The rose crop is the second largest cutflower group in dollar value in the state. Only the four-million-dollar carnation crop tops it.

Art Show Announced In Roseburg

Southern Oregon artists may enter works in the Southern Oregon Centennial Exhibition scheduled in Roseburg June 14 through 28. Rules and entry blanks are available from Harry Widman, 1470 S.E. Jackson street, Roseburg. The exhibit will be held at the Community building, at the Douglas County fairgrounds.

Works to be submitted must be of original design and not completed under supervision. Oil, watercolor and related media will be accepted as well as drawing, sculpture, ceramics, and weaving. All two dimensional work must be framed and wired for hanging and not more than

50 inches in either dimension. Sculpture must weigh less than 100 pounds. Each artist will be limited to three entries, it was reported. Those submitted will be judged by a juror yet to be named and awards will be given. Entry fee is one dollar. All chosen work must remain on display during the

entire exhibit. The work of a number of guest artists from throughout the state will be exhibited in a separate section and will not be eligible for prizes or awards. Several one man shows will be included in this group. Locally the work must be delivered to Frake and Smith, 315 East Main street, Medford, between May 27 and 29.

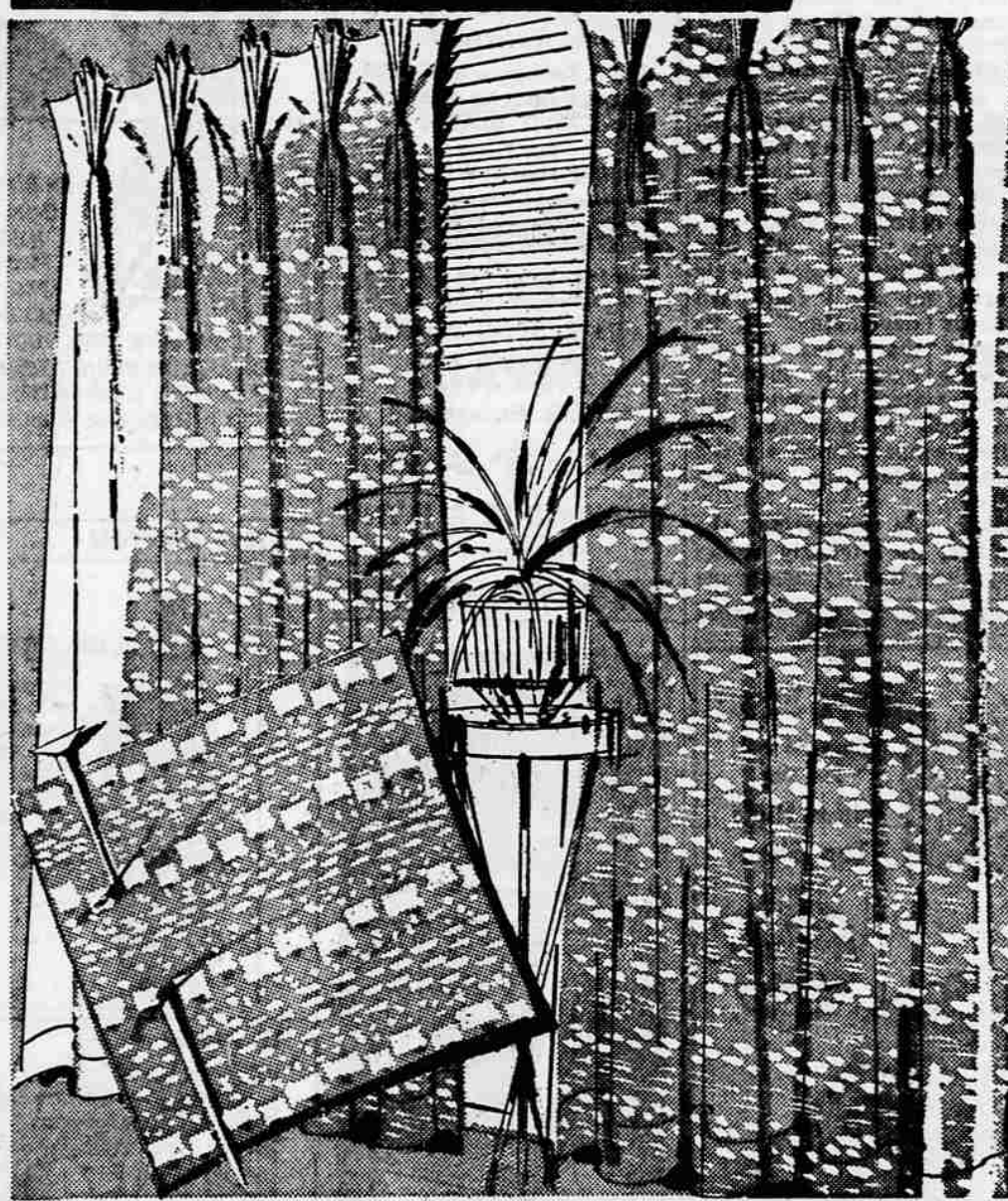
