Back Stairs: Ike's Banquet Calories

Washington—UPI—Back stairs at the White House:

Little wonder President Eisenhower or any other President takes a dim view of banquets. It must take Eisenhower several rounds of golf to burn off the calories acquired at the average formal dinner.

The White House banquet earlier this week for the King of Belgium was a prime example. Depending on how much one ate of each course, the count on this one meal alone should have been from around 2,000 to over 3,000 calories.

The dinner included such waist expanders as crepes of crabmeat with lobster veloute sauce, a rich, creamy dish; mushrooms in butter over the fillet mignon, creamed zucchini, cheese straws served with the salad, toast and olives with the soup, a rich dessert with hard sauce which has more calories than pure sugar, nuts and candy, plus three wines and liquors after dinner.

Still Watches Diet
Because of his 1955 heart attack, the President still watches his diet and the White House cooks cut down on his sauces and gravies even at banquets. The Chief Executive, himself, also must exercise some self-discipline and not eat everything.

Former President Truman got to where he detested banquets when he was in the White House because of what a succession of these fancy dinners could do to his waistline. This was one reason why he walked every morning around downtown Washington at a pace almost approaching a dead run.

And with Eisenhower, it must take at least 54 holes of golf to work off the calories consumed at the banquet for the Belgian monarch.

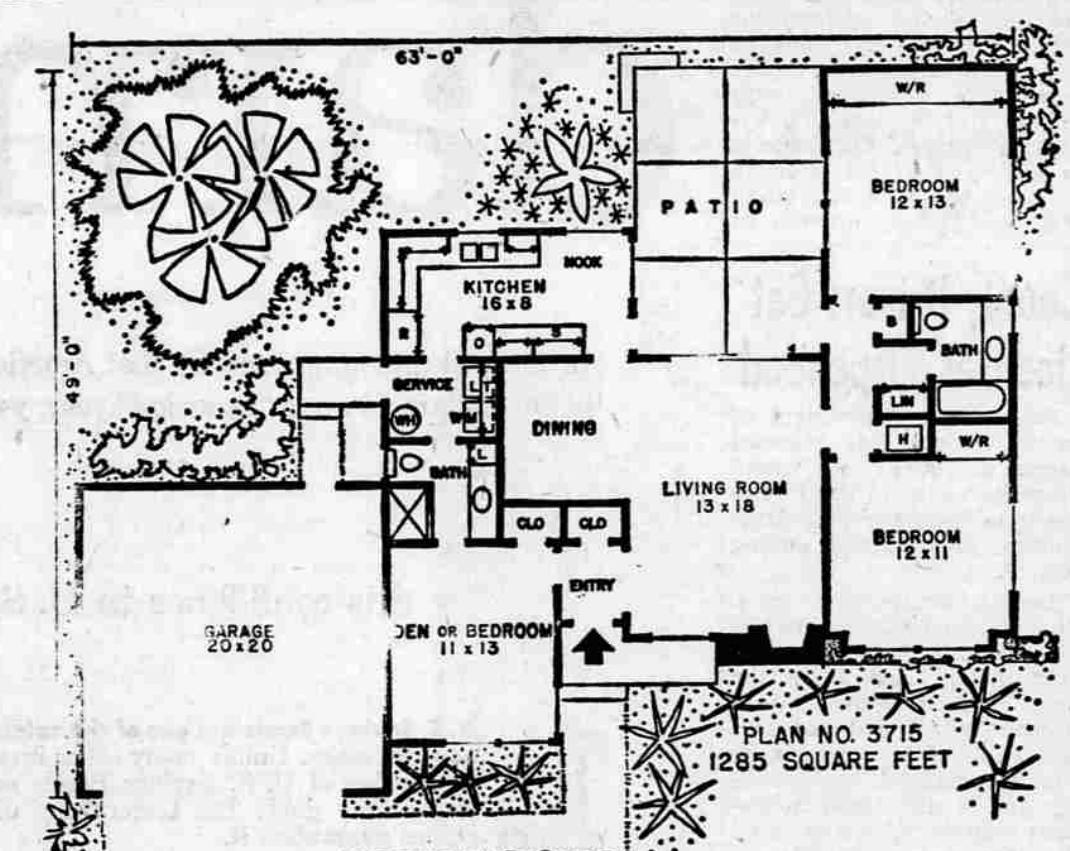
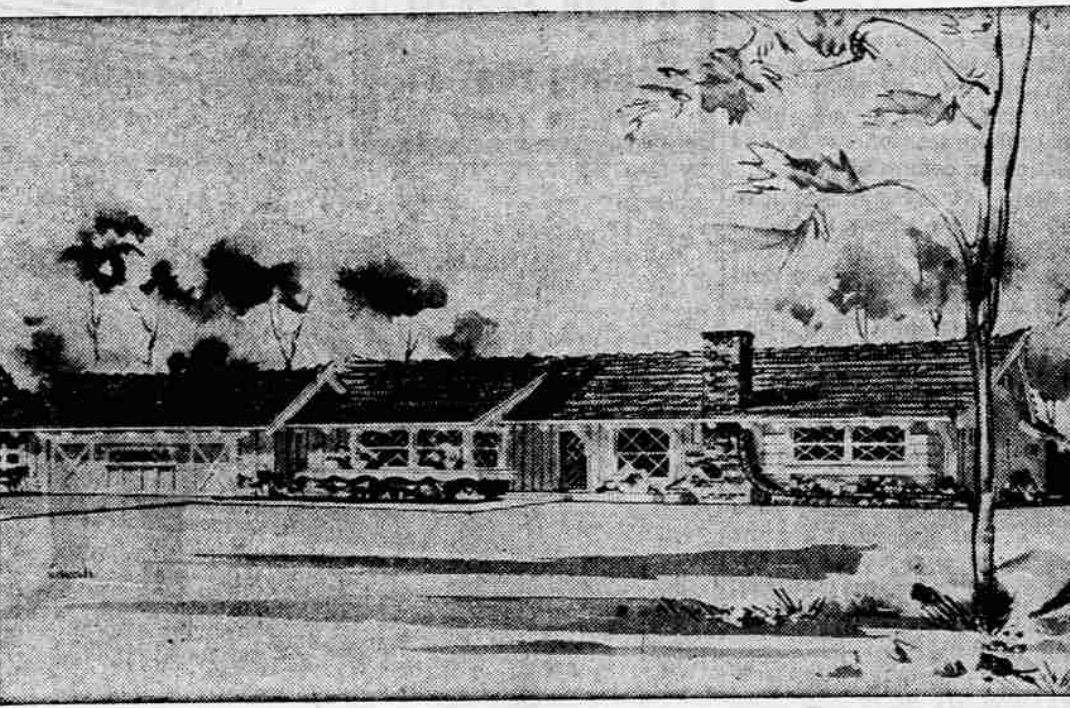

