**More Recovery Roads Theme Of National Hospital Week**

The theme for National Hospital Week, May 10-16, will be "More Roads to Recovery" emphasizing the many hospital services and how they are constantly expanding to provide better patient care.

At Sacred Heart hospital, National Hospital Day, Tuesday, May 12, will be observed by a career program, directed toward senior high school students of the city and expanded to include Crater in Central Point, Eagle Point, Talent and Phoenix High schools.

Selected students in each school have been invited to the hospital from 1 to 4 p.m. that day. Scientific lectures, demonstrations and the viewing of pertinent films will initiate them in the intricate work done in the more specialized departments of a hospital. Physicians and professional hospital personnel will be on hand to answer questions pertaining to hospital careers.

**Refreshments Planned**

Refreshments will be served at the conclusion of the program and literature will be available for distribution.

Too little is known in most communities of the fascinating facets of medicine and nursing and encouraging interest in this field is of prime importance at a time when hospital personnel is at a premium, according to Sister Luke of The Savior, hospital administrator. The Tuesday program will be aimed at acquainting high school students with the varied opportunities for careers in medicine, she said.

National Hospital Week will be recognized in Sacred Heart hospital by the observance of Personnel Day May 14.

**Special Recognition**

On that day, between 2:30 and 3:30 p.m., the activities of the hospital will be suspended, so to speak, allowing the personnel to receive special recognition from their hospital for the essential part they play in its functioning.

The highlight of the program will be the presentation of service pins to 14 employees for years of tenure ranging from 10 to 20 years. Mrs. E. Harwood will be cited as being the senior employee having joined Sacred Heart hospital in 1936. The presentation of pins will be made by Sister Luke. Mrs. Anne Brooks, director of personnel, will introduce those honored.

An entertaining program will follow and refreshments will be served.

**Blood From Persons Burned in Fires May Help Others**

Washington, (Science Service)—Blood from persons who have recovered from serious burns may be "banked" some day to save other burn victims who are fighting for their lives.

A new treatment was given to seven children badly burned last Dec. 1 in the tragic fire at Our Lady of the Angels School, a large parochial grade school in Chicago. Six of the children showed improvement. One of them had been described earlier as "hopeless." The seventh, and most severely burned child, died.

**Changes Observed**

Trial of the technique was suggested by Dr. Sol Roy Rosenthal, director of the Institute for Tuberculosis Research at the University of Illinois' College of Medicine. Dr. Rosenthal, currently under contract to the U.S. Navy, has been studying human blood.

He suggested that some of the most severely burned children be given blood donated by persons who had recently recovered from bad burns. This was done, and "dramatic changes" were observed overnight, the Office of Naval Research told Science Service here.

The child who died had Rh negative blood and received only 150 milliliters of "convalescent burn plasma," as it is called. The other children received generally more than this. The blood was gathered in the Washington and Chicago areas on an emergency basis for use in the trial.

Dr. Rosenthal believes the rationale behind this treatment is that a severe burn results in a release of toxic, or poisonous, material into the blood stream. This toxic material is injurious to the remote tissues of the body. The badly burned person produces antibodies slowly, often too slowly to combat the effects of these toxins on the blood and blood vessels.

Such a person may die from the toxic effects of the burn, whether or not he is severely burned. To combat this threat to the satisfactory progress of the patient, blood taken from other persons who have recovered after being badly burned is thought to be useful because it contains high amounts of antibodies against the toxins.
