Portland Jury Hears Call Girls
Portland - (UPI) - The Multnomah county grand jury Monday returned indictments against two persons on charges of receiving the earnings of a common prostitute after hearing testimony of a self-described call girl.

The grand jury indicted Kay Hansen, 36, and Wally Potter, 35. They were arrested by vice squad officers late Monday and then freed under \$1500 bail.

Deputy District Attorney Oscar W. Howlett, who said he expected other arrests, did not disclose the name of the witness whose testimony led to the indictments. Authorities said she was led to cooperate with them in a desire to get revenge for an attempt to lure her into an out-state house of prostitution.

The district attorney's office decided against issuing subpoenas at this time to the hundreds of men, many of them prominent, whose names appeared in call girls' notebooks which came into the hands of police last week.

Youngster Awarded \$30,000 Damages
Portland - (UPI) - A Circuit Court jury Monday awarded \$30,000 to Lee R. Freeman, 15, Brightwood, for injuries suffered when he was struck by a car last July 10.

The award, one of the highest here in recent months, was made against Michael E. Salo, Bend union official, after a trial before Circuit Judge James R. Bain. Choice of Name for Group Largely Bid For Court's Support

Based on these points, comments from other quarters in the course of the discussion, the choice of name appeared to be largely a bid for the county court's support.

Another point of controversy was the question of voluntary cooperation versus law enforcement as the most practical approach to stamping out pollution.

DeForest, while agreeing that cooperation was the ideal way, said the state sanitary authority should be encouraged to prosecute sanitary code violators. "There is no escaping the fact that voluntary cooperation does not work," he stated.

'Defeatist Attitude'

Yesterday noon, at a luncheon meeting of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce roundtable at which he was the featured speaker, DeForest called upon the chamber to ask for enforcement of the code along Bear creek. He charged the sanitary authority with developing a "defeatist attitude" toward prosecuting violators.

DeForest acknowledged last night that Ted Gerow, state sanitary authority engineer for this area, was burdened with "entirely too much" work to efficiently function in law enforcement. He said the local Oregon Sportsmen plan to patrol the creek as a supplement.

"When we find evidence we think would support a conviction," he said, "we intend to turn it over to the sanitary authority." He compared a person guilty of stream pollution to a traffic law violator.

Ken Denman, Medford, member of the state game commission, and Earl Knight, president of the local chapter of the Izaak Walton league, took a more moderate position. Denman called enforcement of the sanitary code the least desirable means, and said voluntary cooperation would be better for the valley.

Pressure Mentioned

"If we have to fight," he

added, "that's something else." He said some pressure might be required in some instances.

Knight stressed the value of setting a good example through voluntary clean-up work along the creek.

Despite these various cross-currents, however, enthusiasm for a full-fledged attack on the pollution problem ran strong.

The importance of obtaining additional water from the Talent irrigation project to maintain a minimum stream flow during dry months was again emphasized last night.

Water Available

"If we are going to have surplus water available," Judge Miller said, "I don't think it would be too great a problem to get financial support from the county."

Walt Hoffbuh, Talent Irrigation district manager, said 1961 would be the first possible year that additional water would be available. He pointed out, however, that the reservoir water, except for surpluses, has already been reserved.

"The primary use of that water is irrigation," he said. "Surplus water will not be on a guarantee basis," Hoffbuh added, but would depend on precipitation in any particular year.

"There will be years when it will be impossible to deliver surplus water down the stream," he said.

No Reason Seen

If a surplus was available, he continued, he personally, could see "no reason why it could not be sold."

Hoffbuh explained after the meeting that any attempt to secure a permanent, guaranteed allocation of water for improving Bear creek would involve contract negotiations with the bureau of reclamation. He said either more water would have to be developed, or water would have to be taken from an allocation already made.

The increase in irrigation water when the Talent project is completed, would in itself, it is understood, increase the flow in the creek.

Elderly Couple Survives Ordeal In River Canyon

Moab, Utah - (UPI) - A California man and his wife, missing and feared drowned since their boat capsized in the treacherous Cataract canyon of the Colorado river Sunday, were found alive today.

Mrs. Lillian Rich, 64, Long Beach, was picked up by a helicopter at the confluence of the Colorado and Green rivers in Southern Utah after walking six miles over rough terrain out of the canyon. Her husband, Frank A. Rich, 65, unable to walk, was reported alive but still in the canyon and a helicopter went to attempt his rescue.

Spotted by Pilot

Mrs. Rich was taken to Dr. I. W. Allen hospital here. She was spotted from the air by private pilot Jim Hurst, Moab, one of the sponsors of the week end "friendship cruise" 196 miles down the river during which the accident occurred. Hurst radioed a helicopter piloted by Jim Dodie, Escalante, Utah. Dodie picked up the woman and carried her to Grandview Point where she was transferred to Hurst's single-engine plane at a small airstrip and brought here.

Mrs. Rich was reported exhausted and in shock from her two-day ordeal but her condition was listed as "good."

A son and daughter-in-law of the couple, Mr. and Mrs. Delbert A. Rich, Cedar City, Utah, survived the capsizing and walked out of the canyon Monday.
