Killed in the other car involved in the accident was Fern Peterson, eight-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Peterson of the San Francisco Bay area. She is survived also by one brother and three sisters.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams and Skip had driven to Davis after school Friday to visit Williams' grandparents, and were en route home, with Skip at the wheel, when their car hit a spot of ice on the road and spun into the north bound lane, striking the Peterson car head-on.

Hydrant Colors Bring Protests

Portland—(UP)—City Commissioner Buck Grayson, a former all-American basketball player at Oregon State college, backed down today on the colors being painted on Portland's 7,500 fire hydrants.

Grayson is in charge of the hydrants, which were being painted orange and black—his alma mater's colors. About 400 hydrants had been painted that way when his office got so many calls that he called it off.

Grayson said he assumed most callers were supporters of the University of Oregon, where the colors are green and yellow.

He ordered the rest of the hydrants painted a "neutral" color—orange and green, leaving an out for different neighborhoods to use their own color scheme.

Van Nuys, Calif.—(UP)—Actor Guy Mitchell was acquitted Wednesday of misdemeanor charges of battery and disturbing the peace arising out of his ground-rolling tussle with a lumberyard man.

Actor Jose Ferrer and western star Tim Durant, who helped quell the fracas March 18, testified at the nonjury trial that they did not know who struck the first blow between Mitchell, 35, and Abraham Berman, 50.

Municipal Judge George B. Ross said he found Mitchell innocent because, although it was undetermined who started the brawl, Berman's aggressive attitude towards Mitchell over a small debt justified the singer's actions.

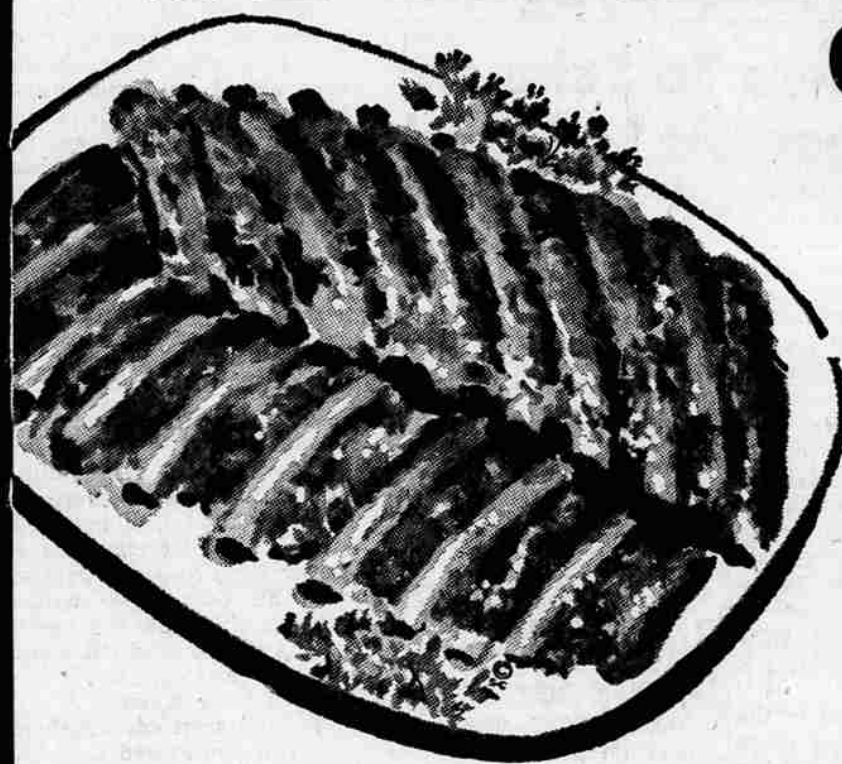
