Ducks Get Track Nod

Eugene — (UPI) — Oregon was favored Saturday to take its sixth Northern Division track title in as many years as the 30th annual meet got underway here.

Washington State, Washington and Oregon State were all given a chance at the runner-up spot won by the Huskies last year.

The 440 and broad jump were expected to be the highlights of the day. Washington was to match its speedy Terry Tobacco against the field and Darryl Horn of OSC and Steve Anderson of Oregon were expected to battle it out in the broad jump. Anderson and Horn have each done better than 25 feet in meets this year.

Ex-Crater Man Wins 880 Event; Ducks Cop Title

Eugene — (UPI) — The favored Oregon Webfoots won their sixth consecutive Northern Division track and field championship here Saturday at Hayward field, winning four first places and tying for first in a fifth event. The Ducks amassed 55 2/3 points.

Washington was second with 39 1/3. Washington State had 38 points, Oregon State 27 and Idaho 5.

Two Northern Division records were broken and a third was tied. In the javelin Dick Reubens of Washington State won with a toss of 235 feet, 11 inches, to eclipse a record set in 1940 of 223 feet, 6 inches by Boyd Brown of Oregon.

Steve Frye of Washington State set a division mark in the shotput with a heave of 55 feet, 6 inches. The old record was 54 feet, 1/2 inch set by WSC's Burl Grinols in 1957.

The tie also was recorded by the Cougars. Spike Arlt ran the 120 high hurdles in 14.3, matching a division record established by Jack Burke of Washington nine years ago.

Three of Oregon's top men, Steve Anderson, D. C. Mills and Phil Paquin, did not participate in the meet.

Bransom Paces Jacksonville To Second Place

A modern phrase, "count down—three, two, one," tells the story of St. Mary's high of Medford in track and field.

Third place in 1957 and second in 1958 in the Oregon Class B meet, the Crusaders today reign as state champions.

They captured the cherished small school crown Friday and Saturday at Springfield in a meet which saw a three-way southern Oregon sweep for leading honors. St. Mary's totaled 54 1/2 markers. Jacksonville, led by the meet's individual star, Doyle Bransom, was second with 41, while Merrill was a close third with 40. All three of the foregoing schools were entered from District 5.

Crusader victors were Dick Evans with 4:42.4 in the mile and Carl Michael, 144-11 1/2 in the discus.

In the supporting roles Terry Cooper of the Medford team was third in the javelin and tied for third in the high jump, Dan Rouhier was second in the discus, and Michael was second in the shot put.

Gary Kirsch took third in the 440-yard run and the St. Mary's relay team of Cooper, Alex Mete, Fred Lucas and Bob Evans took sixth.

Roller Rolls
Ron Davis topped a fifth for Jacksonville in the low hurdles. Charles Roller, Merrill, won both the high and low hurdles in :15.6 and :21.4 and the Merrill relay quartet won with 1:35.2.

Other champs included Oakes, Monroe, 1:67.6 in the javelin; Jim Brown, Coburg, 11-9 in the pole vault; D. Ginter, Corbett, 2:02.3 in the half-mile.

Among the top placing teams in the meet, which involved 53 schools, were Corbett 31 1/2, Helix 22, Monroe 18, McKenzie 17, Powers 17, Coburg 16 and Arlington 15.

St. Mary's qualified six men, four of them in field events, and Merrill had five places, four of them in the high and low hurdles. Fifty-seven teams in all participated. No records were broken.

Burleson Wins Special
In a special 880-yard run, Dyrrol Burleson, University of Oregon freshman who holds the national freshman mile record, won in 1:52.5. Another U of O freshman, Sig Ohlman, finished about four yards back.

In a special 100-yard dash, Oregon freshman Jim Puckett, holder of the state B championship in that event, won in 9.8.

The track was slow due to a heavy rain the past two days.

Carl Michael led in the discus with 144-11 1/2 and was third in the shot put after Friday qualifying for St. Mary's in the state B track meet. Dan Rouhier stood second for the Crusaders after discus prelims, Terry Cooper was second in the javelin and Gary Kirsch third in the 440.

The St. Mary's relay team took a fourth.

Hudson Bransom, Jacksonville won his 100 and 220-yard heats with :10.3 and :23.3 and headed broad jump qualifying with 20-5 1/4. Eion Davis, Jacksonville, was third in his low hurdle heat.

St. Mary's still had Dick Evans in the mile and Evans and Kirsch in the half, in which there were no prelims. Jacksonville had Ken Perward in the high jump.

Gas Derby Mark Hit

Indianapolis — (UPI) — Pint-sized Johnny Thomson, the "Flying Scot," from Boyertown, Pa., smashed the one-lap record Saturday and was the fastest of 12 qualifiers to win the pole position for the 43rd annual 500-mile Memorial day auto race.

