

Meet Set To Settle Bowl Issue

Chicago - (UP) - Hardly any chance remained Saturday that the Big Ten would vote to save its agreement to play annually in the Rose Bowl at the final official balloting this week.

The spring conference meeting, opening at Michigan Thursday, will settle the issue in a vote either Thursday or Friday. Five schools have gone on record as opposed to a new bowl contract and five favor a new agreement.

A 5-5 deadlock, however, would kill the proposal since the balloting technically will be on an amendment to conference rules to permit participation in the game and a tie would prohibit the amendment.

Once in the four previous votes on the Rose Bowl, which has been approved each time by the barest margin possible, the bowl agreement was saved when one of the opponents, Minnesota, abstained from voting rather than cast a "no" ballot.

This time it was unlikely any member would abstain. The presidents of the five schools whose faculties have voted against the bowl, Northwestern, Wisconsin, Illinois, Ohio State and Minnesota, have indicated to United Press International that they presume a "no" vote will be cast.

Though there is strong sentiment among some conference powers favoring a new bowl agreement, should one of the "no" schools change its position, it would be liable to requests for proof that the faculty controls athletics.

Aaron Lengthens Swatting Streak To 21 Tilts in Row

Hank Aaron's bat is the hottest thing in baseball today unless you're talking about Jose Gordon's ears.

Aaron stretched his hitting streak to 21 games and kept his batting average at .484 Sunday when the Milwaukee Braves beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 8 to 3. Hammering Hank broke a 2-2 tie with a two-run homer in the fifth inning and also contributed a single to Milwaukee's 14-hit attack.

Such devastating clutch hitting has the Braves 2 1/2 games in front in the National League race-by far their best position at this stage of a pennant race in three years. They trailed after 29 games by 2 1/2 in 1958 and by two games in 1957.

Sticks With Pitcher
But you could light a couple of matches on Gordon's ears because of the job the second-guessers are doing on him in the aftermath of the Cleveland Indians' Sunday doubleheader split with the Baltimore Orioles. Gordon came under fire for sticking with rookie reliever Jim Perry in an 8-7, 11-inning opening game less even though the Indians rebounded to take the nightcap, 8-3, and retain their half-game lead in the American League.

Gordon stuck with Perry, recent hero of a Cleveland victory over the New York Yankees, even though he served up a three-run ninth inning homer to Gus Triandos that tied the score. Then, with relief ace Dick Brodowski ready in the bullpen, he stuck with Perry again as he filled the bases with two hits and a walk and then walked Bill Klaus to force in the winning run.

Chisox Streak Ends
The San Francisco Giants took over second place by beating the Cincinnati Reds, 9-1, and the Pittsburgh Pirates split with the Chicago Cubs in the other National League games. The Pirates won the first game, 5-4, but the Cubs came back to take the nightcap, 7-6.

The Chicago White Sox beat the Washington Senators, 10-7, after their eight-game winning streak was ended, 4-2, in the opener; the Yanks their opener, 3-2, but were humiliated, 10-0, by the Kansas City Athletics in the second game and the Boston Red Sox beat the Detroit Tigers, 10-1, in other American League activity.

A crowd of 49,347 at Los Angeles saw Lew Burdette game and win his sixth decision with an eight-hitter. Battery mate Del Crandall, playing before Fullerton, Calif., townfolk, homered and had three singles for the Braves.

Comet Seven Errors
Perry's sloppy pitching was the climax of a real "married men vs. single men" sandlot game in which the Indians made three errors, the Orioles made four and only seven of 15 runs were earned. Vic Power drove in three runs with a single and triple in the nightcap.

Andre Rodgers hit two homers and Willie Mays had a homer and a double to lead a 10-hit San Francisco attack that enabled Stu Miller to breeze to his second victory.

Bill Mazeroski drove in three runs with two homers to help Pittsburgh's Vern Law to his third victory and Ernie

Banks hit his ninth as Chicago's Glen Hobbie picked up his fifth triumph. Killebrew Homers Twice
Pedro Ramos ended the White Sox' streak with a five-hitter with the aid of homers by Jim Lemon and Reno Bertoia but Washington couldn't manage a sweep in the nightcap although Harmon Killebrew belted his 13th and 14th homers.

Bob Grim pitched a two-hitter and Dick Williams slammed a three-run homer for the Athletics after the Yankees pulled out the opener with a three-run ninth-inning rally.

Dick Gernert hit a homer and three singles and Marty Keough also homered as the Red Sox snapped a five-game losing streak.

Unser Dies Of Burns Of Burns In Crash

Indianapolis, Ind. - (UP) - Half of the field still was to be filled for the coming Memorial Day 500-mile auto race but the toll today already read one driver dead and two cars demolished.

Of the 33 open spots, 19 had yet to be taken. So far, only 14 drivers had qualified. Jerry Unser, 26, Long Beach, Calif., who drove only three-fourths of a lap in actual Speedway competition, became the 49th fatality in 50 years of racing at the famous "brickyard" when he died Sunday of burns sustained in a fiery crash May 2.

