

Southern Oregon Places Six Men On All-Conference Baseball Club

Portland-Southern Oregon college dominated the 1959 Oregon Collegiate conference baseball squad again this year. Coach Ted Schopf's two-time champions placed six members on the team.

Five repeaters were selected from the 1958 team and four were members of the championship Red Raider diamond crew.

Pitcher Dave D'Olive, first baseman Larry Maurer and outfielder Phil Sward, along with catcher Jim McAbee, were named again from SOC. John Willmarth, Eastern Oregon's pitcher, also won a spot for the second straight year.

McAbee was picked at a different position. In 1958 he was named to the all-conference outfield. Two SOC players were selected for the first time. They were second baseman Jim Dietz and outfielder LeeRoy King.

Runners-up Portland State won three berths. They went to pitcher Roy Love, shortstop Dennis Heath and third baseman Ray Anderson. The other two positions on the 12 man squad went to outfielder Virgil Winters of Oregon Tech and OCE's Jack Antonson as the utility man.

Shults, Clearwater Win Two Junior AAU Events

George Clearwater, McLoughlin Junior high, and Jerry Shults, Medford high, were double winners and Dick Evans, St. Mary's, and Higginbotham, Grants Pass, among leading performers in the 15-16 age division Friday in the Southern Oregon Junior AAU track and field meet Friday at Crater field in Central Point.

Clearwater put the shot a hefty 57 feet 9 1/2 inches to beat out Darrell Williamson, Crater, in the shot put and nipped Gary Wald, Central Point, in the 150-yard dash in the excellent time of :15.3. Shults won the broad jump with 20-8 and the high jump with a fine 6-1.

Evans, state B school champ in the mile, held off the challenge of Crater's Nathan Parrish, to win the three-fourths mile. Higginbotham nipped Wald in an exciting 75-yard dash.

Other winners in the bigger boys' division were Walt Ayres, Medford high, in the high hurdles; Williamson in the discus; Frank Kinney, Hedrick Junior high, in the javelin; Dick Andrews, Medford, in the low hurdles; Chronister, Grants Pass, in the 660; Skip Bennett, Medford, in the pole vault, and Grants Pass in the relay.

Steven White, Fruitdale, won both the sprints in the 13-14 years of age group. Vern Swanson, Central Point, was another dual winner in this class. He downed Bob Wilson, South Grants Pass, ninth grade district champ, in the high hurdles and took the 330-yard run.

Mike Barnes, McLoughlin, won three events in the 11-12 age group. He took both dashes and the broad jump. Barnes also anchored the winning relay team.

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Coquille Takes A-2 Track Title; Eagle Point Ties For 7th Place

Eagles Capture Relay; IV Grabs Off 10th Place

Corvallis —Eagle Point won the relay and tied for seventh in the Oregon Class A-2 high school track meet here Friday and Saturday.

The Eagles had 24 points, the same as Nyssa. Illinois Valley was 10th with 21 points and Phoenix scored five.

Bill McClure, Steve Charters, Bob Berryman and Bill Turner combined for a 1:34 time for EP in the relay. Turner was second in the 220-yard sprint with a fleet :22.9 and he placed third in the 100.

For Illinois Valley Dan Slanaker was second in the javelin and Grant Dickey second in the 100 and Mike Hanby tied for third in the pole vault.

Bill Dillree was fourth in the high hurdles for Phoenix and Don Korh was sixth in the javelin with 173 feet.

Corvallis — Coquille with three first places totaled 40 points Saturday to edge out favored Rainier for the Oregon A-2 prep track championship.

Rainier had 37 points and Seaside was third with 33. Other top scorers included Central of Monmouth 28, Siuslaw 26, Enterprise 24 1/2, Eagle Point 24, Nyssa 24, Woodburn 22, Illinois Valley 21, Lakeview 20, Oakridge 19.

Winners for Coquille were Duane Kirby with 4:35.3 in the mile, Gary Griffith with 153 feet 3 inches in the discus and David Phillips 2:02.8 in the half-mile. Records were set by Lee Hazen, Siuslaw, with :51 in the 440-yard run and Larry Johnson, Lakeview, with 6-2 1/4 in the high jump. Johnson also took the high hurdles in :15.5.

Also placing first were Eagle Point with 1:34 in the relay; Dick Fulwyle, Vale, with 49-7/4 in the shot put; Dick Britton, Central with

192-10 in the javelin; Gary Marr, Enterprise with :10.3 in the 100; John LaDuke, Siuslaw, with 27-7/4 in the broad jump; Doug Cutsforth, Central, with :20.6 in the low hurdles; Don Walker, Nyssa, with :22.7.

Miteff Wants Machen Tussle

New York —UPB— Heavyweight Alex Miteff of Argentina, who out-fumbled substitute Wayne Betha at Madison Square Garden said today he'll fight any of the top 10 contenders if his right hand is okay.

His preference is Eddie Machen of Redding, Calif. Miteff was scheduled to have the index knuckle of his right fist x-rayed because he injured it in the fourth round Friday night while winning a unanimous decision over Betha of New York.

Alex, weighing 204 1/2 pounds to Betha's 208 1/2, was favored at 3-1 for the nationally televised 10-rounder. And his left hooks to body and head won the dull bout on a rounds basis: 7-3, 7-3, 5-4-1.

Betha, substituting for injured Zora Folley, fought well in the early rounds. The pace slowed after the sixth session, and both were warned for holding. They were also booed by the estimated 2,000 fans.

Anything Seems Possible for Braves' Aaron

Hank Aaron, who always said he might hit .400 if he got off to a fast start, is hammerin' away at a fantastic clip that could rewrite the National league record book.

At his present pace, Aaron not only would become the first NL .400-hitter since Bill Terry in 1930 but also would set new league records of 307 hits, 65 doubles and 59 homers in addition to driving in 181 runs.

Impossible. Perhaps, but almost anything seems possible these days for Aaron who raised his average to .468 Friday night when he connected for four hits in the Milwaukee Braves' 10-5 rout of the Philadelphia Phillies. Aaron drove in three runs with a homer, double and two singles and now has 66 hits, 14 doubles, 13 homers and 39 rbi's in 33 games!

Aaron's slugging made it easy for Lew Burdette to become the major league's first seven-game winner of the season despite the fact that he was touched for 17 hits including a pinch homer by Gene Freese.
