



**HOLDS OPEN HOUSE**—Food retailers and handlers from southern Oregon and northern California yesterday attended an open house at United Grocers, Inc., north of Medford. ## Area Food Handlers Attend Open House At Local Warehouse

Food retailers and business firms associated with the food industry attended an open house at United Grocers, Inc., warehouse facilities at 2195 Sage rd., north of Medford yesterday.

The open house was held in observance of the opening of United Grocers, Inc., and its wholly-owned subsidiary, Northwest Grocery company. Food retailers and others associated with the food industry were invited to view booths and displays at the warehouse.

United Grocers, Inc., which is owned by independent retail grocers in Oregon, southwestern Washington and northern California, was founded in 1915 to serve as a centralized buying and warehousing organization.

**Large Distributor**

Today it is one of the largest food distributors in the Pacific northwest trading area. Headquarters for the company are in Milwaukee, Ore., and through that ware-

house, as well as the one here, and six "cash and carry" outlets in Portland, Oregon City, Salem, Eugene, Astoria and Klamath Falls, more than 6,000 grocery, frozen food and sundry items are made available to about 800 food handlers.

United Grocers, in 1958, purchased the Mason-Ehrman company warehouse north of Medford and moved local operations from Ashland to Medford. The company purchased the Fridger Grocery company of Ashland in 1956 and operated there until moving to Medford.

About 240 retailers are served at the Medford warehouse, according to F. D. Nelson, manager. Deliveries are made to coastal area, in the Grants Pass area, east to Klamath Falls and Lakeview and in northern California.

The warehouse operation here employs a staff of 54 full time employees, with an annual payroll of about \$300,000, Nelson said.

## Mundt Charges Demo Harassment

Washington—UPI—A Republican senator has accused Democrats of waging a political campaign of "harassment" against commerce secretary Lewis L. Strauss and other appointees of President Eisenhower.

Sen. Karl E. Mundt (R-S.D.) charged Sunday that the Senate democratic leadership had given its "full blessing" to such a campaign in an effort "to embarrass" Presidential nominees.

Mundt predicted that Ogdin R. Reid, former president and editor of the New York Herald Tribune, would receive "the same treatment" on his nomination to be U.S. Ambassador to Israel.

The senate commerce committee is scheduled to vote Tuesday on the Strauss nomination. Many observers have given Strauss only slightly better than a 50-50 chance of winning senate confirmation.

## FRIENDLY ATTITUDE

Moscow—UPI—A Russian medical professor said in an interview today that a recent trip to the United States convinced him many Americans seek friendship with the Soviet Union. Prof. F. Uglov, of the Leningrad Institute of Medicine, made the statement in an interview with Tass, the official Soviet news agency.

## No Change in Dulles' Condition

Washington—UPI—No major change has been reported in the condition of John Foster Dulles in his fight against cancer.

The last word on the former secretary of state came from friends who said Saturday he was growing weaker with each passing day.

The State Department said there was nothing to report Sunday and that no announcement would be made unless there were "a major change" in Dulles' condition.

The 71-year-old diplomat, who is at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, was said to be receiving pain-killing drugs.

The State Department announced Friday that complications caused by pneumonia had persisted and that there had been "some further decline" in his general condition.

Dulles' family has been here the past week.

## Mrs. Harry Truman Undergoes Surgery

Kansas City, Mo.—UPI—Mrs. Harry S. Truman, wife of the former president, undergoes surgery today at Research Hospital for an undisclosed ailment.

Mrs. Truman, 74, entered the hospital last Thursday for tests and a "routine check-up." The troublesome condition was discovered during the diagnostic tests.

Although the nature of the surgery was not revealed, Dr. Wallace Graham, the family doctor and White House physician when Truman was president, earlier said that Mrs. Truman would be in the hospital "quite a while."

## DIES AT PLAY

New Orleans—UPI—Funeral services were scheduled today for three-year-old Robert Hayden who was strangled accidentally in his backyard. Police said a loose chain from a gym set apparently wrapped around his neck as he played on a slide.

## Wall Street Chatter

New York—UPI—Quality stocks, particularly in steel, continue to attract substantial buying, Bache & Co., notes, adding that such leadership is likely to result in extension of the forward drive.

General Cable earnings are estimated at \$2, to \$3.25 a share for 1959 and could increase to \$5 in 1960, according to Ira Haupt & Co. The company earned \$2.17 in 1958.

Van Alstyne, Noel & Co., analyzing the Martin Co. estimates 1959 earnings at \$4.50 a share against \$4.01 in 1958. Chemical Week, in a survey on the sulphur industry, forecasts over-supply at the year end, but holds prospects are good for long-term supply-demand balance.

Standard & Poor's finds continued strong improvement in demand for industrial chemicals is likely over the coming months with 1959 volume rising some 10 to 12 per cent over 1958; further gains expected in paper production in the coming months; capacity output indicated for rayon and acetate yarn.

## Trucker Held in Rome, Ore., Murder

Reno—UPI—Edward J. O'Conner, 38, a truck driver from Giltner, Neb., was held for questioning today in connection with a murder in Rome, Ore.

The victim, Thomas Potter, 62, San Francisco, was found beaten to death in a Rome motel Saturday. The motel register showed that O'Conner and Potter checked into the motel Friday, according to Oregon authorities.

O'Conner was arrested late Saturday when he attempted to cash several travelers checks bearing the victim's name. Police said they found Potter's car abandoned near Winnemucca, Nev.

Oregon authorities said Potter, a Southern Pacific Railroad employe, may have been killed with one of the specimens of rock which he collected as a hobby.

O'Conner had several rocks in his pocket when he was arrested here, but he refused to comment on the slaying.
