

Tornado Cinches at Least Tie For District Baseball Crown

George Ice drove in Ken Jensen with the lone run in the fifth inning Friday for a 1 to 0 Medford high victory over Grants Pass which assured Black Tornado of no less than a tie for the Southern Oregon conference and District 6 A-1 baseball championship.

Medford also captured the non-league conflict 5 to 1 when Cal Dean smashed a bases-loaded home run in the fifth inning to crack a 1-all deadlock.

The first game marked the Tornado's sixth victory against no setbacks in counting games. Grants Pass finished regular season play with a 6-2 record. Medford can have the unshared title by downing either one of its two foes next week. The Tornado goes to Klamath Falls on Tuesday and opposes Crater Lake at Cheney field here on Friday.

One-Hitter
Pitcher Dennis Barr held Grants Pass to just one hit in Friday's opener. Medford's Ken Jensen turned key and spectacular defensive work in right field in a game which was outstanding for its brilliant fielding. The Black Tornado chucker issued four scattered walks and struck out four batters. GP twirler Dick Hayes yielded five safe blows to the Medfordites. He walked just one and whiffed three.

Gary Huneccutt socked the only hit off Barr but did not last long on the basepaths, thanks to Jensen. The outfielder fielded Huneccutt's swat and threw to shortstop Cal Dean at second base to nail the runner who was trying to stretch his hit into a double.

In all, Jensen had two key putouts and two key assists. In the fourth inning he caught Rex Benner's fly ball and threw to second baseman Ray Konopasek for a double play, catching Dennis Walker who had led off base, Jensen then spoiled the Cavemen's last big opportunity with a diving grass top snare of Huneccutt's low liner in the seventh inning.

Four Team Up
Cal and Lowell Dean teamed with Jensen and Ice for the one run of the fracas. Jensen led off with a scorching single through the pitcher's box. Cal sacrificed the runner to second and Jensen went to third base on Lowell's ground-out. Then Ice rapped his grounder to left field. Medford made its other big threat in the third inning.

With one out Ray Konopasek was safe on a bunt single. Barr forced out Konopasek but was safe at first base, himself. Durkee then doubled. He tried to stretch it to a double but Barr had been held up at third base and Durkee was tagged out on a situation which found two Tornado runners on the same sack.

In the fielding department Cal Dean at shortstop made a nice stop of a hot grounder by Marv Chandler and third baseman Durkee snagged a John Fox liner with a smart leap. GP outfielder Rex Benner robbed Bob Pond of a hit with a fine running catch and Caveman third baseman Fox took a likely hit away from Konopasek with a nab of a low liner.

Two-Hit Job
Pat McLoughlin allowed just two hits to Grants Pass in the second game. Lee Holmes and Glen Davis got them in the first inning when an error helped in the GP run. Bill Cole gave up three safeties to the Tornado and two of these were in the opening frame. Durkee started the first Medford bat turn with a bunt single and Dick Ragsdale walked. Cal Dean then forced out Durkee but Ragsdale and Dean pulled off a double steal and Jensen singled Ragsdale across.

Connolly Tops Mark

San Diego, Calif. — (UPI) — Hal Connolly broke his own world's record for the hammer throw Saturday night when he heaved the iron ball 226 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

Connolly, the 1956 Olympic champion, broke his year-old record of 225 feet, 4 inches on his third throw Saturday night in the Pacific Southwest association track meet at Balboa stadium.

Connolly's 1958 record was established at Bakersfield, Calif., on June 20. Prior to that, his best official mark was 224 feet, 10 1/2 inches in 1956 at Los Angeles.

Orbit Cops Preakness Horse Race

Baltimore, Md. — (UPI) — Royal Orbit, after trailing the field for half a mile, cut loose with a tremendous drive rounding the turn in the stretch at Pimlico Saturday and pulled away to win the \$190,300 Preakness Stakes.

With Jockey Willie Harmatz in the saddle, Royal Orbit, blocked repeatedly in the Kentucky Derby two weeks ago when he finished fourth, took the lead a full quarter of a mile from the finish.

Then with a tremendous drive through the stretch he pulled away from the 10 other thoroughbreds in the world's richest race for three-year-olds to haul down a winner's purse of \$136,200.

Brookmeade stable's Sword Dancer was second in the second jewel of racing's triple crown with Dunce third. Royal Orbit was third the finish line four full lengths in front to bring a smile of victory to owner Mrs. Halina Braunstein of Beverly Hills, Calif., and a grin of contentment to trainer Reggie Cornell.

Sword Dancer, nosed out of the Kentucky Derby by Tommy Lee and ridden Saturday by Willie Shoemaker, the boy who beat him at Churchill Downs, tried gately.

It was no contest. On and on rolled Royal Orbit to complete the trip in 1:57 flat, the fifth fastest running of the Maryland classic but far off the track and stakes record of 1:51 3/5 set by Nashua in 1955.