This Week's Home for Living

The large oversized garage has been located only a few short steps away from the rear entry of the service area. A large three-quarter bath featuring a pullman lavatory plus a linen or general storage closet, has been placed between the service and den so that it is readily accessible from both of these rooms, as well as the kitchen and children's play yard.

The kitchen has been designed to save the housewife many steps each day during meal preparation. This is one kitchen that no one will be able to say is not properly lighted because of insufficient window area. An ample eating nook is for regular family meals, while a large dining-ell has been provided for serving more formal meals.

The partially roofed patio is accessible from the kitchen, living room and bedroom hallway.

Some people want a front living room, others prefer a living room in the rear of the house. A through living room will satisfy both of these preferences.

The main bath contains a tub with shower over, a partially recessed water-closet and a pullman lavatory with ample storage space beneath. The two-bedroom wing of the house is separated from the third bedroom or den by the living room. This third bedroom or den could be used as a master bedroom, a guest room, a relatives room or for similar purposes. It is so located that privacy is assured for whatever its use.

Diamond-pane windows are used in all of the front windows, but these can be easily changed to square paned wood double-hung or aluminum casement windows by your contractor. Board and batt siding is used on the entire front of this home except for the horizontal siding specified on the bedroom bay window. The fireplace and planter are of used brick construction.

Complete working drawing of the above plan can be obtained at a cost of \$7.50 for the first set and \$3 for each additional set, when ordered at the same time. This plan will be available for a period of four months from this date. Please allow two weeks for delivery.
