

Arthur Godfrey Leaves Hospital

New York — (UPI) — Arthur Godfrey was to walk out of the hospital at noon today, 15 days after removal of a cancerous tumor from his left lung.

The 55-year-old radio-television entertainer will spend the next few weeks in his Manhattan apartment, his office said. After this interval, Godfrey is expected to complete his recovery at his 3000-acre farm near Leesburg, Va.

Godfrey will meet with newsmen and photographers for several minutes as he leaves Harkness Pavilion of Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center, but his doctors have cautioned him to limit his conversations to an absolute minimum.

"He promised his doctors that if they let him out of the hospital, he wouldn't talk about getting back to work, think about it, or do anything for the next 60 days," said Dick Korlik, Godfrey's press agent.

Godfrey underwent a five-hour operation at the medical center April 30. His doctors have repeatedly expressed satisfaction with his post-operative condition and reported no complications. Besides removing the tumor in his lung, surgeons also removed the upper lobe of the lung.

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Plane Damaged On Roseburg Field

Roseburg — (UPI) — A West Coast Airlines Fairchild prop-jet F-27 with 19 persons aboard was brought to a halt safely Thursday night after its landing gear partially retracted just before it got off the ground on a takeoff attempt here.

No one was injured and there was no panic.

The plane remained level as it rolled down the runway on the partially-retracted gear. None of the four tires in the dual sets on each side of the gear blew out and the pilot, Russ Bath of Seattle, was able to apply normal braking power.

The plane was bound for North Bend-Coos Bay and then points north en route to Seattle.

It carried 16 passengers and three crewmembers.

Damage to the aircraft was said to be minor.

TABLE ROCK Barn Being Remodeled

Table Rock — Sam Glass, the ex-Marine and jack of many trades, is remodeling the big barn on the J. S. Richardson farm.

In trying to get the age of this barn, we checked with Verne Pendleton of Central Point, a former owner, who informed us that the Pendleton family took possession March 17, 1892, and the farm buildings were there, built some years before, he thinks probably in the eighties.

The lumber used was made from local pine trees on this and other farms of the community, saved in a mill some little distance from the barn on the side hill which was used to deck the logs hauled by team and wagon.

Several from here attended the recent Jewett days at Crater High school, and report an enjoyable time visiting with old classmates.

The Ed Bennett family, which has lived for some time in the small cottage on the Ray Baker farm, have moved from the community. The vacated cottage, and some pasture and farm land is for lease by Mr. Baker.

Charley and Tom Given recently brought down their herd of stock cattle from their farm near the Elks picnic grounds to the pastures on the Table Top ranch.

Our better half and I accompanied by Miss Maxine Gordon, a missionary to Belgian Congo in Africa, where she has spent the past five years and will soon return, to Crater lake Monday. We have visited Crater lake many times but have never seen it so beautiful, with the clear blue sky above, the bright sunshine on the white snow made a setting for reflections we have never seen before.

Miss Gordon has been around a bit, in all her travels, but thought she had never seen anything so wonderful and beautiful as Crater lake. We met several California parties at the rim, and some local people. We met a man and his wife from Eureka, Calif., who were up here looking for a farm.

We wish that some of our people that brag about California's tax system could talk to these people who claim it is almost impossible to save anything in California. He said last year they took \$700 out of his gross receipts from

his little house-moving business, after he had paid all the different sales taxes on everything he had to buy to operate, besides a property, and income tax. The \$700, he said, they called a business tax.

We asked several lake visitors what they thought of Congressman Porter's plan to put in a lift to take people from the rim to the water. Most of them thought it would be great, but some thought it might tend to make it a sort of Disneyland.

Several Table Rock ladies put on their Centennial duds and attended the Extension Unit tea at Sams Valley Tuesday.

The planting of potatoes, melons, corn and other vegetable crops is going ahead here a little later than usual owing to cooler weather conditions.

The Table Rock Ladies club held their May meeting, Wednesday, May 13, at the home of Mrs. Harold Sharp with 15 ladies and 5 children attending, some members coming from other parts of the valley.

While looking at a picture of the members of the Oregon legislature in session at Salem February 1895, we found many interesting things. Jackson county was represented in the lower house by John A. Jeffries, of Medford, and S. M. Nealon of Table Rock, while in the Senate were Geo. Dunn, Ashland, and Sam Holt of Medford.

