In every wagon train that crossed the plains heading west, there was always someone along, usually a woman, who steadied the procession by an example of persistence and dependability in the daily grind toward the objective.

The volunteers have had such a person to aid in the work of the VAVS since the opening of the doors of the domiciliary. Mrs. James Cech, of Medford, in representing the American Gold Star Mothers, has modestly assumed her part in the program.

When an organist was needed for chapel services, she was available to perform this service. Members will long remember her enlightening talks in her flannelgraph pictorial presentation of Bible scenes. Her coffee hour and other services to the men cannot be forgotten.

Manager Henry Herzog acknowledged this service to Camp White at the VAVS meeting Monday night in presenting Marian Cech with a 2,500-hour pin for her continuous activity as hospital chairman of her organization.

It was a signal honor as the manager indicated when he remarked: "I don't recall having seen another pin for that many hours of service."

The epidemic of so-called "flu" which swept over this state this spring followed the same cycle as was reported in Medford so far as Camp White is concerned, according to Dr. A. S. Anderson, CMO, who is able now to report a marked decline in the incidence of the disease.

The outbreak of the epidemic was noticed first here early in April with the peak reached about the third week, Dr. Anderson stated.
