

Southern Baptists Turn Attention To National Problems

Louisville, Ky. — Southern Baptists, today turned their attention from denominational to national problems including the touchy issue of race relations.

At the final session of their 102nd annual convention the racial question, which has fireworks at previous conventions, was brought up indirectly in a resolution. It called for a "summit conference of Southern Baptist leaders with the leaders of the two major Negro Baptist denominations to seek better mutual understanding on racial problems."

Former Rep. Brooks Hays (D-Ark.), retiring president of the 9,206,000 member denomination, strongly endorsed the proposal. He said such a "high level conference" of Baptist leaders could do much to restore communication between white and Negro Christians on tensions of great concern to both.

A resolution calling on parents to help the Post Office Department curb the "flow of filth" being mailed to American children by pornography peddlers, a proposal to send an unofficial observer to the United Nations and a token of Southern Baptist concern for world peace and grim warnings about the spread of alcoholism were other major items on today's program.

The anti-obscenity resolution was sponsored by Joe Burton, convention secretary. He praised Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield for his efforts to prosecute "purveyors of filth," who are doing an estimated \$600 million annual mail order business in pornography aimed primarily at teen-aged children.

Hays also endorsed a report to the world peace committee recommending that Southern Baptist observes be sent to the United Nations headquarters in New York. Several other

major denominations already have such observers.

Hays said the action would show that Southern Baptists are deeply concerned about world peace and interested in international efforts to preserve it.

British Color Film Scheduled

The public is invited to a free showing of a British color film entitled "Antarctic Crossing," to be shown Monday at 8 p.m. in the Medford High school auditorium.

Sponsoring the show is the Tucker Sno-Cat Corp. of Medford.

The picture was taken during the journey of British Antarctic explorers, under the leadership of Sir Vivian Fuchs, across the Antarctic continent, and across the South Pole.

Four Medford-made Sno-Cats were the main means of transportation, and are featured prominently in the picture. The film has had one prior private showing in Medford, but this is the first public screening of the picture. The Tucker firm just this week received its own copy of the film.

Doors will open at 7:15 p.m., and the picture will start at 8 p.m. sharp.

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Wall Street Chatter

New York —UPI—Although we would not conclude at this point that the upward trend has reached its limit, it is becoming more and more obvious that forward progress from these levels may be somewhat slower than that witnessed in the past and that periods of consolidation and correction are likely to become more frequent, says Bache & Co.

Clark Equipment earnings are forecast at the former record of \$4.23 a share for 1959 against \$2.70 in 1958 by Ira Haupt & Co.

Reynolds & Co. sets General Motors at a preliminary estimate of \$3 a share for 1959 against \$2.22 in 1958, \$2.99 in 1957, and \$4.20 in 1955, the record high.

W. E. Hutton & Co. believes the motors and airlines look more interesting as current holdings than the rank and file of the more exploited science stocks.

Walston & Co. lists several groups that might offer some gain possibilities before the bull market ends. They include oils, papers, metal working issues, producers of heavy equipment or capital goods, textiles, and speculative chemicals.

McDonnell Aircraft is likely to duplicate the earnings of the past two years in 1959 — \$6.33 in 1958, and \$6.34 in 1957, says the Fitch Survey.

With its labor difficulties overcome and economic recovery continuing, Ex-Cell-O should achieve substantial earnings gains during the remainder of fiscal 1959, according to Arthur Wiesenberger & Co.

Reynolds & Co. believes the downward trend has been halted for United States Pipe & Foundry.

Green, Ellis & Anderson lists five rails it thinks will reward long-pull holders — Santa Fe, Canadian Pacific, Chesapeake & Ohio, Great Northern, and Nickel Plate.

Portland—UPI—The Portland Police band's one-time drum major, Thomas H. Willett, died Thursday evening. He had been ill for about a month.

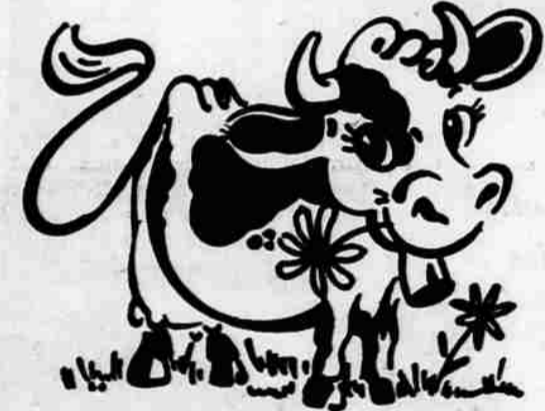
Willett, who was 77, joined the police band about 1910 and retired in 1935.

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