Apparently the county had two senators at that time. Dunn was a Republican and the other three Populists. At that time U. S. Senators were elected by the Legislature. According to a score sheet in the record book, there were nine votes on during the session with Dolph and Williams leading.

It seems that neither could get the necessary majority, and a "dark horse," McBride, came in near the end of the session and was elected.

Among the bills introduced was one by Smith of Josephine county to provide for the construction of an insane asylum in southern Oregon. Another bill would fix salaries for county assessors, giving them a raise. Both bills were tabled.

The first bill introduced was on Jan. 26, and the last Feb. 15.

Logging Truck Drivers Protest Hatfield Veto

Eugene — (UPI) — A protest against Gov. Mark Hatfield's veto of House bill 72 was staged Thursday night in Eugene by 100 members of the Independent Log Truck Drivers' Association in the Eugene-Springfield area.

Hatfield was in Eugene addressing a meeting of the Willamette Valley Hoo Hoo club, a lumbermen's fraternal association, when the demonstrators drove their empty log trucks around the Eugene hotel several times. An observer said Gov. Hatfield was aware of the demonstration but did not see it.

Benefits Big Operators

The independent log truck drivers said the bill would have benefited them and its veto would benefit only the big operators. One of the truckers, Austin Davis of Springfield, said the independent truckers have been hard pressed to stay in business because of what he called "cut throat" competition.

Hatfield, speaking before the demonstration took place, said he vetoed the bill on advice of the public utility commissioner and after checking with officials in Washington and California where such a law is enforced. He said he would call a conference of interested parties to "prepare some ideas that might more properly be enacted into law."

The bill the governor vetoed would have brought log haulers under jurisdiction of the PUC, requiring PUC permits to operate in Oregon and authorizing the commissioner to fix rates.

Chairman of ICC Willing To Talk Boxcar Shortage

Washington — (UPI) — The chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission said Thursday he would be "very glad" to confer with Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield's Emergency Transportation Committee to discuss the threatened freight car shortage in that state.

But the ICC chief, Kenneth H. Tuggle, said he "seriously questions" whether such a meeting would be "fruitful" in increasing the supply of cars to meet shipper demands in Oregon.

Norblad's Suggestion

Tuggle made the comments in a letter to Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Or.) who had suggested the state-federal conference in a communication to Tuggle last May 1.

The chairman told Norblad that "much of the burden in making cars available rests with the railroads."

Tuggle pointed out that the ICC has no authority to require railroads to purchase freight equipment or to prescribe rules and regulations for maintenance of freight equipment.

"However, we shall continue to bring the matter forcefully to the attention of the railroads in our efforts to avert a shortage," he said.

"This subject has been handled vigorously with the Association of American Railroads, as well as with the carriers themselves."

Tax Agents Launch Move on Gambling

Washington — (UPI) — Federal tax agents have launched a nationwide crackdown on gambling.

They arrested 32 persons in seven cities late Thursday in a series of precisely timed raids aimed at wiping out a gambling syndicate which operated from coast to coast.

Included in the arrest were 12 persons in Los Angeles, six each in San Francisco and New York, four in Middletown Ohio, two in Lexington,

Discrimination Law Enforcement Seen

Portland — (UPI) — Strict enforcement of legislation designed to prohibit racial discrimination in real estate deals was promised Thursday night by Mark Smith of the State Labor Department's civil rights division.

Smith spoke to an Urban League meeting here.

The legislation is contained in two bills awaiting approval by Gov. Mark Hatfield. One would ban racial discrimination in rental and sale of real property. The other would make proof of any discrimination cause for suspension or revocation of real estate broker or salesman licenses.

Smith said the legislation would "widen administrative efforts" in the field of housing discrimination.

Goldwater Favors Nixon Candidacy

Princeton, N. J. — (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, (R-Ariz.) said Thursday night he favors Vice President Richard M. Nixon over New York's Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller for the Republican presidential nomination in 1960.

"I think we've got a good man in Nixon," Goldwater said.

The Arizona senator said he saw no "great demands" for Rockefeller throughout the nation.

"Let's not talk about making Rockefeller President before he has a chance to show what he can do as a governor," he said.

Goldwater said he thought Adlai E. Stevenson would receive the Democratic presidential nomination.

"My hunch is that Stevenson will probably be the man," Goldwater said. "I like Jack Kennedy very much, but I think he's spreading himself too thin. He's vulnerable on too many subjects."