The initial time trials for the annual gasoline derby before an estimated 90,000 fans was marred by a spectacular crash from which national driving king Tony Bettenhausen walked away with nothing worse than a blood nose.

Thomson, a 5-foot-7-inch speedway veteran, hit 146.532 miles per hour on his record-shattering third lap and averaged 145.908 mph for the 10-mile sprint in a new, pink-colored four-cylinder roadster owned by Racing Associates of Indianapolis.

The old one-lap mark of 146.509 mph was sent by Ed Elisian last year. Thomson, whose best of six previous "500" performances was fourth in 1955, missed the four-lap record of 145.974 mph, set by Dick Rathmann last year.

Portland — Gordie Marlatt of Southern Oregon college shot a 145 to cop medalist honors and Portland State won the team title for the second successive year with a 60 score in the Oregon Collegiate conference golf matches held here yesterday.

Marlatt shot rounds of 70 and 75 to edge out Tom Lilholm and Bob Smith of Portland State who had two round totals of 146.

SOC's Red Raider five finished only six strokes off the pace in team totals with a tally of 607. Both teams had tied for top honors on Friday when the action opened with scores of 304.

The third entrant, Oregon College of Education finished

far back of the two leaders. Eastern Oregon college and Oregon Tech did not enter.

Behind Marlatt for the Raiders was Phil Mongrain gaining runnerup honors on the SOC team with a total of 149 only four strokes away from the medalist honors.

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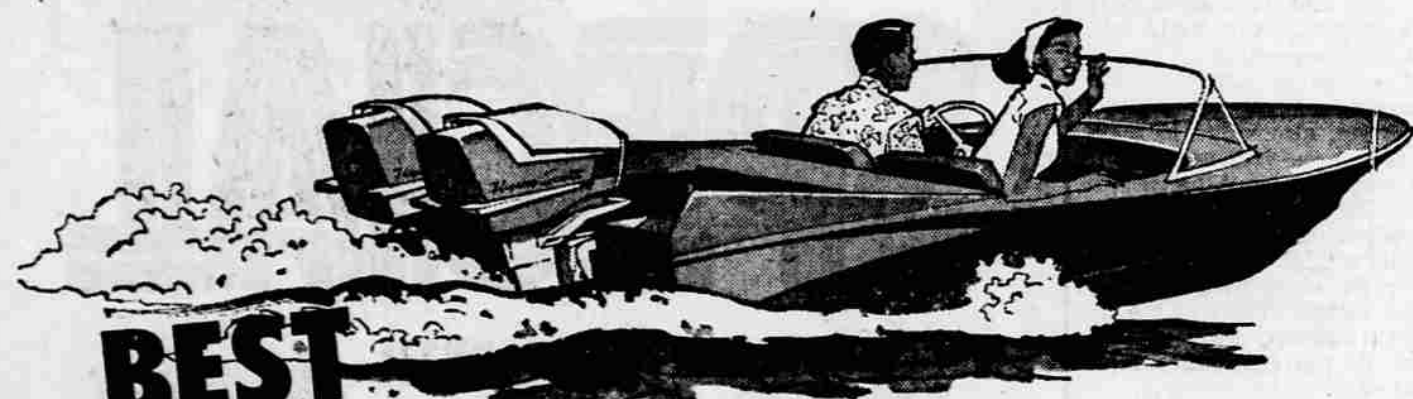
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Malin Nips Prospect For Title

Klamath Falls — A tight pitchers' battle highlighted a 4 to 1 victory for Malin over Prospect as the Mustangs bucked their way to the District 5-B baseball championship Saturday at Klamath Falls.

Prospect was the Jackson county 5-B champion and Malin was the Klamath county champion.

Prospect's Tom Davidson was ahead in the first four innings and had seven strikeouts into the fifth before Malin erupted. This came about on a combination of two Cougar errors and two hits from the Mustangs. One error was by Cougar Pitcher Davidson and the other by left-fielder Ray Schafle. Mustang catcher Rick Illian caused the big blow-off by driving in three runs in the fifth frame.

Winning pitcher was Randy Miller, of Malin, who recorded 14 strikeouts and walked one man. The game was played in a perpetual mist. The minute Miller threw the last strike out in the seventh frame the skies opened up.

The Cougars scored the only run after two were out in the seventh inning. Catcher Cliff Chapman slammed a hot grounder between the legs of Malin Shortstop Jim Owen.

Chapman then scooted on to third on an error on a throw by Catcher Illian and scampered home when Pitcher Miller bounced one into the dirt. Last man up was Lee Gitchell, who struck out.

Big hitter of the day was Illian who rapped out two for three and had three runs batted in.

Davidson did strike out seven men and walk three but on the base paths Malin stole five sacks compared to two for Prospect.
