Police said both vehicles suffered moderate damage.

Vehicles Collide - Automobiles operated by Virginia Williamson Reid, 541 Fairmont st., and Loren Cecil Keck Jr., 1603 Prune st., collided Thursday at Summit and Pennsylvania aves., Medford police reported. Police said damage to the Reid vehicle was minor, while Keck's car received "considerably more" damage. No citations were issued.

Six persons were injured, three of them seriously, in a four-vehicle accident yesterday afternoon in front of Kim's restaurant, Highway 99, south, state police reported.

Three of the accident victims were treated and released from Sacred Heart hospital and three others were reported in good condition today by hospital attendants.

In the hospital are George Thompson, 16, of Phoenix, driver of one car, head injuries; and his passengers, Berrie Arlind Witte, 16, of 2914 South Pacific highway, internal injuries, and Larry Morin, 17, of 4459 Culver rd., head injuries. Another passenger in the car driven by Thompson was Claire Burnell Coggins, 17, of Phoenix, who was treated for a small cut on the head and released, according to reports.

Also treated and released were John Douglas Metcalfe, 42, Palo Alto, Calif., driver of another car, cuts and bruises, and his passenger, Alice L. Wollery, 43, of Tacoma, Wash., facial and head injuries.

State police said the car driven by Thompson had passed a vehicle and was being followed by a dump-truck driven by James Franklin Smith, 31, of Klamath Falls.

The Thompson car, in front of Kims restaurant, went across the northbound lane and into the southbound lane, state police said. It struck the rear fender of a car driven by Comer Phillip Fox, 39, of Lake Creek, Ore., who was uninjured. The impact forced the Thompson car crosswise in the southbound lane, and the car driven by Metcalfe struck it broadside, officers said.

Prior to the collision with the Metcalfe car, Thompson was thrown from his car and back across the highway onto the east shoulder.

As Thompson was thrown out the dump-truck driver swung to the right to avoid hitting him and struck a light pole at the standard service station at the intersection of the South Pacific highway and Charlotte Anne rd.

The truck then went into an irrigation ditch, tore out the front end and caused the load to be dumped, police said.
