Demonstrations and lectures were presented to the students on the various types of service which a hospital affords and the careers open to young people in the medical field in addition to the well known vocations of doctors and nurses.

Medford Lions Club Plans Work for Girl Scout Camp

One of the projects for this year is installation of an intercommunication system, which will greatly aid in the efficient operation of the camp, which covers a large area.
