Phoenix Budgets Four New Teachers

The Phoenix school district operating budget of \$390,950 is \$22,708 more than the 1958-59 budget, or an increase of about 6 per cent.

The largest increase, about \$18,000, includes the salaries of four additional teachers. Two will teach in the primary grades and one each in the eighth grade and high school.

Also included are the teacher increments and other salary increases for school personnel. Additional funds were budgeted for road improvements, including the road in front of the high school and an access road to it, and shop and vocational agriculture equipment.

Polio Epidemic Needless Threat, Erickson States

Portland - (UPI) - Portland and other parts of Oregon are wide open to a needless polio epidemic, according to Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer.

Speaking at a news conference Friday afternoon, Dr. Erickson said the situation could bring about an epidemic such as the one that struck Detroit, Mich., last year. He said the case is being presented bluntly to the public in the hope it might shatter public apathy.

"This is simply a case of failure to take advantage of a well proven vaccine," he said. Dr. Erickson stressed that health officials are not predicting a polio epidemic this summer.

He said a sample survey showed that about half of the Portland residents under the age of 40 are not protected. He warned that persons cannot wait until an epidemic strikes before getting protection. It takes time to get the series of three shots and time for the body to build up immunity.

Lowest levels of immunization found in a survey by the state and city boards of health were among adults between 25 and 40 years of age. Less than a third were properly immunized. Highest levels of protection were found in elementary school children.

Dr. Erickson warned that the height of Oregon's polio season normally comes in September and October.

Self-Inflicted Wound Reported

Bruce Arnold Lindgren, 28, of 1139 Morrow rd., was reported in satisfactory condition yesterday at Sacred Heart hospital, where he was taken by Medford ambulance service for treatment of a gun-shot wound.

Medford police said the shooting occurred at the rear of a cafe on North Pacific highway about 3 a.m. yesterday and was self-inflicted.

Lindgren shot himself in the left shoulder with a .22 caliber pistol, according to the report.

Transient Charged With Grand Larceny

Tommy Ray Laurence, 23, transient, was bound over to the grand jury on charges of grand larceny in district court Thursday.

Laurence is being held in Jackson county jail on \$1,500 bail.

He is charged with taking a used car from the Dick Knight company, Medford, last July 25. Laurence was returned recently from Utah state penitentiary by Jackson county sheriff's deputies.

Jim Fisher, 48, of 408 Hershey st., Ashland, received a six-months suspended sentence for obtaining money on false pretenses. He had pleaded guilty to the charges in district court.

Provisions has been made too, for building and some remodeling at the high school to provide three additional rooms for use of the eighth grade at an estimated cost of \$20,000. These rooms are necessary for the growing number of lower grade pupils, according to Ernest James, Phoenix school superintendent.

Playground Area - Additional land is needed for more playground area, James said, since additional buildings cannot be done on the present grade school site without purchasing additional playground area.

Both Phoenix and Talent will be voting Wednesday on proposed consolidation into a Talent-Phoenix school district. Phoenix district includes the Wagner Creek area.

Both district school boards have requested, in case consolidation is favored, that the boundary board declare July 1, 1959 as the effective date of consolidation.

"By so doing, even though consolidated, the two districts, who prepared separate budgets, will operate on separate tax levies for the next year," a school official said. "The schools will be organized and administered in such a manner as will be of most advantage to the children of the consolidated district."

Survey Under Way - "A survey of classroom facilities, next year's grade enrollments, pre-registration of high school students, location of pupils being transported by school bus, possible future building needs and the gathering of other pertinent data is under way already," the school official said.

Should consolidation be approved, an organization will be used for the next school year which is the most sound from an educational and economical standpoint considering future growth and development, Ernest James, school superintendent, said.

It is possible the two high school will continue to operate essentially as they are for one more year if it is felt more time is needed to plan and establish a well-coordinated educational system for the entire area in the future, the superintendent said.

Iwakuni, Japan - (UPI) - A 24-year-old Japanese woman confessed yesterday to strangling a young U.S. Marine corporal, Japanese police reported.

The police identified the dead Marine as a Samuel M. Robinson, 20, but gave no home town address.

Miss Chieko Hamamoto was arrested early yesterday near the Iwakuni railroad station. She told police she strangled Robinson with an electric cord after having an argument while drinking with him. The Marine and the Japanese woman had been living together, police said.

Officers said she told them she tried to commit suicide after killing Robinson.

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Friday the small business administration announced it had approved loans for 13 Oregon firms. Largest of these was one for \$47,175 for Interstate Plywood Sales of Grants Pass.

Other loans and the firms they went to included: Taylor Lumber Sales, Beaverton, \$10,939; J. C. Tracy and Company, Dallas, \$13,860; Star Carter Lumber Sales, Eugene, \$18,712; Michel Lumber Company of Oswego, \$3,645; King Brothers Incorporated, Portland, \$5,120; Northwest Packing Company, Portland, \$3,045; Vollstedt-Kerr Lumber Company, Portland, \$7,047; McInnis Lumber Company, Portland, \$4,811; Niedermyer-Martin Company, Portland, \$5,056; Fruit Products Company of Salem, \$8,003; Starr Foods Incorporated, Salem, \$5,048, and Stayton Canning Company, Stayton, \$4,115.

Body in Ditch Leads to Charge

Fairbanks, Alaska - (UPI) - Henry P. McCowan, formerly of Oakland, Calif., was charged with first-degree murder Friday in the death of Beatrice Hoover, whose ice-encrusted, nude body was discovered in a ditch here last month.

The warrant was issued and the complaint filed after Oakland police reported finding bloody garments in suitcases said to have been shipped there by McCowan.

The former ship's steward denied any connection with the crime, which apparently occurred in November about the time he reported her disappearance.

McCowan, 40, and the Hoover woman, 41, came to Fairbanks together a month before she disappeared, police said.
