Khrushchev Talks About Cutback in Rocket Production

London - (UPI) - Nikita S. Khrushchev told the Soviet people that prospects for peace are good enough to think about cutting back Soviet rocket production in the near future. Tass News Agency has reported. Tass said the Soviet premier made the comment in a speech at Kiev in which he warned the West on the dangers of war and predicted an early summit conference. Khrushchev claimed the only reason the Russians were spending money on arms was because the West was surrounding the Soviet Union with rocket bases. Gromyko Prepared. Khrushchev said the Soviet Union was doing everything possible to achieve world peace and that Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was prepared "to achieve positive results" at the foreign ministers' conference in Geneva. He said that if the foreign ministers' meeting did not prove a great success he expected a summit meeting to be "the next step."

Cigarette Tax Stamp Disappears

Washington - (UPI) - Dewitt Clinton's portrait, seen by millions daily, has been doomed to join the cigar store Indian and the penny postcard in oblivion. And in case you wonder where you've seen Clinton, take a look at the nearest pack of cigarettes. He's the rather grim-visaged character who stares at you from the federal tax stamp. The Internal Revenue Service has announced that after June 24, cigarette manufacturers would be permitted to eliminate the stamps and pay their government excise tax twice a month directly to the Treasury. Clinton, a New York governor whose name is linked with the Erie Canal, has been adorning cigarette stamps since 1879. The Treasury says his portrait has rolled off government presses an astronomical half-trillion times since he was first honored. Last year, for instance, American smokers ripped open nearly 23 billion packs of cigarettes. ASLEEP AT SEA. New York - (UPI) - Since this continues to be a market of alternating sunlight and shadow, it is equally wrong to adopt too bearish a position, as it is to assume a too bullish one, or vice versa, says Hayden, Stone and Co. The likelihood of a temporary setback in the stock market has increased recently, though the long term prospect is still for somewhat higher levels, according to United Business Service. Westinghouse Air Brake net profit may exceed \$2.50 a share this year, against \$2.10 in 1958, Hornblower and Weeks estimates. Armstrong Cork can be expected to increase its total dividend payment should earnings continue the excellent progress of the first quarter, says Investors Advisory Institute. E. F. Hutton and Co. says Carolina Power and Light could increase its dividend in the near future in view of the favorable earnings trend. Dynamics Corp. of America could attain an annual rate of 85 to 90 cents a share, assuming full conversion of the preference stock and normal taxes and 1960 earnings should be well above this level, says Ira Haupt and Co.
