

### Don Daniels Top Batter In Division

University of Oregon, Eugene — Don Daniels of Washington has taken over the Northern division lead for the individual batting championship, the fourth new leader in as many weeks, with a solid .400 as the race goes into the final two weeks.

The red-hot race for the 1959 pennant also nears a time of decision as Oregon moves to Friday on Thursday and Washington on Thursday and Friday for a crucial series and the other contender, Oregon State, begins its road trip with games against Idaho and Washington State on Wednesday through Saturday.

The pitchers again asserted themselves last week as the list of 300 hitters dropped to 10 and the hurlers turned in two shutouts and one one-run game in the four contests played last week. Oregon State's Kim Bradshaw and Arlie Kangas of Washington State share the second place behind Daniels with .375 each while Idaho's Fern Pappas is fourth at .360 and Vandal Cliff Trout, who led last week, has a .357.

Kangas took the RBI lead away from OSC's Grimm Mason with 14, but Mason still leads in homers with four and Dave Jones of WSC tops the triples with three.

Washington's two aces, Earle Irvine and Ernie Wheeler, along with Oregon's Hugh Springer, top the pitching, with records of 2-0. While Gary Moore of OSC (3-1) and Oregon's Donny Peterson (3-2) have registered the most wins, Elwood Hahn of WSC took the strikeout lead from Peterson, 39 to 37, in his last game.

### Bathgate Gets Trophy In Hockey

Montreal — Handy Andy Bathgate of the New York Rangers today was named the National Hockey League's most valuable player for the 1958-59 season.

The high-scoring right wing won the NHL's most coveted award, the Hart trophy, by better than a 2-1 margin over Detroit's Gordie Howe, a four-time winner. The 26-year-old Bathgate polled a total of 133 points to 60 for Howe.

The balloting was conducted at mid-season and again at the end of the 70-game schedule. Bathgate, a native of Winnipeg who now makes his home in Vancouver, held a 67-36 margin over Howe at the halfway mark.

Jean Beliveau of the Montreal Canadiens, whose 29-goal spree in the second half stamped him as the hottest player in the NHL for the last 35 games, did not receive a single point in the first half but wound up third with 36.

### Orioles Trounce Washington 7-3; Tie With Chicago

Paul Richards knows a little Greek, like Phi Beta Kappa, but he also knows that Baltimore's Greek fraternity may supply the key for the club's highest finish in history.

The three Greek players who are keeping the Orioles up around the top of the American league are Milt Pappas, Gus Triandos and Billy Loes.

All of them had a hand in Monday night's 7-3 victory over Washington which moved Baltimore back into a virtual second-place tie with Chicago, only a game-and-a-half behind first-place Cleveland.

Pappas celebrated his 20th birthday by posting his fourth straight victory without a defeat. Oklahoma City — (UPI) — Arnold Palmer's stunning victory in the \$25,000 Oklahoma City Open Monday demonstrated that a top-flight golfer can style winning scores on any kind of course.

The Ligonier, Pa., power slugger fashioned a final round 69 and a total of 273 on the marshy limited acreage of Twin Hills Country club, to win his 13th major tournament, including the coveted Masters.

Palmer, 29, in a frantic finish wrested the \$3,500 first prize money from Bob Goalby, Crystal River, Fla., by a scant two strokes. Early leader Tommy Jacobs, Whittier, Calif., slipped to third place with a total of 276, after three-putting the 14th green.

Goalby picked up a \$2,300 check; Jacobs got one for \$1,800.

As Goalby and Palmer turned the front nine, Goalby was five under par after nine holes. Both had plodded in 15-foot putts on the par five 8th hole for eagles. But Goalby gained another shot with a birdie on the eighth hole, as Palmer took a par.

Palmer got back into the game on the 10th hole. He corrected an errant putter for a birdie three. Goalby used five shots. It was touch and go until the 17th, when Palmer poked in a 40-footer for a birdie three. Goalby missed his six-foot putt.

Mike Souchak, Grossinger, N. Y., and Ted Kroll, Sarasota, Fla., finished with 279 to claim fourth money at \$1,400. Kroll has played three tournaments this year, and has an average of about \$1,400 per tournament. Palmer's first prize check advanced him into second spot on the PGA top cash list for the year, with a total of \$15,490.
