## Contract Awarded For Treating Logs

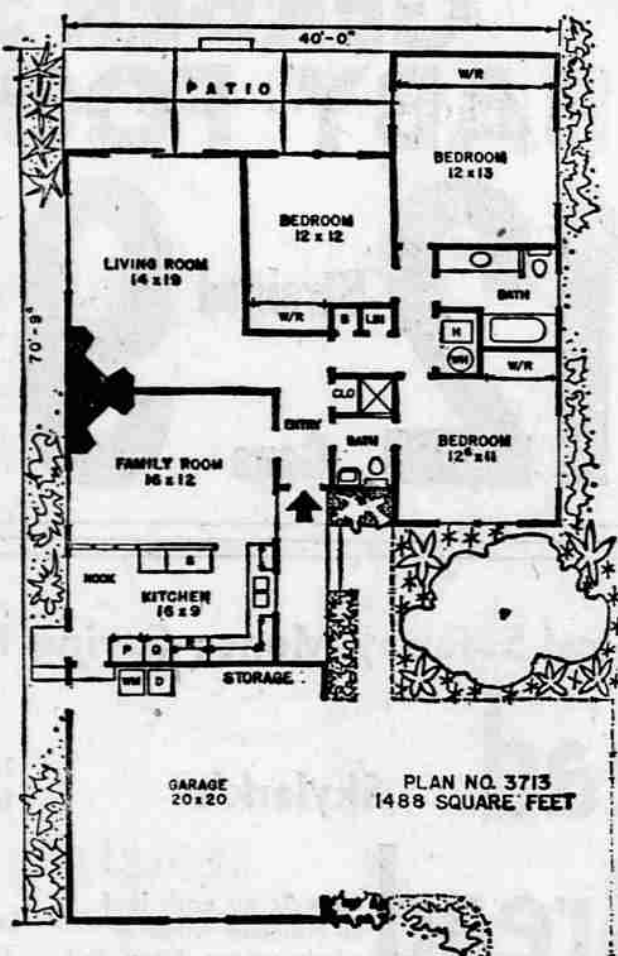
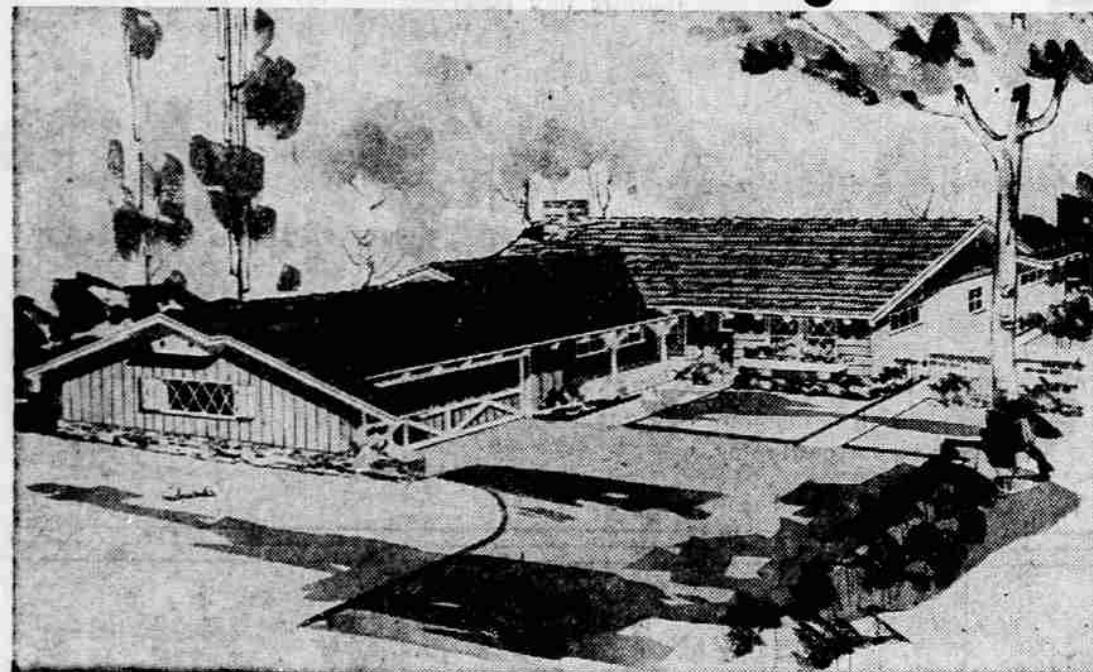
A contract for creosoted bridge timbers was awarded by the Jackson county court Wednesday.

The timbers will be used for construction of a bridge across Little Butte creek, at Brownsboro. Bids were called for on May 11.

## This Week's Home For Living



Here's a charming home that has almost everything that is most desired in today's way of living. Yet, it contains less than 1,500 square feet and has been designed to be built on a lot as narrow as 50 feet.

The washer and dryer - laundry tray if preferred - has been located in the garage. The garage door has been placed to provide additional storage space in the

garage. Direct access from the garage to the kitchen will save many steps in a year's time and is always appreciated on a rainy day.

The kitchen is separated from the family room by a half-wall, part of which has turned posts to the ceiling. Range and oven are built-in. In addition to all the wall and base cabinets, there is a floor to ceiling pantry located next to the oven.

The center hall entry leads to all sections of this home. Sliding glass doors open from the living room to a partially roofed patio. The living room fireplace has been placed in the corner so as to back up against the family room fireplace and consequently save in construction costs. If desired, one of these fireplaces could be eliminated during construction.

Access is provided to the three-quarter bath from both the family room-kitchen area and can double as a guest powder room as it is near the living room. The main bath has a shower over the tub and an extra long pull-man lavatory which is separated from the water closet by a partial wall with glass above.

Used brick has been indicated for both planters and veneer. A combination of horizontal siding together with boards and batts has been used on the front elevation. The rustic design is completed with the use of cedar shakes, which may be changed to shingles if economy is preferred.

Complete working drawing of the above plan can be obtained at a cost of \$7.50 for the first set and \$5 for each additional set, when ordered at the same time. This plan will be available for a period of four months from this date. Please allow two weeks for delivery. 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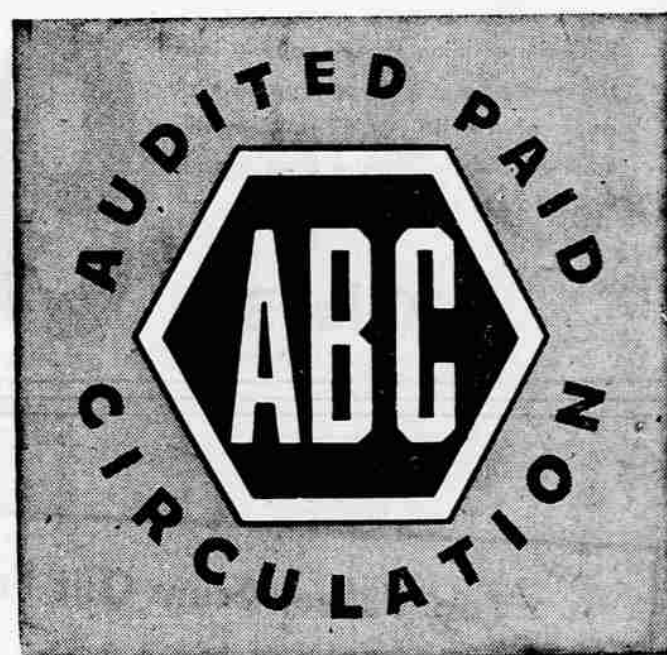
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
