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## Morse Reveals Academy Picks

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) has announced the appointment of Michael Peterson, Coos Bay, and Richard L. Brown Jr., Eugene, to the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis. The third vacancy is pending due to a physical re-examination of a scholastically qualified nominee.

Morse named Dele L. Anderson, Portland, as principal appointment to the U. S. Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs. Although the Oregon senator had authority to fill only one vacancy to the Air Force Academy, the secretary

of the Air Force selected William J. Culp, Salem, for appointment under the qualified alternate system. The senator explained that Culp was authorized to compete by his nomination last February and that he qualified so well in the entrance examination the secretary of the Air Force made the appointment.

## State Capitol: Pearson Fills In During Absence of Hatfield

Salem - (UPI) - Some capitol coffee-break clues gathered this week:

Senate President Walter Pearson (D-Portland) watched the state store most of this week as acting governor while Gov. Mark Hatfield was in Washington, D. C. for conferences on federal-state relations.

Pearson was doing fine until he ran into one of those letters that any governor or

acting governor is likely to get once in a while.

It was from the International Peasant Union which stumped the governor's office for a while, but the group turned out to be an organization or central European agrarian parties.

Their purpose was serious. They were asking support from Oregon in "the common cause of freedom" to liberate more than 100 million people "subjugated by the Soviets behind the Iron Curtain."

Pearson, as acting governor, signed several minor bills but left the International Peasant Union decision up to Hatfield.

The governor returned to his desk today.

**Technique Developed**  
As to Hatfield's trips to the nation's capital, he has developed a technique for making them. He is accompanied by an aide and the two men work side-by-side on the plane going and coming on correspondence, appointments and other matters.

In Washington, the assistant does a share of the dozens of errands that pile up. On each of the two trips thus far, there have been cabinet, congressional and White House contacts to meet within 48 hours that they were there.

The governor has worked on such problems as construction of Green Peter dam, The Dalles dam dedication, chrome and mining problems and the Portland dry dock.

On the latest trip, the pair worked on opposition to the O & C land transfer to the Forest Service from the Bureau of Land Management, Se-

lective Service problems, Centennial liaison, National Guard work, unemployment compensation and federal-

## Bristol Bay Group Due Surplus Food

Juneau - (UPI) - Gov. William A. Egan's office has begun setting up a system for the distribution of surplus food to Bristol Bay residents who face hardships because the region has been closed to commercial salmon fishing for American fishermen.

The governor's office advised Malcolm M. McGilvray, western area field supervisor for the Agriculture Department's Food Distribution Division, that food will be needed for a population of 4,000 or more. The need will depend on how widespread are the adverse economic effects resulting from closure of Bristol Bay.

President Eisenhower previously had directed that the food be made available on request of Egan.

Charles W. Terry, who is on temporary leave from his assignment as Oregon civil service director, wrote home to Oregon from Djakarta, Indonesia, where he is a government consultant, that it takes him an hour to get to work through the streets packed with vehicles and pedestrians.

Terry reported that the city, located on the island of Java, has a teeming population of 2,500,000 although it was built to accommodate only about 800,000.
