A SHOP FOR EPILEPTICS WINS AN AWARD

I am delighted to see in an article taken from the Culver City, Calif., Star News that the "Epi-hab" shop of 8962 Ellis ave., Los Angeles, has received the highest Community Chest award for percentage of employees contributing. This shop should be duplicated in every city in this land. Why? Because it gives epileptics a job. It is a non-profit group which does sub-contracting work. It was started by Frank Risch, Chief of Epilepsy Rehabilitation for the Veterans' Administration in West Los Angeles. He has waged a campaign for a similar employment program through the Nation, and I hope he succeeds.

I read in the journal, "Performance," that the shop has a high production record with such an unusually low accident rate that its insurance premiums were lowered by 20 per cent. It is good to read that during the year, some of the workers have gone into private employment, some into trade schools, and some into night schools. Why on earth our city charity administrators insist on supporting in idleness a lot of robust men when these men crave a job, and would much prefer to work and support themselves? We just do not have enough sense and enough initiative to arrange for shops in which these men can work. Actually, most of them could work in any shop if only the industrial accident commission and courts would rigidly refuse to accept any claims for indemnity when, on rare occasions, one of the workers falls in a fit and hurts himself. So long as courts think it is a kindness to stick the friendly employer for having given an epileptic a job, little can be done to help hundreds of thousands of able-bodied men. Ignorance about Homosexuality

The great need for more knowledge about homosexuality is shown me by a letter just received from a woman who says that in her small town, her church group has learned that one of their well-known members is a homosexual. She says, "I can't begin to tell you what a shock this has been to all of us." "The man is married and has children, and apparently has always behaved himself in an exemplary way." Now, my correspondent wants to know, how should the community regard him, and behave toward him? Should they warn their young people against him? Most certainly not. The less they gossip about the unfortunate man, the better. He is not hurting anyone and does not intend to.

The woman goes on to ask, "What, if anything, can we or his friends do to help?" Again, I would say the best thing they can do is to treat him like anyone else, and quit having horrors about him. Their boys will not be ruined by him. It is a rare homosexual who bothers boys, and usually he has dealings only with a boy who enjoys living as a male prostitute. The head of a fine commission that recently studied this problem said that probably the public would not believe this, but the evidence they got showed that

in some 60 per cent of the cases in which an older man had relations with a boy, it was the boy who had propositioned the man! A point I would emphasize is that in his book, "It's Against the Law" (Weidenfeld and Nicolson, London), Peter Wildeblood says there is no evidence to indicate that when a homosexual man has affectionate relations with a boy, the boy is injured in any way. I might mention here that one of the finest citizens in his state—a man who has been a splendid athlete and a fine philanthropist, and has done many generous things for his fellow-citizens—got into a terrible homosexual scandal when he was a boy. Sixty years ago every one in his city knew about it. He must have suffered terribly all his days from the scandal, but he lived it down.

As I wrote to my correspondent, she should treat a homosexual just as kindly and with as much sympathy as she would anyone who was born with any other mental peculiarity which was likely to cause him great suffering and loneliness all his days.

Letter: That I Cannot Answer One type of letter which distresses me—because I cannot type to answer—it is the one in which the person asks me perhaps six questions about a supposed disease which he or she has. Sometimes, to answer all the questions, I would have to go to a medical library and do much research. In many cases, I cannot answer because I am not sure that the diagnosis given the patient was correct. In other cases, I cannot tell from the letter how severe the disease is. How, then, can I tell the writer how likely he is to live, or how long he will live, or how much he will suffer, etc.? Often my correspondent appeals to me for this information because he or she says, "My doctor is so terribly busy that he won't stop to answer my questions." This is sad, and it is one of the most unhappy features of medical practice. I am sure we doctors could often answer a question or two; and we should. But when there are six or seven questions and some of them very hard to answer, it is rough. Hundreds of people ask, "Where can I find a book on" and they mention perhaps some rare and little-known disease. In many cases there is no book known, and if there were one, it would be written only for physicians and hence quite un-understandable by laymen.

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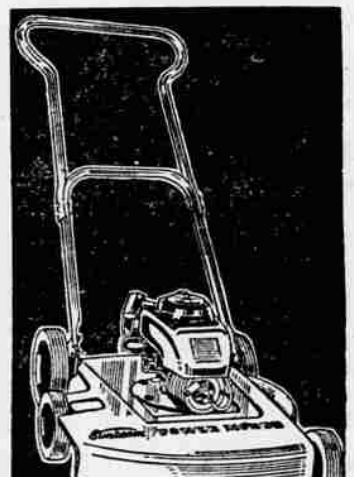
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
