U.S. Seen Out For Big 4 Talks

Geneva—UPD—French and West German objections appeared today to have ruled out the United States as a site for a Big Four summit conference.

French President Charles de Gaulle made it plain to the U.S. he would refuse to attend a Big Four summit meeting outside Europe—ruling out San Francisco or New York.

West German delegation members also expressed their objections to either New York or San Francisco on technical grounds.

The British do not seem to have any firm objections against the site—so long as the summit is reached. They have even mentioned an ocean liner in mid-Atlantic.

Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev was reported anxious to visit the U.S. and presumably would happily fly off—probably in a flashy jet—to either New York or San Francisco.

Washington—Dr. John R. Heller, director of the National Cancer Institute, advising Americans to quit or cut down on smoking:

Wall Street Chatter

New York—UPD—Over the past ten weeks, there have been more stocks declining than advancing, even though the industrial average is some 30 points higher, says Edmund W. Tabell, analyst for Wainston & Co.

Although these may be only preliminary warning signals, he adds, they suggest some caution over the nearer term and the possibility of at least a lengthy consolidating period. He sees no indications of a long term top.

The end of the present upward trend may not be seen for months, says International Statistical Bureau, which notes that many groups and individual stocks will lag, making imperative selectivity in buying.

Standard & Poor's says: After selling off sharply last January because of fear of competition by the Ford Motor Co., finance company stocks were relatively steady for several months. In recent

weeks they have moved ahead with some vigor, apparently in early anticipation of the widely heralded automobile boom expected to get under way in the fourth quarter of 1959.

Allied Paper Corp. 1959 earnings which will be tax free could rise to \$1.50 a share before non-recurring profits and further substantial gains are possible in 1960, according to Shearson, Hamill & Co.

J. W. Sparks & Co. lists U. S. Rubber as its trading recommendation for this week.

International Harvester, barring an extended steel strike, could show earnings above the \$3 level for its fiscal year ending next October, against \$2.69 and \$2.88 for the preceding two years, says Francis Du Pont & Co.
