Geneva—U. S. Assistant Secretary of State Andrew Berling, saying East Germany is welcome at the East-West conference only as an adviser:

Nuclear Sub Plant Going to Britain

Washington—(Science Service)—The U. S. will transfer the complete workings of a Skipjack-type nuclear submarine propulsion plant to the United Kingdom, the Atomic Energy commission reported here. The transfer will include not only the propulsion plant, but spare parts, design and related classified information. Authority for the transfer is contained in the amended Atomic Energy Act of 1954 and the Mutual Defense Agreement for Cooperation between the U. S. and the United Kingdom that became effective Aug. 4, 1958. The transferred nuclear power plant will be installed in the Dreadnought, now being built.

Rosalyn J. — Gerald should tell Mr. F. to cut out the compliments.

Gerald J. — Maybe I should start paying Mrs. F. compliments.

Rosalyn J. — My husband and I are having a controversy about how to deal with a certain couple who are friends of ours.

We have known the F.'s for three years and have enjoyed their company very much. But I am constantly being embarrassed by the fact that Mr. F. pays me too many compliments—especially in a way that is hurting his wife.

For example, Mr. F. will say, "You look gorgeous tonight." Then he'll turn to his wife and say, "Why don't you get a dress like that? No, maybe you shouldn't. It wouldn't look like that on you."

I feel awful about this because Mrs. F. is a swell person and I don't want to lose her friendship. I want my husband to tell Mr. F. to cut it out, but he doesn't want to get "mixed up" in this thing.

Gerald J. — I know this guy F. like a book and I'm 100 per cent sure that if I talk to him about this thing he'll take it that I'm jealous.

Not only would I hate to give him the satisfaction of thinking that, but I'm afraid it will make matters worse. He'll then think that Rosalyn has become interested in him and will really make a play for her.

I feel that Mrs. F. is much smarter than her husband and is too shrewd to take his silly blustering seriously. She always agrees with her husband that Roz looks great and never shows any jealousy.

I think that Roz takes these compliments a little too seriously. This guy isn't a bad sort and doesn't mean anything by it. I think maybe I should start paying Mrs. F. a lot of compliments.

The Council: We think Gerald is right not to want to rock this boat by having it out with Mr. F. But we don't think his alternative proposal is much good either.

Mrs. F. is apparently not only smart, but is a lady. She does not stoop to even acknowledge her husband's boorishness. The kindest thing everyone else can do is to follow her example.

We can't blame Rosalyn for being annoyed, however. When a man indulges in heavy-handed compliments to another woman at his wife's

expense, he is using the other woman as a weapon against his wife. He isn't even making a serious "pass" at the other woman. He is expressing some sense of helplessness and confusion in relation to his wife and possibly in relation to women in general.

This kind of conduct is embarrassing to others because it so obviously brings a personal problem and domestic conflict into public view. The simplest thing for others to do is to look the other way.

Whatever Mrs. F. feels deeply and privately about her husband's behavior, she knows that cutting off friendships with others would be no solution. Possibly, she hopes that someday her husband will wise up and realize how small and foolish he is making himself in the eyes of others. At that time he may even be willing to face his real problems and conflicts.

For the time being Mrs. F. has apparently decided to accept the bad in her marriage along with the good. Rosalyn and Gerald should try to do the same with the friendship. Rosalyn should politely thank Mr. F. for a compliment, and quickly change the subject.

McClellan Urges Anti-Rackets Laws

Washington—(UPI)—Sen. John L. McClellan, (D-Ark.), has urged Congress to take legislative action against racketeers such as those "who have entrenched themselves in the economic structure of the nation's largest city."

The chairman of the Senate Rackets committee, which earlier last week heard the charges of alleged newspaper delivery shakedowns in New York, asserted that "probably no hearing held by this committee has been as significant in pointing out the present racketeer threat to our free economic system."

McClellan said he was asking the committee staff to prepare legislative recommendations for the Senate Judiciary committee because "it is obvious to the whole country that the labor unions themselves cannot handle the critical problem of racketeering."

Testimony indicated that racketeers extorted protection money from certain New York newspaper distributors to insure delivery of their publications.
