Koch in the javelin, Don Peck in the 100, Roy Smith in the mile in the heaviest snowfall, Ron Reich in the 440, Larry Nored in the discus, Bob Rix in the 800, Skip Bennett in the pole vault and the relay team of Peck, Phil Humphreys, Reich and Griggs.

Hail and rain fell in addition to the snow.

Both Southern Oregon conference baseball double-headers planned for yesterday were rained out. A heavy storm just before game time washed out the action which had been planned between Ashland and Crater highs at Cheney field here. The Grants Pass-Klamath Falls tussles were postponed because of wet grounds and threat of rain at Grants Pass. Weather became more than a threat in the afternoon. Ashland and Crater will play on May 19 and Klamath and Grants Pass on May 9 in make-ups.

All prep baseball games scheduled for this area on Friday were wiped out by wet and cold weather or forfeit.

Weather victims were Medford versus Klamath Falls, Ashland versus Grants Pass, Eagle Point against Klamath junior varsity and Prospect against Butte Falls.

Talent forfeited to Jacksonville and will also default the game slated for next Friday with Prospect. This action gives Prospect the Jackson County B league mantle.

Medford is rescheduled at Klamath Falls on May 19 and Ashland may vie at Grants Pass some time this week. Prospect is to go to Butte Falls this Tuesday.

An earlier postponement will be made up on Tuesday when Klamath is to play Crater at Cheney field at the south edge of Medford.

Central Point — After running all over Jackson county yesterday Southern Oregon college finally found a field and beat Portland State twice 4-3 and 4-1 in a baseball doubleheader on the Crater High school diamond.

Crater field was the fourth try in an effort to find a field that was playable in the wet week end. Now any combination of two Eastern Oregon wins will give the Red Raiders their second consecutive Oregon Collegiate conference baseball title. SOC is 8-1 in the OCC.

SOC came from behind in the first game to score three runs in the fifth inning on only one hit to gain enough margin to win.

Dave D'Olivo got credit for victory in the opening game and Don Vannice copped honors in the second as each Raider hurler struck out seven and walked only one.

Dietz Shines
Jimmy Dietz was the hustle and bustle of the day as he got two hits in two official trips to the plate. He was hit by a pitched ball twice, walked three times, and scored four times. To top off the performance the Raider second sacker stole home with the tying run in the first game.

In the three game series Dietz had five hits in six trips and PSC managed to get him out only once. Dietz raised his batting average from .324 to a bulging .399.

Dietz scored first in the first game after being hit and taking second on a wild pitch before going to third on an infield out. Larry Maurer then doubled in the run.

In the fifth D'Olivo got on by an error and Dietz walked with Jim McAbee safe on a sacrifice to load the bases. Maurer grounded out but a run scored and the two pitches later Dietz stole home. Phil Sword followed with the only hit of the inning for the third and winning tally.

Score in Fourth
Portland State got its runs on three singles and a two run double in the fourth to take their brief lead.

Dietz scored in the first again in the second game after again being hit. He went to third on McAbee's single and was forced home on two consecutive walks.

SOC got two more in the third on two walks, a sacrifice fly after a wild pitch had put runners on second and third. Another walk and a pickoff throw going into center field scored the final run of the third inning.

The last run in the sixth by the Red Raiders came when Dietz singled and McAbee tripled down the line.
