

Single Drink Risky to Users Of Tranquilizers

Philadelphia (Science Service)—If you are one of the many persons taking the tranquilizing drug chlorpromazine, do not take even a small drink of alcoholic liquor and then drive a car or operate complex machinery.

In combination with chlorpromazine, a single drink (two ounces of 100-proof liquor) significantly impairs coordination and judgment and makes the driver "most unsafe," Drs. George A. Zirkle, Ott B. McAtee and Peter D. King of Madison State hospital, Madison, Ind., warned the American Psychiatric Association meeting here.

Commonly Prescribed
Chlorpromazine is one of the tranquilizers now commonly prescribed not only for emotional upsets or tensions but for a variety of conditions including headaches and nausea.

As compared with persons taking either the tranquilizer or the alcohol alone, twice as many of those taking both felt sleepy and "groggy." The impairment was significantly greater on tasks requiring higher intellectual ability.

Physicians who prescribe chlorpromazine should warn their patients of the possible danger of using alcohol, the investigators advised.

Austrian Voters Reject Communists

Vienna — (UPI) — Austrian voters, who watched Russia crush the anti-Communist revolt in neighboring Hungary two and a half years ago, have pushed the Communists out of their parliament, final election returns showed today.

The general election, held Sunday, again made Chancellor Julius Raab's Conservative People's Party the top party, but only by a hair. The People's party won 79 seats in the 165-member parliament, a loss of three from the 1956 elections. The staunchly anti-Communist So-

cialist Party won 78 seats, a gain of four, and the right-wing Freedom Party won eight seats, a gain of two.

The Communists lost all three seats they had held. They received a total of 142,598 votes out of more than four million ballots cast — a drop of more than 25 per cent from 1956.
