Scout Camp Registration Now Open

Registration is now open for the summer session of Camp Low Echo, the Girl Scout camp at Lake of the Woods. Sessions will begin on July 5 and run through August 14. The chairman of the established camp committee is Mrs. W. R. Bagley, Talent, and Miss Irene "Kit" Knox will again be camp director.

Fees are \$20.70 for the first session of seven days, and \$28.40 for each of the three ten day sessions following. Folders giving all information needed, including dates, fees, program, equipment needed and registration procedure are available now through each neighborhood chairman, leaders, or the Girl Scout office.

All Girl Scouts, from those going into the fifth grade in the fall of 1959 on up are eligible for all sessions. However, there will be no Pioneer unit the first seven day session.

Campships Open
A number of campships are now available to make it possible for girls to attend scout camp, who might not otherwise be able to go. Each campship provides partial payment of the camp fee. Selection of girls to receive campships is based on financial need and the sincere belief that the camp experience will be beneficial to the girl. Money is donated by civic and service clubs throughout the area, and by individuals. The girl is encouraged to earn and save as much of her camp fee as possible. Camp savings stamps, purchased throughout the year and kept in a booklet, are turned in for cash to apply on camp fees at registration time.

Leaders with girls they believe may qualify for a campship are asked to secure a form from neighborhood chairmen or the Girl Scout office. The leader, the girl, and her parents complete the form, which is then returned to the office. The deadline for returning such forms is May 22. Applications are screened by the camp committee, and the leader and girl are notified if the campship has been granted and the amount.

The Girl Scout council is a member of the United Medford Crusade, the Ashland-Talent Fund, and the Josephine County United Fund.