Unser, in a coma for several days, also crashed over the wall last year in the spectacular first lap wreck which killed Pat O'Connor.

Little Johnny Thomson of Boyertown, Pa., was the fastest week-end qualifier, averaging 145.908 m.p.h. Saturday for the four-lap test to win the pole position.

Thomson, a driver-farmer also roared to a one-lap qualifying record of 146.532 m.p.h., shattering the mark of 146.509 hung up by Ed Elisian last year.

Twelve cars were qualified Saturday on a cool and windy day, but only two made it Sunday as winds, then rain, cut into the six-hour time trial period.

Veterans Tony Bettenhausen and Johnnie Tolan figured in week-end crashes, which demolished their cars. Both escaped injury.

2. The all-time 72-hole competitive record.

Snead said he felt like "a spring chicken" after posting superb rounds of 59 and 63 in succession to easily win his own Sam Snead Festival tournament Sunday. They are believed to be the best 36 holes ever put back-to-back in competitive golf.

That finish gave the Slammer a 21-under-par total of 259 for the 12th annual tourney over his home courses at this Mountain resort. Eleven strokes back at 270 was Mike Souchak of Grossinger, N. Y., while E. J. Dutch Harrison of St. Louis, the 54-hole leader, finished third with 273.

BREAKS OWN RECORD
San Diego, Calif. - (UP) - Officials of the Southwest Pacific AAU are going to survey the field where Hal Connolly broke his own world hammer throw record Saturday with a heave of 226 feet, 1 1/2 inches. The field in question is at Balboa Stadium and the officials said after they survey it they will submit Connolly's new mark for recognition.

Little Wins In Arlington

Hot Springs, Ark. - (UP) - Gene Littler fired a two-under-par 70 Sunday to win first-par in the \$22,000 Arlington Hotel Open golf tournament with a record-tying score of 270, but young Jim Ferree almost forced him into a playoff.

Littler's top money brought his total to \$20,641 for the year, fourth among all the pros.

Ferree's 20-foot putt on the 18th green, that would have tied the score if it had dropped, lipped the cup and stayed up and Littler held a one-stroke margin.

Littler's score, 18-under-par, equalled the 72-hole score of Bo Wininger in 1955, the first year the Arlington was held.

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Pads Block Phoenix Ambitions; Mountie Nine Tops Portland

The San Diego Padres have at least temporarily shattered whatever notions Phoenix had of making the Pacific Coast league pennant chase a three-team affair.

Bud Podbielan and Jack Striker contributed a pair of solid pitching performances at San Diego Sunday to enable the Pads to break a four-game losing string against Phoenix and drop the latter club into a fourth-place tie with Spokane.

Podbielan ran his scoreless innings streak to 22 while picking up his fifth straight win in the opener, by a 3-0 margin. Striker came back with a five-hitter in the seven-

inning finale to give the Padres a 5-3 victory and a sweep for the day.

The twin-victory kept the Padres 3 1/2 games back of league-leading Sacramento and put them two full games in front of three-place Vancouver, which replaced Phoenix in that spot by virtue of an 8-5 win over Portland.

Solons Keep It Up
Joe Stanka threw a four-hitter in the first game at Sacramento Sunday night to give the Solons a 3-0 win over Salt Lake and Winston Brown stuck it out in the nightcap to pick up his third win when the Solons pushed across a single run in the fifth for a 3-2 victory.

Spokane blasted Seattle twice in the day's other double header, scoring a 5-3 win in the nightcap on Steve Bilko's grand-slam homer in the third inning after coasting to a 10-1 triumph in the first game.

Podbielan, who has proved nearly invincible this season by not allowing more than six hits in any single game, was the whole show in the first tilt at San Diego. The 35-year-old righthander did not allow a walk while holding the Giants at bay throughout the contest. His teammates backed him up with an eight-hit attack, scoring once in the fifth and twice in the sixth.

The Pads wrapped up the nightcap in the fifth, scoring three times to break a 2-2 deadlock. Rudy Regalado slammed the clincher when he homered after two Phoenix errors put a pair of runners on base. Striker gave up a two-run homer to Willie McCovey in the second, then settled down to pick up his third straight win.

Aided by five double plays, Stanka had no trouble in gaining his fourth win at Sacramento. He struck out three and walked one. The Solons punched across two runs in the fourth and added another in the sixth for all of the scoring.

In the second contest, Mike Krsnich belted a two-run homer in the fourth to deadlock the score at 2-2, and Nippy Jones won it in the next frame with a solo shot into the left field stands.

Bilko's grand-slammer in the third inning of the finale at Spokane climaxed what was largely a lengthy batting practice for the Indians at the expense of Seattle. Roger Craig made a bid for Spokane's fourth straight shutout in the opener, but Ed Wincek of Seattle connected for a solo homer in the third. He settled down to stop the Rainiers on five hits the rest of the way.

Ron Hansen's three run homer in the eighth broke a 5-5 deadlock and gave Vancouver its win, the Beavers making poor use of 14 hits and nine bases on balls by a quintet of ineffective Mountie hurlers. Ray Barker and Joe Durham also homered for the Canadians.
