More than 3,000 Scouts and leaders will participate in the Scoutennial. Dr. Billy Blackstone is chairman.

Explorer Scouts, demonstrating the Exploring program of the Boy Scouts of America, will show in pageant form Scouting of the space age, covering hot rodding, rockets, water skiing and all other activities of the new program, according to Andy Schmidt and Morley Lamp, directors for the act.
